THE BOARD OF REGENTS of Northeast Missouri State University will hold its regular monthly meeting at 10:30 a.m. Thursday in the President's Office/Board Room in the Administration/Humanities Building.

VOLUNTEERS FROM HELP ORGANIZATIONS may participate in a one-day workshop called "Effective Management of Volunteer Programs" on June 27. The workshop, not offered for credit, is sponsored by the Missouri Volunteer Office in cooperation with the NMSU Social Science Division. Lt. Gov. William C. Phelps, agency coordinator, will speak at the workshop on "Developing a Citizen Involvement Council." Registration forms, which are available in the Social Science Office, 214 Administration/Humanities Building, should be turned in by June 21. A small registration fee also is required.

THE BETHEL PROGRAM featuring workshops sponsored by the Extension Division will be discussed at 9:07 a.m. Tuesday by program director Clyde Burch on KIRX-AM's Area Scene. Bethel, a German settlement founded in 1844, is located 50 miles southeast of Kirksville. Workshops teach the skills of the past now treasured in the present such as pottery, log cabin construction, roots and herbs, cheese and yogurt making, animal energy use, basketmaking, genealogy, glassblowing, furniture making, fiber art, stained glass, beekeeping and other subjects.

THE CINCINNATI REDS will conduct a baseball tryout camp from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday at the NMSU field, south of Stokes Stadium.
