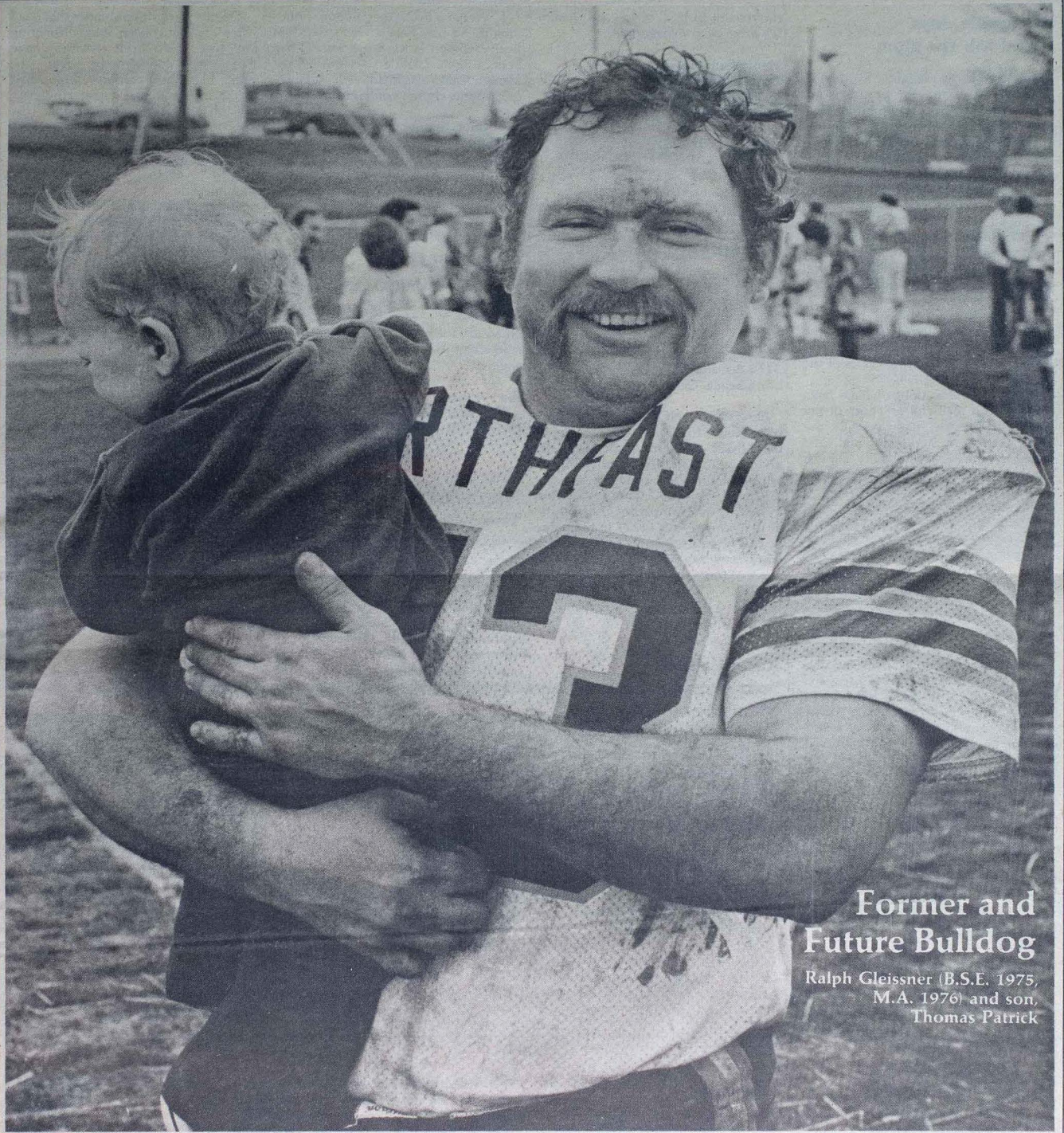

Communication with alumni benefits University

Several alumni have visited the campus this spring. On page 31 read about the Alumni vs. Varsity spring football game. It was a great day for the alumni, Coach Wade, the current team and the University. Next year we will probably repeat the game and possibly feature varsity/alumni competition in other sports, that is if the city of Kirksville ever recovers from this year's game.

Our colleague, Steve Shinn (B.A. 1949), was honored as outstanding alumnus in mass communication (see page 12) in April. Steve and other alumni participated in Communication Week activities. It was good to have them on campus, as well as other alumni, who were here for teachers meeting and Interview Day. Janks Morton (1963), stopped in earlier in the month and brought his friend, "Sugar" Ray Leonard, of world boxing and 7-Up commercial fame, with him. It created quite a stir in Kirksville.

Your response to our various donation programs has been great. In July we will be publishing in a special publication the names of those who have contributed to the various funds. Again, we thank you.

Knowing how to serve all 23,000 of you continues to be a challenge. Our

goal is to keep the communication lines as open and as personal as possible. For instance, we have had good response to the Homecoming questionnaire that was sent to the members of the classes of 1931, 1941, 1956 and 1971. We hope all members of these classes will return their questionnaires promptly.

Also, for us to communicate we need your current address. Keep us informed. If the NEMOSCOPE is coming to your parents' home, for instance, why not give us your address so we can send it directly to you.

Don't forget that single annual membership dues will be \$10 when the alumni dues structure changes July 1.

When this structure for the Alumni Association goes into effect, some new categories of membership will be added. Among these will be a half-price, or \$5, membership fee for alumni over 65.

We are recognizing that many of the older alumni are among our best supporters, and they live on fixed incomes. It is our desire to recognize this fact—while at the same time remembering that alumni dues have not increased in the 14 years that the Association has been in existence.

Another new category of membership will be the graduating senior life membership. If taken out in the year of graduation, the alumnus may become a life member at half price, or \$50. The new life membership fee for all other alumni will be \$100 for single life membership and \$125 for joint life membership. Each may be paid over a three-year period.

The final new category is the honorary life membership. This membership will be awarded to persons who make a one-time donation to the University of \$1,000 or more.

This membership category will honor those who contribute significantly to the growth of the University. In addition, names of honorary members will be placed on a plaque displayed in a prominent place on campus. This program also will begin July 1.

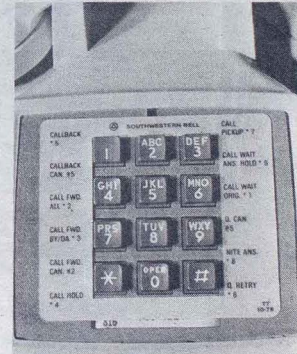


Hostages home

Some NMSU classrooms are more than classrooms

Since January, five NMSU students have found the marbled halls of the Missouri Capitol Building are their classrooms, House committee hearings are their courses and State Representatives are their instructors.

These students are participating in one of NMSU's most prestigious internship programs. Serving directly under five state legislators, interns work with representative's constituents, help put together newsletters and news releases and sit in on important committee hearings.

