THE TRADITIONAL PINNING CEREMONY of the Nursing Division will be at 7 tonight in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building. Thirty-seven nursing graduates are expected to receive their pins. In nursing history, pinning conveys an informal acceptance into the profession. Speaker will be Mary Poush, assistant professor of nursing at Mt. St. Mary's College in Los Angeles. Her topic will be "Qualifications Needed by the Graduate to Practice His/Her Professional Career in the Real World."

U.S. SENATOR JACK DANFORTH will deliver the Spring Commencement address at 10 a.m. Friday in Stokes Stadium. The traditional academic procession will begin at 9:30 a.m. Friday with about 820 graduate and undergraduate students marching from Baldwin Auditorium. All candidates for graduation should assemble in Baldwin Auditorium at 8:30 a.m. The procession will travel to the statue of Joseph Baldwin, the University's founder and first president, where top academic undergraduate students will lay a wreath.

If it rains, the academic procession will be canceled. Commencement will be held in Baldwin Auditorium with each student individually recognized. Two rain tickets have been given to each graduate to admit family and friends to Baldwin Auditorium and the Little Theatre in Baldwin Hall. Others may view the ceremonies on closed circuit television in the Activities and Georgian rooms and Quiet Lounge of the Student Union Building and 248, 252, 253, 265, and 266 in Violette Hall.

THE ROTC COMMISSIONING CEREMONY, featuring guest speaker Maj. James O. Preston of the Missouri Army National Guard, will be held at 1:30 p.m. Friday in the Quiet Lounge of the Student Union Building. Fifteen ROTC seniors will be commissioned as second lieutenants upon graduation.

THE BOARD OF REGENTS of Northeast Missouri State University will hold its regular monthly meeting at 2:30 p.m. Friday in the President's Office/Board Room of the Administration/Humanities Building.

ALL GRADUATES are reminded to return news releases for their hometown media by Friday to the Public Relations Office, McKinney Center. Extra blank releases are available for graduates who did not attend Commencement rehearsal. Releases will be mailed following Commencement.

Student Ambassadors give campus tours introducing new students and their parents to NMSU life.

ATTENTION OFF-CAMPUS STUDENTS WITH TELEPHONES: If you will be leaving for the summer you must get your phone disconnected. Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., 216 E. Washington, will extend business hours until 5:30 p.m. today and Friday for all disconnections. If your phone will be disconnected, follow these steps: 1) Leave a forwarding address and telephone number with the company, 2) Pay new bill at disconnection or make other arrangements with company, 3) Remember that you and any roommates will receive another phone bill after disconnection, 4) If your phone is a modular desk or wall phone that unclips or lifts off, bring it to the company for a \$5 credit on final bill. If it is a non-modular desk phone, clip the cord close to wall and bring it to the company for credit. If it is a non-modular wall phone, leave it.
