THE BOARD OF REGENTS of Northeast Missouri State University will hold its regular monthly meeting at 10:30 a.m. Thursday in the President's Office/Board Room in the Administration/Humanities Building.

THE 1000 HILLS SUMMER CONCERTS will feature the High School Band Camp and the High School Choral Camp at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Baldwin Auditorium. The Band Camp will be conducted by Col. Arnard D. Gabriel, who leads the United States Air Force Band and Orchestra in Washington, D.C. The Choral Camp will be conducted by Paul Salamunovich, assistant professor of music at Loyola-Marymount University and Mount Saint Mary's College in Los Angeles. Also on Friday, the Junior High and High School String Camp will have a chamber concert at 1 p.m. and a string orchestra performance at 3 p.m. in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building.