Working in the office of State Representative Gary Sharpe (D-Hannibal), senior Lori Lee has enjoyed her experience in government. "It's given me more confidence in dealing with people in different situations," she says. Lee also believes that working inside of state government is the best way to learn the process by which it operates. "You learn the process first hand. It's better than reading or having it explained."

Students are selected to serve in the internship program based on outstanding qualities in areas of leadership and scholarship, and by having backgrounds in mass communication

or political science. After nearly 10 years with the government internship program, NMSU has established a respected reputation among the legislators who participate.

President Charles McClain is proud to attend committee hearings and speak on behalf of Northeast because he knows the interns are representing the University well in his absence. "It is very gratifying to have a legislator come up to me in Jefferson City and ask how he can employ one of our interns."

NMSU's internship program is designed to give students practical experience in fields related to their majors. While supervised by their employers, the interns are also advised by a University instructor. Each year about 200 students are enrolled in the program, accumulating up to 15 credit hours for a full-time, 15-week internship. Of the 200, only five or six are selected to serve in the government program.

Presently serving internships at the Capitol Building are senior Sherry Doctorian, a political science major from Macon; senior Lagina Bevans, a political science and interpersonal communication major from Williamstown;

junior Kent Eitel, a political science major from Green Castle; senior Jeanne Krautmann, a mass communication major from Brentwood; and Lee, a communication arts major from Moberly.

Inside the office of Governor Kit Bond, Sherry Doctorian works on the governor's research team, attends committee hearings and keeps track of the governor's 18-bill legislative package. "I've learned more in four weeks than in an entire semester at school—stuff that's not in any of the books," Doctorian says. As a result of having served the internship, she is seriously considering law school and eventually following the example of her father, State Senator David Doctorian (R-Macon), with a career in politics.

Kent Eitel, working for State Representative Harry Hill (D-Novinger), also plans to enroll in law school following his graduation from NMSU. His internship experience has reaffirmed his aspirations of becoming involved in government as a career.

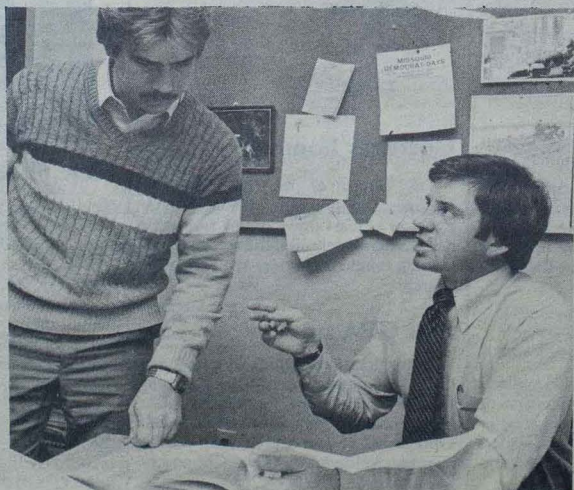
Jeanne Krautmann works in Estil Fretwell's (D-Williamstown) office and plans her career in public relations or television broadcasting. During her internship, she has assisted Fretwell in writing newsletters, maintaining com-

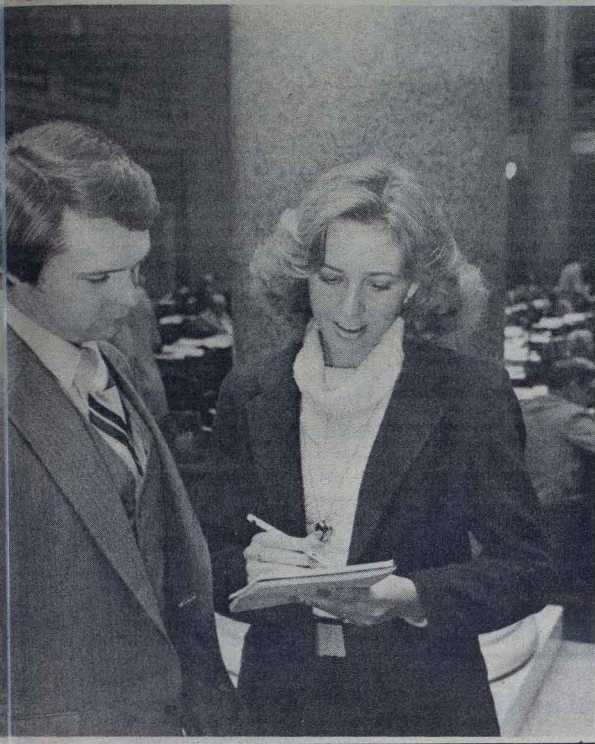
munication between Fretwell and his constituents and has also prepared data sheets for several bills he has introduced in the House. Her experience has been worthwhile for her, and Krautmann says it will be a benefit when she enters the working world in May.

Lagina Bevans, assisting Everett Brown (D-Maryville), plans to accept a position as a lobbyist when the House session ends in June. Eventually, however, Bevans would like to run for a government office.

She has helped Brown with his committee on education appropriations throughout the session. Due to cutbacks in funds to public schools and institutions of higher learning, Bevans has learned much about lobbying and budgeting through governmental procedures. "They've jokingly accused me of being a secret lobbyist for Northeast since I'm down here," she says.

The Capitol Building in Jefferson City is well over 200 miles from the Administration/Humanities Building where most political science and mass communication majors are instructed. For those deserving students selected to intern there, however, it is a unique and effective classroom building.

Raymond Bentele Elected as new Chief executive

A 1960 graduate of NMSU, Raymond F. Bentele, was elected chief executive officer of the St. Louis-based Mallinckrodt Inc. on Feb. 10.

Upon his election Bentele told the St. Louis Globe-Democrat he intends to maintain the course of his predecessor, Harold E. Thayer, by continuing the chemical company's expansions in the United States and in several countries around the world. He is only the fourth chief executive in the company's history. Prior to Thayer, the only other chief executive officers were Edward Mallinckrodt Sr. and Edward Mallinckrodt Jr.

Bentele will continue as president of the company, a position he has held two years. "It's a great feeling (becoming chief executive) and a rare opportunity in American industry to take over a 114-year-old company," he told the Globe-Democrat.

Born in Macon, the 44-year-old Bentele graduated from Macon High School. Following his tour of duty in the Army he enrolled at NMSU and began the study of accounting, which was to form the basis of his career. In 1960, he received his B.S. degree in accounting from the University. He is a certified public accountant.

Bentele joined Mallinckrodt in 1967 as a senior financial analyst and in 1968 was named assistant controller. In 1971 he became assistant to the vice president for finance and later that year was named controller. He was elected vice president in 1974 and vice president for financial administration in 1976.

In 1977 he assumed new responsibilities as vice president for the company's international group. A year later he was named senior vice president with additional responsibilities for the company's food, flavor and fragrance group. He was elected to the board of the company in 1978.

Bentele's wife, Mary Edith Cox Bentele, also graduated from NMSU in 1960 with a B.S.E. in business education. They have three children: Daniel, 16; Denise, 14; and Douglas, 9.

McClain establishes P.O. Selby Scholarship. . .

President Charles McClain has announced the establishment of the Paul Owen Selby Scholarship for students in business education.

