Trivia Contestants In Hot Pursuit

The ever increasing popularity of the board game, "Trivial Pursuit," has turned into what promises to be a good fundraiser for the NMSU Pershing Society. The Trivial Pursuit Contest begins with team registration at 7 p.m. Wednesday, in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building, followed by opening rounds of the contest at 7:30 p.m.

"Trivial Pursuit is such a popular

game that we (Pershing Society) thought it was a good way to serve the campus," Bill Newbury, contest chairman, said.

Newbury said so far, only a few people have responded; however, they only have to show up for registration Wednesday to compete. Faculty, staff and students may participate in the event and teams may consist of

one to three players. Newbury said the Society is charging an entry fee of \$3 per team.

The Pershing Society will award prizes to at least the three top teams in the contest. The first place team will receive its choice of either the Trivial Pursuit game or one of the Baby Boomer card sets. Other top finishers will receive smaller trivia games.

Campus VIP Event Set

Registration for NMSU's VIP Visit Event begins at 10 a.m. Saturday in the Student Union Building for an estimated 400 high school students.

Gina Myers, assistant director of admissions, said that approximately 300 of the students attending will travel a great distance to attend and will stay overnight in host and hostess residence hall rooms. Myers encouraged students living in the residence halls to turn in their host/hostess cards to the Admissions Office by Tuesday.

Students attending the VIP Visit Event are scheduled to participate in University information programs, academic division open houses and a competitive examination where top scorers will receive VIP Recognition Awards of scholarships in varying amounts.

Students remaining on the NMSU campus overnight may attend the Bulldog women's and men's basketball games, followed by a film festival in Baldwin Hall Auditorium.

'Dogs Drown In Double Dose

Both the women's and men's basketball teams lost close battles with the Riverwomen and men of the University of Missouri-St. Louis in the Bulldogs' first conference bout last Wednesday night in Pershing Arena.

Lady Bulldog forward, junior Annette Rogers out-performed all players with game highs of 20 points and 11 rebounds. Sophomore forward Jackie Thornburg backed up Rogers with 13 points and seven rebounds.

Forward Gina Gregory took the Riverwomen's high-score honors with 13 points, followed closely by the 12-point effort of teammate, center Marni Schmidt.

UMSL led the Lady Bulldogs narrowly by a 32-28 margin at halftime. With just over 12 minutes left in the game, the Riverwomen pulled out in front of the Bulldogs, working up to a 16-point lead with 2:10 left to play. NMSU rallied, scoring nine unanswered points in an effort that failed to yield a win.

The short end of a seven-point spread is where the Bulldogs also ended, bowing to the Rivermen, 68-61. Junior forward Eric Harris came away with a game-high 22 points, followed by Rivermen forward Ervin Bailey and center Ron Porter each with 16 points. Harris, who went to the board for seven rebounds for the 'Dogs, was out-manuevered by UMSL's Ted Meier who claimed 11 rebounds during the game. NMSU senior guard Milous Meadows threw in 14 points for the Bulldog effort.

Although the Bulldogs tied up the game twice during the first half, they could get no closer than three points to the Rivermen's lead during the second half, falling 10 points behind with 12 minutes left in the game.

The Bulldog basketball teams square off against the University of Missouri-Rolla at 5:30 and 7:30 p.m. Saturday, in Pershing Arena, after meeting Lincoln University in Jefferson City, Tuesday.
