THE FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR EXCHANGE PROGRAM has announced a July 1, 1976 deadline for 1977-78 Lecturing Appointments and Advanced Research Grants, except for Israel (September 1), and France, Germany and Italy (February 1, 1977).

Preference is given to persons who have never received a lecturing or research grant. The award covers roundtrip travel, maintenance allowance, and in some cases, a stipend. Foreign language proficiency is required in some cases.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF TITLE IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, a Title IX Coordination Committee has been established to evaluate institutional compliance on the part of the University with federal policy in the area of sex discrimination and recommend remedial action where necessary to insure compliance by the University. WORKSHOPS ON CAMPUS this week and next include "All About Horses," directed by Maurice Wade, June 7-11; "New Techniques in Elementary School Music," directed by Barbara Keyman, June 14-18; "Issues in the Teaching of Reading," directed by Gordon Richardson, June 14-18; "The Teaching of Law-Related Social Studies in the Classroom," directed by Gilbert Kohlenberg and William Kitts, June 14-25 and "The Theory of Gymnastics," directed by Mary Farwell, June 14-July 3.

IT'S ONE OF THE FIRST IN THE AREA ... a three-credit hour course in music appreciation to be aired over KRXL radio beginning June 13. Leon Karel of the Fine Arts Division is offering the course in 48, 58-minute tapes which will be broadcast from 7-9 p.m. every Sunday through October 3 and then more frequently through the remainder of the fall and early winter.

Students will be required to complete four self-examinations in written form, similar to those Karel gives in several of his extension courses. He and his graduate assistant Mary Jo Polak will send an evaluation of each exam to the student on a cassette tape.

Karel plans to air the course on other radio stations if the pilot program is successful.

THE STUDENT SCIENCE TRAINING PROGRAM in chemistry begins on campus June 14 and continues through August 6. The eight-week program is designed to provide chemistry laboratory experiences for 25 high ability 11th grade students selected from educationally limited rural and small town school systems within a radius of 125 miles of Kirksville. A grant of \$15,120 from the National Science Foundation is supporting the program. Dean Rosebery, Science Division head, is director, with Jack Magruder of the same division as instructor.

1000 HILLS CAMPERS on campus this week include those enrolled in the High School Computer Science Camp and those in the first session of the Junior High and High School Girls' Basketball Camp. Ricky J. Barker, B.S.E. '74 and M.A. '75, is directing the computer camp. Jack Bowen of the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Division, is in charge of the basketball camp.

THE TWEEN CLUB, for ages 6-14, gets underway today with its first five-week session. Youngsters enrolled in the morning or afternoon sessions will have the opportunity to learn skills in baseball, swimming, tennis, football, etc. Tom Duden, program director, also has planned several field trips to sites in the community.

The idea began as a program limited to children whose parents would be enrolled in summer school on campus. As its popularity grew, the University decided to open the program to youngsters in the community.

Cost is \$62.50 per section. The sections are 7:30-11:30 a.m. and 12:00-4:00 p.m. The second session begins July 12.

A STUDY of the Long Branch Lake and Reservoir Area at Macon, Mo., is being planned by members of the Science, Social Science and Fine Arts divisions. The University has received a grant of \$48,892 from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for a Cultural Resources Survey of the area. The study will include a history of the Macon County areas involved in the Long Branch Project, an architectural history of the areas, and archeological aspects of the area. Dean A. Rosebery, Science head, submitted the proposal. Those to be involved in the study are faculty members, Leon Karel, David March, Larry Stephens, Michael Davis and Roger Boyd and an archeologist, Larry Grantham.
