## Faculty and Staff Surpass Giving Record

Faculty and staff have made a strong statement of support to the University through the 1995-96 NMSU Development Fund Faculty/Staff campaign. More than 440 faculty and staff participated in the campaign, exceeding the 55 percent participation goal.

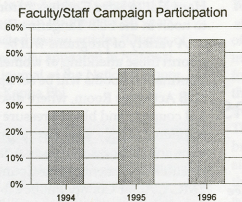
Several areas on campus had an overwhelming response to the campaign. For example, 30 first-time donors from the Physical Plant participated in this year's campaign, resulting in a 700 percent increase in participation for the department. Areas achieving nearly 100 percent participation rate include the Division of Education, Health and Exercise Science, the President's Office, Public Safety, and the Advancement Office.

"To exceed our goal sends a clear message that in addition to giving generously of their

time, our faculty and staff are willing to provide their monetary support as well," said President Jack Magruder. "I am so appreciative of their strong commitment to Northeast and our students."

The NMSU Development Fund endows student loans and scholarships, faculty development, academic divisions, undergraduate research, lectureships, the Lyceum Series, to name a few examples.

## Lyceum Hosts Gov. Douglas Wilder



Gov. Douglas Wilder will speak at 7:30 p.m. on March 19 in Baldwin Auditorium as part of the spring Lyceum Series. As the first elected African-American governor in United States history, Wilder will address his life experiences in public service and his solutions to the fiscal and social problems troubling America.

On Jan. 13, 1990, Wilder was sworn in as governor of Virginia, a state where more than 30 years earlier he was denied admission to law school because of his race. After 20 years in Virginia politics, Wilder was the first African-American elected to

the Virginia state senate. Since his election as lieutenant governor in 1985, he has been the highest ranking black state official in the nation. In 1992, Wilder was a Democratic candidate for the presidential nomination. Wilder's gubernatorial term ended in 1994.

In 1951, Wilder graduated from Virginia Union University with a bachelor's degree in chemistry. He was drafted into the U. S. Army during the Korean War, where he received the Bronze Star for heroism in ground combat. Upon returning to the States, he received his law degree from Howard University Law School.

## Parking Update

Students, faculty and Staff will have many new parking options to choose from in the coming weeks.

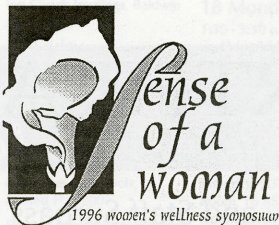
Various parking projects will produce a net gain of 65-75 new spaces. No parking will be lost due to construction of the Student Recreation Center, north of Centennial Hall, which is currently under way.

The new lot south of Centennial Hall offers 170 spaces for use by red and blue sticker holders. The entire lot is projected to be completed by the end of March. The recently completed lot north of Baldwin Hall offers 52 new spaces. An additional parking option for drivers is the lot at Stokes Stadium which is seldom used.

## Lee Award Nominations Sought

The Lee awards were established in 1993 in honor of the late Mr. Lee, a member and chair of Northeast's Board of Regents in the 1970s. Two award winners are chosen annually for their hours of work and dedication devoted to advising. Each recipient will receive a \$1,000 professional development fund.



The Sense of a Woman: 1996 Women's Wellness Symposium on March 23 will focus on women's wellness issues. It will run from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. on the third floor of the SUB. Admission is free.

**Mike Nelson, head of the Division of Science**, has accepted an invitation to partici-

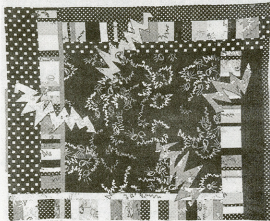
pate in the Undergraduate Research Symposium at Central Washington University (Ellensburg) as the plenary session speaker. The symposium will be held in mid-May.

**Roger Festa**, associate professor of chemistry, is the youngest American chemist to serve as president of the American Institute of Chemists. He will serve for the 1996 calendar year. The American Institute of Chemists will sponsor a reception in Festa's honor from 3:30 to 5 p.m., March 20, in the SUB Tangerine Room. All students, faculty and staff are invited to attend.

Elected to membership in the Institute in 1978, Festa was elevated to Fellow in 1985. He has been a member of the Institute's Board of Directors since 1981.

The American Institute of Chemists, headquartered in Bethesda, Md., was founded in 1923 to improve the public recognition of the profession of chemistry. The Institute engages in a broad program of professional enhancement through government interaction in legislative and administrative matters, national meetings, publications and public relations activities. The Institute operates the National Certification Commission in Chemistry and Chemical Engineering, the national credentialing agency of chemistry professions.