The scholarship was established, McClain said, with an initial gift from the Alpha chapter of Pi Omega Pi, national business education fraternity, which Dr. Selby founded at NMSU in 1923.

Dr. Selby was born in LaPlata, Mo., in 1890, and was graduated from NMSU in 1910. From 1912-1915 he

was registrar at NMSU and in 1916 headed the Division of Business Education.

The division soon became recognized as one of the leaders in the field of business education. He served in that capacity until 1954, when he was named dean of instruction.

Dr. Selby has held positions in numerous state and national organizations, including president of the National Association of Business Teacher

Training Institutions and first national president of Pi Omega Pi.

Dr. Selby continues to be active in Kirksville and on campus, serving as a speaker at the 1980 Homecoming Banquet as well as recently being made a life member of the Kiwanis Club.

President McClain has advised alumni wishing to contribute to the Paul Owen Selby Scholarship Fund to send their contributions to the Business Division.

Graduate heads hospital emergency room

As a youngster attending a one-room, eight-grade school, Roger Willcox had an advantage over others in similar situations. Living in Kirksville, Willcox had access to the

resources of Northeast Missouri State Teachers College—and he took advantage of them.

"We would often come in to the college to talk to the faculty," Willcox says. "Dr. John Black (professor emeritus of zoology) and Dr. Max Bell (professor of botany) were both big inspirations to me."

When Willcox was old enough to attend college, he chose Northeast, majoring in zoology and minoring in chemistry.

"I had two main interests: fisheries—biology, zoology—and medicine. By the time I was a junior I'd decided to go into medicine for sure. It's a lot easier to have biology as your hobby and medicine as your profession than the other way around."

Willcox graduated from NMSU in 1968, received his M.D. from the University of Missouri-Columbia in 1973 and now heads the emergency department of Boone County Hospital in Columbia.

"A lot of people wouldn't enjoy it as much as I do," says Willcox of the long hours and high-pressure situations associated with working in a hospital emergency room. "You tend to see the sicker people—the people that really need your help more."

Since he was appointed emergency department director last August, Willcox has made sure the department is staffed by full-time doctors rather than part-time or semi-retired doctors, as it had been. Even so, shifts are 12 hours long, and Willcox usually puts in at least a 48-hour week. "It's got to be covered 24 hours a day," he says of the emergency room.

He works alternate shifts and is on duty two weekends each month. None of the doctors receive preferential treatment when schedules are being made out. Willcox believes "the first team" should work during the busiest times. And anyway, "I'd rather work when it's busier."

Many of the people Willcox treats are heart attack victims. With paramedics on the staff, he says, "We're not only able to do things in the hospital, but use an extension in the medical field." Paramedics can send heart rhythm strips to the hospital over the radio.

"I think we've got the ideal system," Willcox says. Whereas paramedics in some communities work at a fire station and some work for private ambulance services, the paramedics at Boone County Hospital actually work in the emergency room until they are called out. This way the two groups can work with and observe each other,

developing a better working relationship.

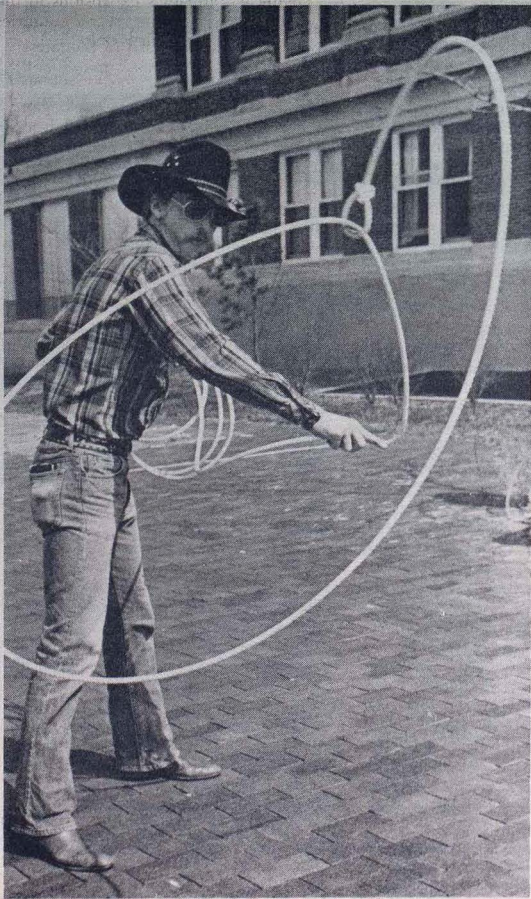
Last year when Willcox went on a float trip he had a chance to do some field work of his own. A man—who had been named Paramedic of the Year in Springfield, Mo.—fell off a cliff and broke his back. "We were out in the middle of nowhere," Willcox says. The man had to be transported by canoe, but, "He did fine."

Willcox is not one to say, "I don't want to get involved." If he sees an ambulance on the side of the road, he stops to see if he can be of assistance.

He has brought that helpful spirit with him to Boone County Hospital. Both he and his staff feel they are a part of the community as well as the medical community. "We don't just come in and put in our hours."

Having been born in Columbia and raised in Kirksville, he says, "This area is home to me." His mother, Meredith Willcox, works at the NMSU Career Planning and Placement Center. His brother, Steve Willcox, is an associate circuit judge in Lancaster. So Willcox visits Kirksville fairly often. "That's one of the reasons I came back to Columbia—to be closer to home."

Willcox plans to stay in the medical profession. "I enjoy it very much," he says. "I think you've got to do what you enjoy."

Ophelia Parrish closes; Campus school era ends

A junior high school located on a university campus creates some problems, for sure, but Ophelia Parrish Junior High and its students have been an important part of the NMSU experience since 1923. Many Northeast graduates remember the junior high school something like this:

In the morning, tires screech and brakes moan as busloads of chattering 12-, 13- and 14-year-olds file into the building. (Residents of the north side of Missouri Hall roll over and go back to sleep.)

Middy sounds of off-key band music float across the Quadrangle. (Music majors on the way to class in Baldwin Hall wonder if they played that badly when they were in junior high.)

During midafternoon, small bands of the rowdiest kids gather to talk and smoke cigarettes outside the building. (Sometimes there is a fight, but University students seldom pay much attention.)

By late afternoon the last malingerers are finally clearing out of the Student Union Games Room. (An upperclassman remarks that some of these kids must have an inexhaustible supply of quarters for the pinball machines.)

And so it goes. The junior high school has been a part of the campus for so many years that it is taken for granted by most students. Soon, however, a tradition will end.

The demonstration school program became a tradition right from the beginning when Joseph Baldwin and the North Missouri Normal School first attempted to alleviate the teacher shortage in northeast Missouri in 1867. Students attending the Normal School had the opportunity to use a Model School as a laboratory to refine their teaching methods.

As the student teaching program at Northeast evolved, the idea of a demonstration school continued.

Ophelia Parrish, named after a distinguished early faculty member of the college, was built to serve just that purpose—to be a demonstration school. College students could learn firsthand how to teach. Local youngsters would have an ample supply of teachers versed in the latest teaching methods. It was a unique and beneficial relationship.

