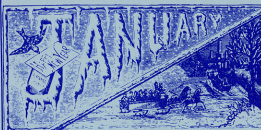

The applicant must demonstrate financial need. Proof of military service should accompany a NMSU scholarship application.

Several NMSU faculty deserve recognition for recent accomplishments. In the **Language and Literature Division**, **Jim Thomas** had several of his poems accepted for publication in the literary magazines "Alura" and "Long Pond Review." **Roy Tanner** presided over a special session on Gaucho literature at the recent Modern Language Association convention in Chicago. **Tanner** was also appointed chairman of the Executive Committee of the Division of Latin American Literature to 1990. **Constance Reid** was recently selected to serve as secretary to the Missouri Chapter of the American Association of Teachers of German.

In the **Fine Arts Division**, **Dan Peterson** was appointed to a position of artistic development by "Pyware" Computer Software, a company that produces computer software in music departments in schools throughout the country. **Peterson** will be working on the program "100 Championship Drill Design Progressions" for marching bands this year. **Gretchen Cornell**, **Nursing Division**, had her article "The Value Added Approach to the Measurement of Educational Quality" published in the Nov./Dec., 1985 issue of "The Journal of Professional Nursing." **Cornell** presented her research on nursing student satisfaction as part of "value added" at the annual meeting of The Society for Research in Nursing Education, at San Francisco, Calif. **Charles Frost**, **Criminal Justice**, had his article titled, "Drug Trafficking, Organized Crime and Terrorism: The International Cash Connection," published in the "Royal Canadian Mounted Police Monthly Digest of Drug Intelligence Trends." In the **Education Division**, **Marlow Ediger** received notice that his manuscript, "The Psychology of Learning and the Mathematics Curriculum," was accepted for publication in "The Forum," a professional journal for teachers and administrators. In the **Science Division**, **Russell Baughman** and **Dana Delaware**, advisers of the NMSU Student Affiliate Chapter of the American Chemical Society, received notice from the American Chemical Society that the NMSU chapter has been awarded a commendable rating for "the quality of its activities." The recognition of the award will be printed in "Chemical and Engineering News," the American Chemical Society's national newsmagazine.
