NORTHEAST NOTES

Jill Morrison, a graduate assistant in the Division of Education, attended the National Education Association's Annual Representative Assembly in Philadelphia, June 30 to July 5. She was one of 25 student delegates elected nationwide.

Dean Rosebery, head of the Division of Science, was elected president elect of the National Association of the Academies of Science at its recent meeting. The NAAS was founded in 1926 and serves as a liaison for communication between the state academies and the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Academies of science generally embrace all of the scientific disciplines, and the public understanding of science is fostered through publications and support of science museums and technology centers.

Robert Graber, Social Science, had his paper, "Can Aversion Explain the Incest Taboo? Comment on McCabe," accepted for publication in the *American Anthropologist*.

Jeff Menz, senior, recently received the National Defense Transportation Association ROTC Silver Medal Award from the Department of the Army. Menz was one of only 20 cadets nationwide presented with the honor. The award is presented annually to the 20 most outstanding cadets in the country who are enrolled in their last year of military science.

Jim Barnes, Language and Literature, had a poem, "The Art of Drowning," accepted for publication by *The Texas Review*. He was also the featured reader of his own poetry at The Institute of American Indian Art Literary Festival in Santa Fe, N.M.