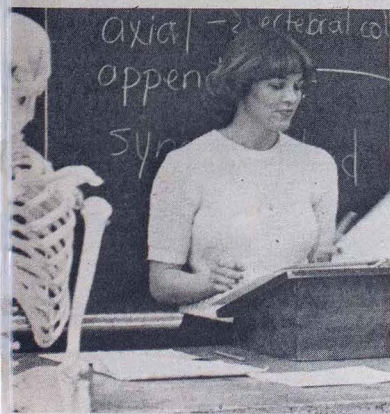
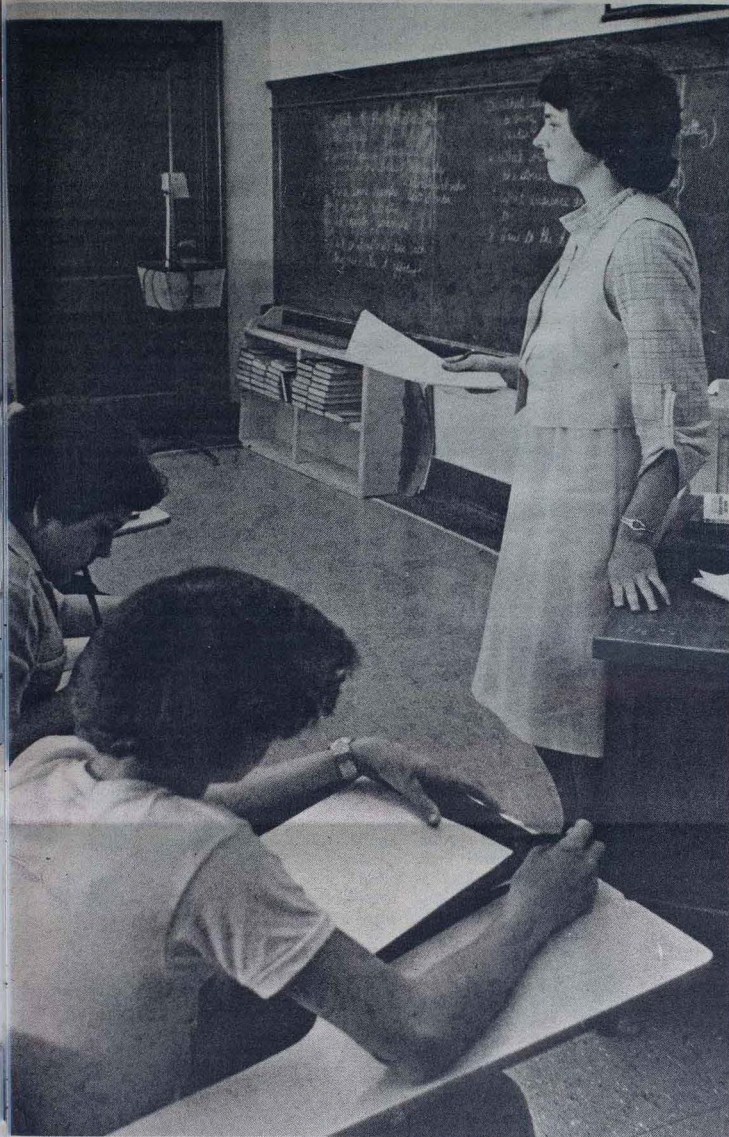
Anne Parcels (B.S.E. 1926) began teaching full time at the junior high in 1927 and remembers the atmosphere of the school.

"The atmosphere was generally wonderful. It was the first junior high in the state outside of St. Louis. This was a new venture, this junior high."

Students at Northeast used the demonstration school to observe the teaching methods of instructors in the school, and many also did their practice teaching there. "It wasn't unusual to have four to six teachers sitting in the back watching you teach," Parcels said.

After a few years, the teaching program at Northeast had outgrown the Ophelia Parrish facilities, but the junior high remained a major spot for students to practice teach. However, it became increasingly clear that a junior high school suffered some drawbacks when located on a University campus. By the 1960s, the building had deteriorated to the point that its advancing age was reason enough to suggest a new junior high be built. Not until 1979, however, was a bond issue passed and plans for a new junior high actually put into motion.

The University is studying the building to determine its best use when the new junior high school is completed and Ophelia Parrish is vacated. Whatever the decision, the closing of the school will mark the end of an era—more than 110 years of University-owned demonstration school teaching.

First principal

Rothschild organized school

Dean Emeritus P. O. Selby has prepared a biography of his life-long friend, Felix Rothschild, who served as the first principal of the Ophelia Parrish Junior High School. Rothschild was instrumental in implementing many of the ideas and methods that marked the teacher education program at the model schools and Northeast Missouri State. Following are some remembrances of Rothschild as excerpted from Dr. Selby's biography.

Felix Rothschild was born Jan. 27, 1889, at Fairfield, Iowa, where his father, Ferdinand Rothschild, was in business. The family came to Kirksville about 1903, and Felix entered Kirksville High School.

The Rothschilds lived less than two blocks from the Selbys, so Felix and I became neighbors as well as friends.

Felix enjoyed cooking, and some years later he was locally famous for his ravioli and his ham. He baked whole hams which were treated with cloves and syrup. But one afternoon when we were in high school he invited me to go home with him because he had just read how you could make candy in a paper sack. He built a fire in the cook stove and concocted a mixture of sugar, chocolate and water. He poured the mixture into a paper sack and set it on the stove where it burst without any coaxing and made quite a conglomeration on the top of the stove. This ended paper sack cooking for Felix and me.

Felix's salary at Kirksville Senior High his first year, 1912-13, was \$50 a month for nine months. For his second year, he was raised to \$55 monthly, which was \$5 more than other high school teachers were paid, but the extra \$5 was for coaching football and baseball.

He spent his summers in graduate schools—Wisconsin and Columbia universities. He received a master's degree in 1929 at Columbia University.

In 1920 there was something of an upheaval in the Kirksville public schools, and John R. Kirk, president of the Teachers College, asked Felix to join the college faculty (Normal School, 1867-1919; Teachers College, 1919-1967) and head the practice teaching facilities. The college had an elementary school for practitioners but had no facilities for practice teaching above the eighth grade. A start was made by establishing a ninth grade, and by 1923 the elementary school was abolished and a junior high school established to contain all of Kirksville's seventh, eighth and ninth graders with Felix as the principal. A new building had been erected which was afterwards enlarged. It was named the Ophelia Parrish School in honor of Miss Ophelia Parrish, who had served in the Model School as well as being the head librarian many years.

The junior high school which Felix organized was unique in that he provided for a great many student activities. He instituted a student council and gave it some authority. To stop the disturbance in the halls when classes moved, he established a system of hall patrolmen or monitors who worked to keep down any boisterousness. There were clubs for every purpose; there were home rooms with officers. Pupils took pride in holding offices and doing things which in many high schools are done and done poorly by teachers.

The word of what Kirksville Junior High School was doing in the way of student government spread around, and many visitors came to the school and some of them went back home to institute schools like Kirksville Junior High School.

