## Education Conference to be Held at Northeast

Bridging the Gap . . . Finding a Common Ground Toward Equality in Education, an education conference, will be held on April 12 and 13 at Northeast. The conference has been organized by members of 10 student organizations to create unity among the diverse groups of education majors on the Northeast campus. The students hope that the conference will bring all of the educational disciplines together to a "common ground." The conference is open to students and local teachers.

Chairwoman Mary Murphy said, "The conference is the first of its kind to be organized entirely by students. The students took the initiative because they felt it would be beneficial to gather all of the MAE students to-

gether to learn more about their fields. All of the divisions have wholeheartedly supported the conference."

The conference will feature approximately 30 speakers and will address such topics as "Whole Language," "Making Math Fun," "Gifted Education" and "Master of Arts in Education at NMSU." Featured speakers include Carol Davis, a Hannibal elementary teacher featured in *Newsweek's* education edition and Robert Roach from the Missouri Department of Gifted Education.

Keynote speakers will be Greg Thurman and Thomas Good. Thurman received the Presidential Award for Excellence in Science and Mathematics Teaching. He is a high school teacher in Salisbury, Mo.

Good is a professor in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction and Research Associate at the Center for Research in Social Behavior at the University of Missouri-Columbia. Good has done extensive research and writing in the area of teacher expectations and the interaction of teacher and student expectations. He will speak on *The Role of Expectations in Classroom Learning* based upon his latest research. He has received many grants for his research and is the author of several books and articles. Good is presently the editor of the *Elementary School Journal* and advisory editor for several other publications. Material about Good is on reserve at the Pickler Memorial Library Circulation Desk. Students are encouraged to review this material before the conference.

Interested people should stop by the Education Division Office in Violette Hall 258 for registration materials. Registration ends March 22. The cost is \$5 for students and \$7 for instructors.

## Board of Governors Approves Fee Increase

In an effort to maintain quality with no additional state funding expected for the coming year, the Board of Governors, at its Feb. 23 meeting, approved fee increases for the 1991-92 academic year. Enrollment costs for resident undergraduate students will be \$1,800 per academic year and \$3,504 per academic year for non-resident undergraduate students. According to an internal study, the fee increases should result in more financial aid for approximately 570 students. Also, approximately 209 students should qualify for additional grant funds.

Funds will be budgeted to cover the pay increases for our current student work force

of approximately 1,200. Additional funds will be set aside to provide new work opportunities for financially burdened students who may have difficulty meeting the fee increases. Effective April 1, the student institutional pay rate will be increasing approximately 38 cents per hour.

The Board of Governors also approved an increase in residence hall fees to \$2,584 for a double occupancy room and \$2,480 for a multiple occupancy room. A large portion of the funds will be earmarked for the refurbishment of residence halls and University apartments.

## 1991-92 Federal Aid Applications Available

The 1991-92 Federal Aid Application (ACT Family Financial Statements) should be completed over Spring Break to ensure prompt delivery of funds for this fall. Forms are available in the Financial Aid Office, McClain Hall 100.

Students who have not qualified for federal aid in prior years are urged to reapply especially if their family financial situation has changed, additional family members attend college, or they were the recipient of a scholarship which they no longer receive. The increase in enrollment and housing charges for 1991-92 may also change your aid eligibility status.

Missouri Grant applicants need to have the ACT-FFS sent to Iowa City by April 30 in order to be considered for these funds.

Missouri residents most likely to qualify for a Missouri Grant at Northeast are those with children or married students with two to college. The grant award for 1991-92 will be \$804 for the academic year.

Estimates of aid eligibility can be provided if you bring a completed copy of the ACT Financial Statement to the Financial Aid Office. A calculation of need will be provided promptly.
