Roy Domenico, professor of history, was the principle discussant on a panel concerned with American Catholicism and politics at the annual meeting of the American Historical Association in Atlanta on Jan. 7. He recently completed an article on the Italian historian Renzo De Felice in the *Encyclopedia of Historians*, edited by Kelly Boyd for the Fitzroy Dearborn Press in London.

Jerrold Hirsch, associate professor of history, and **Karen Hirsch, deputy director of professional development**, published "Self-Defining Narratives: Disability Identity in the Postmodern Era" in the special issue of *Disabilities Studies Quarterly* 15 (fall 1995): 21-27 on disability culture.

Passe, clinical supervisors in the University Speech and Hearing Clinic, presented a workshop for Macintosh beginners at the American Speech, Language and Hearing Association's annual convention held this year in Orlando, Fla.