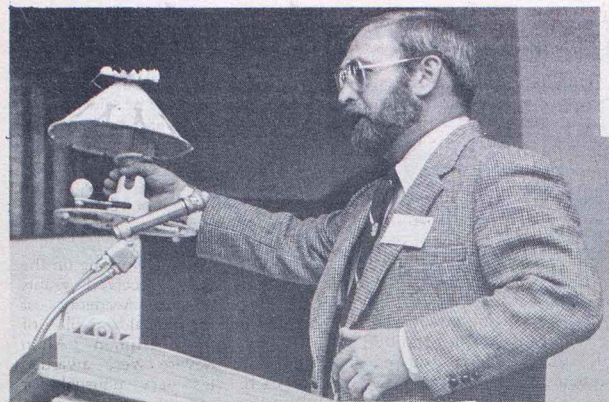
There is an oil painting of Felix hanging in the hall in the junior high school. Funds for this painting were raised by the school faculty.

An upheaval occurred in the Kirksville Board of Education in 1954 or thereabouts. The Board proposed to take over the financing and control of the junior high school to the exclusion of the Teachers College. The net result of this movement was that Rothschild became the director of practice teaching at the secondary level; all of the schools in Kirksville were open to practice teachers (only Ophelia Parrish and Greenwood had been). The Teachers College sought openings for practice teachers in many places in northeast Missouri, in St. Louis County, and in southern Iowa.

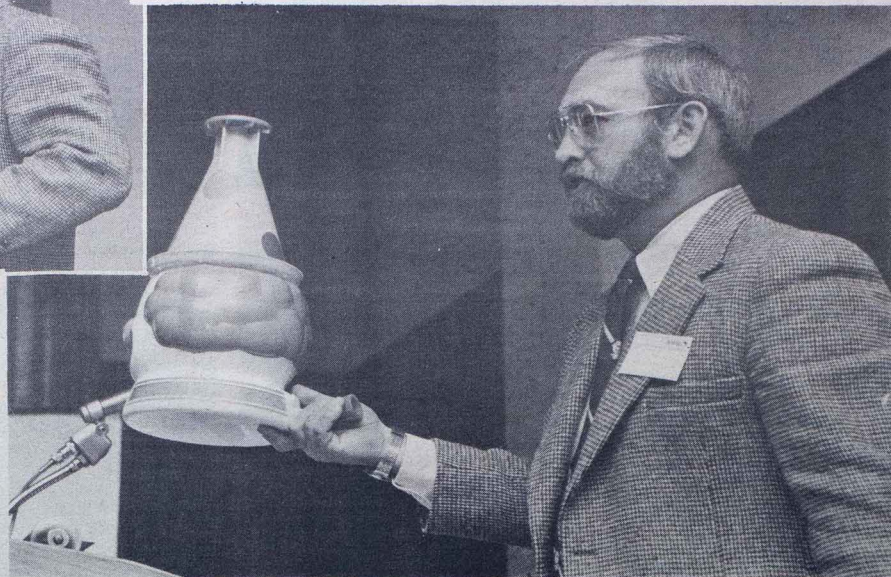
Also, each division of instruction in the college was to have a supervisor of practice teaching. Rothschild helped to get the new plan on its feet, but thereafter he withdrew to the field of special education, which he had studied in graduate school. While he was still head of Ophelia Parrish Junior High School, he had established special classes for retarded boys and girls.

Felix married Clara Kahn, a Kirksville girl. They established their home at 408 E. Jefferson Street. They had two children, who were twins. When they were born, the youngsters at the junior high school asked to be allowed to name the twins, and they gave the names Billy and Bob.

Rothschild's death came suddenly. During the evening of July 10, 1967, Joe Burdman and his wife went by and asked Felix and his wife, Clara, to go for a ride, and they agreed and got into the back seat. They had not gone very far 'till Felix slumped over with a heart seizure. Burdman headed for Grim-Smith Hospital, but an examining doctor said that Felix was gone. He was buried in Maple Hills Cemetery where he was joined by his wife and his sister, Mrs. Minnie Meyer, only a few years later.

Wham-O V.P. Values NMSU Education

"The value (of my education at NMSU) was the fact that my mind was opened up and I was trained to learn here," reflected Robert P. Gardner (B.S. 1959) during a day of programs he presented as the Executive-in-Residence for the Business Division in February.

Gardner, vice president of sales and marketing for Wham-O Manufacturing Company, San Gabriel, Calif., gave programs on marketing products, sales careers and the importance of promoting and marketing oneself. He said it is tragic when a student spends four years in an institution of higher learning and is unable to market his qualifications.

The Alumni Room of the Student Union Building was filled to capacity for each of the three programs presented by Gardner. "I was very im-

pressed with the students today. It was the most attentive audience I've ever dealt with," he said.

His position at Wham-O has given Gardner the opportunity to conduct several seminars at the graduate schools of business at Long Beach State University (Calif.) and the University of California-Los Angeles. He has been included in "Who's Who in the West" and "Who's Who in American Business." His professional affiliations include the American Management Association, Sales and Marketing Executives International, and Toy Manufacturers International. In 1974, he published a book titled "Moving Ahead."

Gardner enjoys his job. Wham-O is one of the most studied companies in marketing classrooms, he pointed out, because of its successes with products such as the Fun Fountain, Hooola Hoop

and Frisbee disk. "It's a very unusual company, an exciting place to work... and a fun place to work."

Returning to the Northeast campus, Gardner said the biggest changes appear in the facilities. Since his graduation from Northeast Missouri State Teachers College in 1959, he has visited many universities, but, "I've never seen any (campus) that had better facilities—maybe more facilities—but not any better."

He also noted many changes in the Business Division. When Gardner was a student, less than 10 percent of the business majors were seeking Bachelor of Science degrees; most were seeking education degrees. At present less than 30 percent of the students majoring in business elect a teaching degree.

Gardner has not always been so successful in marketing products and himself. While a student at NMSU, he

was a candidate in the 1957 Student Senate president elections where he, a member of Phi Sigma Epsilon fraternity, ran against Alpha Kappa Lambda candidate Ralph Gotto (B.A. 1958) and Sigma Tau Gamma candidate Elmo Oestrich (B.S. 1958). "I came in second out of the three," he said, pointing out that he was thrilled not to have come in last.

Gardner's wife, Jane Couch Gardner, also attended Northeast. She was a member of Sigma Sigma Sorority and the Kitty Kats singing club. Jane eventually received her degree in art history from Long Beach State. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Junior Couch, still reside in Kirksville.

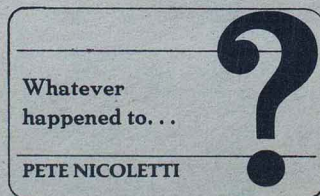
Gardner said he hopes students realize what Northeast can give them. "This is a terrific school. They (the students) have a heck of an education, and they shouldn't forget it."

