TOMORROW is the last day to drop full semester courses without a teacher drop code. After tomorrow, students that drop classes and are failing will receive a "WF" (withdraw failing) recorded on their transcript. March 7 is the start of second half block courses.

A CONTINUOUSLY SOUNDING SIREN signals a tornado warning. In anticipation of the upcoming tornado "season", the Safety and Security Office asks that faculty, staff, and students become familiar with the recommended procedures to be used on campus in the event that a tornado warning is issued by the U.S. Weather Bureau. Briefly they are: vacate classrooms and occupy the safest possible positions for tornado activity. Generally this would mean 1) remain inside the building, 2) move away from exterior walls and windows and proceed to the lower portions of the building, 3) stay out of auditoriums or gymnasiums, or other structures with wide, free-span roofs.

To insure that the campus is notified when a warning is in effect, the Safety and Security Office will dispatch the patrol car to cruise the campus with the siren sounding continuously. This is the only time that this procedure will be employed. There will be no practice alerts of this procedure.
