THE THIRD SUMMERPLAY PRODUCTION opens 8 p.m. Thursday with "Blithe Spirit." This comedy by Noel Coward revolves around a novelist and his two wives, one who has returned to haunt him as a ghost. Research by E. C. Jones, Science, will be included in August's National Geographic as part of a larger report on shark behavior by Dr. Eugenie Clark, a world authority on sharks. Jones's report, originally published in 1971, helped the U.S. Navy identify and prevent shark attacks on nuclear submarine shields.