Legendary 'miser' generous to others

Business manager from 1954-1975, Pete Nicoletti is remembered by many former students as the man who made sure that every penny owed to the University was fully paid before a diploma was awarded. Pete has a look that could make a collection agent shudder and could "get blood out of a turnip."

But Pete's eye for the dollar and penny-pinching ways helped steer the financial course of the University along a sound path during a time when student enrollment expanded four-fold and more than a dozen major building projects were completed.

Pete developed the budget, helped President Walter Ryle present it to the legislature and made sure the appropriations were wisely spent. Recalling testimony before the appropria-



tions committee is a favorite pastime of Pete's.

Since retirement he has become involved in most of the important volunteer groups in Kirksville. He is manager of the Northeast Missouri Credit Union, secretary of Rotary Club, chairman of the Area Agency on the Aging, chairman of the City Committee on Senior Citizens and a class of 1930 coordinator for last year's homecoming.

"When I retired, I knew I would have to keep busy. I'd go crazy sitting around," he said.

What about looking back at his reputation with the students as the tough guy collecting the dough? Pete is philosophical.

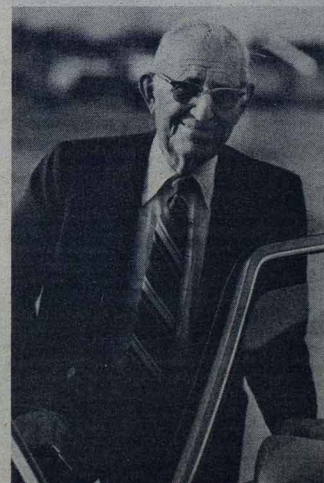
"Anybody in collections is going to make a few enemies," he says.

But what the "enemies" might not know is that Pete makes more visits to the hospital than most of the ministers in town, nine in one recent day.

"He would do anything for you," a friend says.

Besides his volunteer work, Pete and his wife, Margaret, enjoy gardening and church activities plus visits from grandsons, including one who is now a student at Northeast.

"We're getting along fine... just fine," he concluded.

Science professors, students study endangered turtles

Clark County, in the extreme northeast corner of Missouri, may be known for its deer hunting, raccoon trapping and fishing spots, but not many people know it is a good place to find turtles.

Working from a research grant awarded by the Missouri Department of Conservation, two University professors from the Science Division and several NMSU students are conducting

studies on two turtle species listed as endangered.

Both the Blanding's and the Illinois Mud turtles have been found to reside in Clark County near ponds and in marshy areas. Two years ago, Donald Kangas, associate professor of zoology, began his study on the mud turtles. While trapping for his project, he discovered the Blanding's turtle, thus

prompting Chris Kofron, assistant professor of zoology, to begin a one-year study on that species. Previously, Blanding's turtle was thought to be extinct in Missouri.

Kofron, Kangas and student assistants travel each weekend to the site in Clark County where the turtles are located. Feeding habits, reproductive processes and distribution of the turtles are of particular interest to the researchers, Kofron said.

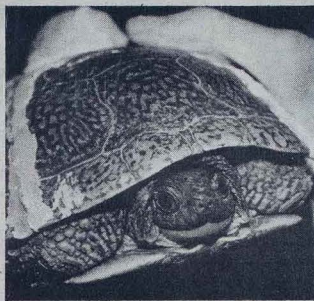
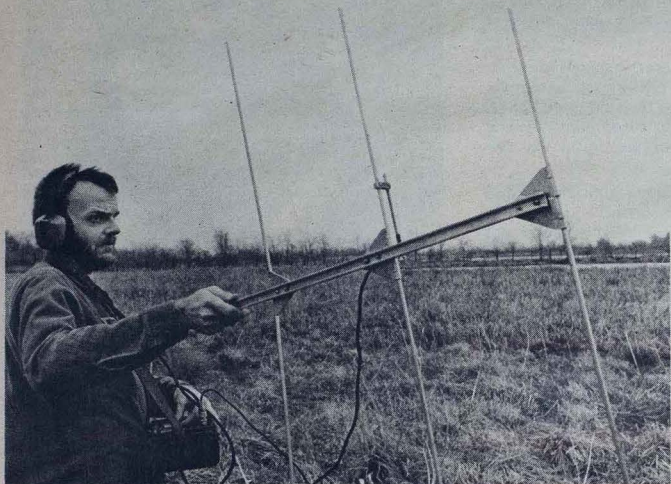
Since little is known about either of the turtles, "we are making a contribution to the knowledge of an endangered organism," Kangas said. This contribution may prove important in relation to changes in the environment.

It could potentially make a "meaningful statement to mankind," he said.

The research will also be beneficial to those students who are assisting, Kofron said. "These students are getting good preparation for graduate school. . . . In addition, two students will be authors in the publication (on the studies)."

Two of the students working on the Blanding's research received grants from the Missouri Academy of Science. Junior Donald Noll of Kirksville and freshman Allan Schreiber of Revere were awarded \$100 each. "It's very unusual for undergraduates to get grants," Kofron said.

Both professors, along with their assistants, plan to camp at the site throughout the summer. Clark County will probably always be known for its hunting, trapping and fishing, but when Kofron and Kangas document their research this fall, the area may also become renowned for its turtles.

While attending NMSU, Ballenger and Richmond were active in many musical activities. Ballenger, who graduated in 1980 with a master's degree in music, considers the jazz festival a highly organized event. He complimented everyone who was connected with the festival.

The jazz festival, which is sponsored by the NMSU Fine Arts Division and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, a professional music fraternity for men, allows junior and senior high school bands from Illinois, Missouri and Iowa to compete in seven different classes of competition.

Each year at an evening concert a special guest artist is featured along with the NMSU Jazz Ensemble, the NMSU Jazz Lab Band and the first place bands. This year Steve Stewart, the first trombonist for the big band "Groove" in Des Moines, Iowa, was the guest artist.

Bulldogs put together rags-to-riches season finish

The 1980-81 NMSU men's basketball season was supposed to be an exercise in recovery, but it turned out to be a rags-to-riches story.

Willard Sims' reconstructed Bulldogs started the campaign last November with only three returning players, hoping to rebound from a disappointing and frustrating 1979-80 season that saw them tumble to the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association cellar.

But even the most optimistic NMSU booster could not prophesy what transpired. After a 4-7 start against some of the toughest non-conference opposition they had faced in the 10 years of Sims' coaching tenure, the Bulldogs reeled off 15 wins in their last 19 games to finish with a 19-11 overall record and the championship of the first MIAA Post-Season Tournament ever held.

Northeast finished the regular conference schedule in fourth place, a rung higher on the ladder than the MIAA conferences had predicted in their pre-season poll. The Bulldogs raced past Northwest Missouri State, 85-73, in the first round of the tournament and then amazed league observers by upsetting the MIAA co-champions, Central Missouri State, 71-66, and Lincoln University, 81-65, both on the road. The win over Lincoln in the tournament finals was the Bulldogs' first one ever on the Blue Tiger home floor and insured the team of a bid to the NCAA Division II South Central Regional at Florence, Ala.

