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## *Potential, Personality, Presidency... Neuner Has it All*

At a petite 5 foot, 2 inches, senior Bonnie Neuner doesn't look like one of the most influential students on campus. First impressions can be misleading. This past April, Neuner was elected Student Senate President by the largest turnout of voters in four years.

Hers is a "rags to riches" story. During her first semester at NMSU, Neuner ran for a Senate representative position and lost. She applied for a position on the Student Activities Board but didn't get that either. She says she almost wanted to quit.

"They showed me it wasn't going to be as easy as I thought," Neuner says, "But I love a challenge."

She stepped back and started again. She became an aide for a Student Senator. She served as secretary on the Homecoming committee. With hard

work and determination, Neuner ran for councilwoman in April 1984 and held that position for two years. She's been working her way up ever since. She has served as chairman of Dog Days, a spring festival, and as chairman of Student Affairs which includes planning Homecoming.

When the Senate Vice-President resigned earlier this year, Neuner applied for the job and got it. This put her in two positions, serving as chairman for student affairs and chairman of all the committees. When elections rolled around in April, she knew there was only one way to go-- up. Not having decided to run for president until February, Neuner launched herself into a full campaign.

"I had no idea I'd win. I couldn't feel that confident. I wasn't going to worry about losing; I worried about winning," Neuner says.

What are Neuner's plans for Senate this year? She says she wants to increase awareness of the Senate through ads in the Index and other programs. She also feels work on committee organization is important.

Neuner's involvement doesn't stop with Senate. With her first semester far behind her, she has also been involved with SAB, serving as concert chairman last year and now serving as chairman of the travel committee. A pre-law/history major, Neuner was elected president of Phi Alpha Theta, an international history honor society, and she says she plans more activities for that organization.

With so much to do, Neuner finds herself prioritizing her time. She says her first priority, of course, is grades. Second on her list is organizations and last is her love of cycling. Neuner cycles an average of 25 miles a day and rides as often as she can.

Neuner plans to go to law school, preferably at the University of Michigan or Marquette University, after graduation. When asked if she is ready for graduation, Neuner leans back and smiles.

"Some days I feel like 'God, I can't wait to get out of here' and other days I'm not so sure. I want to move on and I feel like it's time, but I'm going to miss this place," Neuner says.
