As a counterpoint to the main romance, the proprietor of the cafe and the bus driver at last find time to develop a friendship of their own; a middle-aged scholar comes to terms with himself; and a young girl who works in the cafe also gets her first taste of romance.

Performances start at 8:15 p.m. Tickets are \$3.50 and \$2.50. The box office number is 221-6070.