Rewrites record books

Winslow leads by example

Almost every outstanding basketball team has one player who serves as leader. Sometimes this player is a playmaking guard who passes the ball around enough to keep all the scorers happy. Other times this player is a do-it-all star who carries the team solely on the strength of his individual talents.

In a few cases, however, this player leads by example—his own nearly flawless performance inspiring other team members to perform to the best of their abilities. In senior forward David Winslow (East St. Louis, Ill.-Public), the Northeast Missouri State Bulldogs had one of these leaders.

Perhaps the most consistently outstanding player ever to wear the Bulldog uniform, Winslow finished his final season as the all-time NMSU scoring and rebounding leader. Yet, he did not even lead the team in scoring during the 1980-81 campaign. When Winslow was named the recipient of several post-season awards, it was often in recognition of his value to the team rather than for his individual statistics.

Winslow was selected to the Basketball Weekly Division II All-America third team and the National Association of Basketball Coaches Division II All-America honorable mention team. In addition, he was chosen to the NABC South Central Region first unit.

The 6-6 forward completed his career this past season with 479 points for a 16.5 average and 319 rebounds for an 11.0 average to become NMSU's all-time pace-setter in both categories. His four-year scoring total was 1,447 points, and his rebounding total was 996.

Winslow also shattered another school record, most career field goals, with 610.

He was recently selected to the all-Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association first team for the second consecutive year.

Winslow, younger brother of San Diego football tight-end Kellen Winslow, was also one of the top defensive big men in the conference, Coach Willard Sims said. He led the team in blocked shots during the past campaign with 24 rejections, was second in steals with 56 and third in assists with 51.

He rarely came out of a game for a breather, averaging 37 minutes per outing. In his NMSU finale against North Alabama, Winslow tied the school record by playing in his 106th career contest.

Prior to the season, Sims had said the Bulldogs "must have another good year out of David to be a success." The team's success can only be seen as a reflection of the type of year he had. David Winslow will be very difficult to replace.

Second-seeded NMSU edged third-seeded Jacksonville (Ala.), 82-78, in the opening round. However, top-seeded North Alabama, the host team, turned back the Bulldogs, 63-59, for the regional championship.

"I told our players after the championship game they had nothing in the world to be ashamed of because we were beaten by a class team," Sims said about North Alabama, which won the national title two years ago.

The Dogs were involved in close decisions all season. Twenty-one of their 30 games were decided by margins under 10 points, and they won 11 of those encounters. They were victorious in a pair of double overtime games and lost two single overtime verdicts.

"I think playing so many close games helped us late in the season," the coach said. "We gained confidence and seemed to have the right chemistry this year. The newcomers blended with our returning personnel much quicker than I expected."

Sims was selected as Division II South Central Regional Coach of the Year in March. He said the team played about as well on the road as it did in the confines of Pershing Arena. Northeast was 11-5 in Kirksville and 8-6 away from home.

Two senior forwards, 6-6 David Winslow (East St. Louis, Ill.-Public) and 6-4 Kent Hackmack (Hannibal), and 6-4 junior forward Chris Carlson (Evergreen Park, Ill.) were the only holdovers from the 1979-80 team.

Winslow completed a brilliant career with a sparkling 1980-81 campaign. He tossed in 479 points for a 16.5 average and collared 319 rebounds for an 11.0 average to push his career totals in the two categories to 1,447 points and 996 rebounds, both all-time Bulldog records.

Hackmack, hampered by bad knees throughout his career, charted his best college campaign this winter. He averaged 8.7 points and 4.0 rebounds and was selected to the honorable mention all-conference team. Although his knees caused him a great deal of pain, Hackmack averaged 26 minutes in 27 games this past season.

Sims said Carlson, another all-league honorable mention choice, performed well as a top reserve, finishing the campaign with a 4.4 scoring average and 2.9 rebounding figure.

Newcomers who made smooth transitions to the Bulldog uniform included 6-1 junior guard Leroy Carter (Maywood, Ill.-Proviso East), 6-6 junior forward Johnnie Wesley (Chicago, Ill.-Manley), 6-0 sophomore guard Gary Bussard (Olney, Ill.-East Richland) and 6-1 freshman guard Mark Campbell (Collinsville, Ill.).

Carter landed on the all-MIAA second team and the South Central Regional all-Tournament list. The lightning quick backliner led the club in assists with 142 (4.7 average), steals with 81 and was third in scoring with a 16.0 average. Carter transferred to NMSU last fall from Triton (Ill.) College.

Wesley, a teammate of Carter's at Triton, came on strong the last half of the season to pace the Dogs in scoring with a 17.3 average. He pumped in 520 points to break Winslow's single season record of 512 points, set a year ago. Wesley also tied the school mark of 16 field goals in a single game and led the starters' field goal percentage with .531 and in free-throw accuracy with .723. He was selected to the honorable mention all-conference team.

Bussard, whose older brother, Terry, owned the NMSU career scoring record until Winslow smashed it this season, transferred last fall from Southeastern (Iowa) Community College. He averaged 4.7 points, performing the playmaking role for the Dogs.

Campbell logged considerable time as a freshman reserve, scoring at a 5.6 pace and finishing second on the team in the assist category with a 2.9 average. He was also an all-MIAA honorable mention pick.

What are Sims' primary recruiting objectives?

"We need to find replacements for Winslow and Hackmack, of course," he replied. "Hopefully, we can recruit a freshman and two junior college prospects for positions on the frontline. They should be physical, quick and jump well."

And last, but not least, they must be team-type players, the same kind that developed into a cohesive unit this past season and helped NMSU fans forget the frustrations of the 1979-80 campaign.

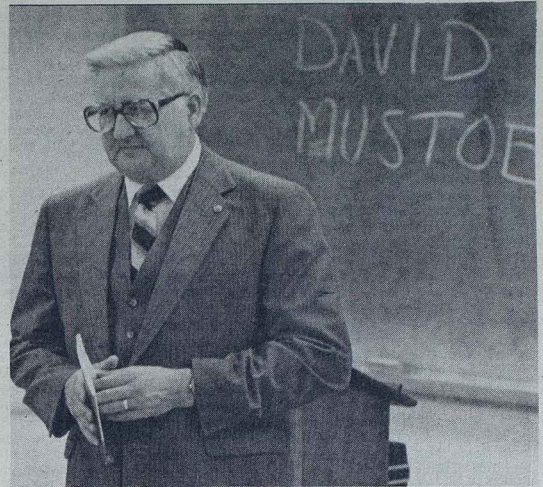

Old 'Dogs can still play, old coach can still coach

When the taskmaster whistled, the old dogs came running.

Wes Remington (Bulldog under Maurice "Red" Wade) flew in from an out-of-state business trip. Jim Scanlan (B.S.E. 1959, M.A. 1961) and Ray Eickmeyer (B.S.E. 1960, M.A. 1964) drove up from Washington, Mo. Whole car loads from Kansas City and St. Louis were here. On Monday of that week, George Anastasoff (B.S.E. 1956, B.S. 1957) gave up smoking to "get into shape," and Sharyl Mogg

Mills (B.S.E. 1959) told her husband, Paley, he was crazy for even considering the idea.

It was the first Varsity vs. Alumni spring football game at NMSU. Sixty-five former players from the "Red" Wade, Marv Braden, Russ Sloan, Randy Lukehart, Ron Taylor and Bruce Craddock eras came to play. Thirty-five others, plus families, were in Kirksville to cheer or referee (at times there was little difference between the two).

Before the game, "Red" said, "Boys, we want to have a lot of fun. . . . I don't

The alums had gathered before the game to learn Wade's famous three-play offense. "I've been thinking about this for a long time, and I want to keep it simple," he told his assistants.

By Saturday afternoon game time, even Paul Comer (B.S. 1968) knew what to do.

During the game there was perhaps more passing than in most football games "Red" turned the offense over to former Bulldog quarterback Jack Ball

(B.S.E., M.A. 1964), and touchdown passes from Steve Rampy (B.S.E. 1980) and Tom Geredine (B.S. 1975) gave the alumni a 13-7 halftime lead.

Sensing potential embarrassment, the varsity got untracked in the second half. They held the alums scoreless and converted a touchdown and extra point into a 14-13 win.

But the score was of little importance. Friendships were renewed and strengthened as teammates once again donned the purple and white to defend the honor of their team, coach and alma mater. It was a great day.



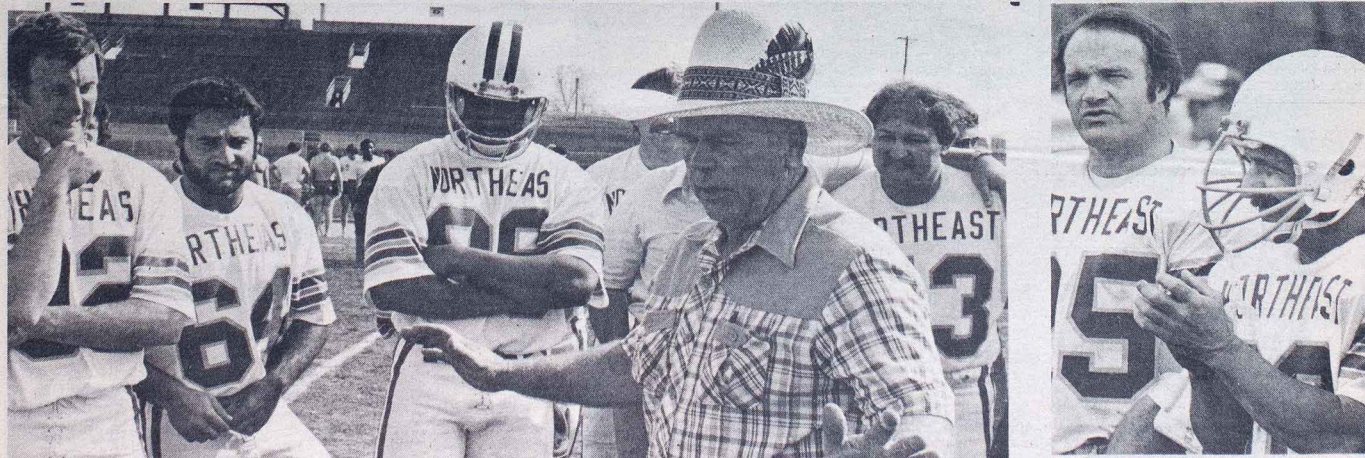
(ABOVE) Coach "Red" Wade explains the three-play offense to the alumni team.

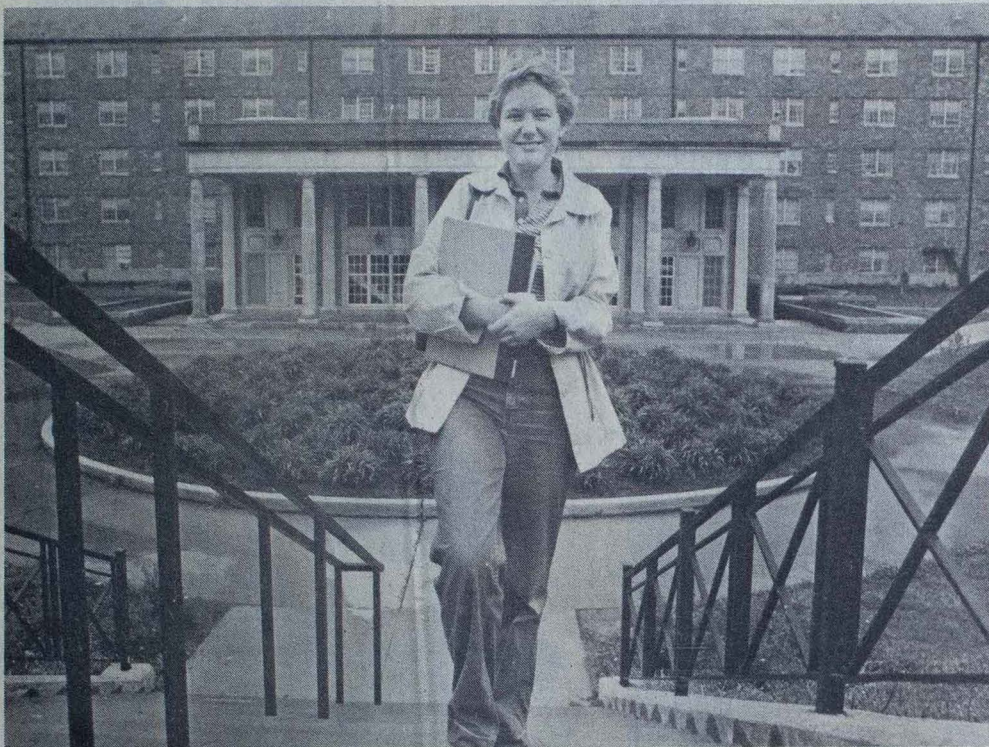

Sophomore wins scholarship Given in honor of Truman

Kay Rehfuss had to pull out a map and show the Truman Scholarship Committee where Kirksville and Northeast Missouri State University are located. But after the geography lesson and her interview, the committee knew they had a gem of a candidate from a fine university.

Kay was chosen as the Truman Scholar from the state of Kentucky by the Board of Trustees of the Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation, the congressionally authorized federal memorial to President Truman.

The scholarship carries an annual award of up to \$5,000. It is renewable for the senior year plus two years of post-graduate work. There is one recipient from each state, plus some chosen at large.

Kay is a sophomore at NMSU majoring in business and interpersonal communication. She is a graduate of Tates Creek High School in Lexington, Ky., and came to Northeast two years ago as a Pershing Scholarship recipient. She is planning a career in criminal law.

"I'm happy with Northeast. It seems like the real world," Kay says. "Here the relationship between the faculty and students is great. The classes are small, and this is important to me."

What does winning the Truman Scholarship mean to NMSU and Kay? One faculty member at a large university said, when a student from that school was selected, "It's like winning a bowl game. There is no question that this is the most prestigious undergraduate scholarship."

Kay has won a bowl game for herself and Northeast and thus joins other winners from schools such as Harvard, Dartmouth and Yale.
