# Faculty/Staff Campaign Sets Record

Northeast's annual faculty/staff Development Fund campaign recently concluded with \$23,878 raised from 195 University employees. The totals surpassed last year's records of \$14,110 from 134 faculty and staff members.

Gifts were directed to a variety of funds including: divisions, athletics, scholarships and KBIA Radio. Addi-

tionally, many contributions were unrestricted allowing the money to be used where the needs are greatest. However, the largest segment of gifts, \$9,447, was contributed on behalf of the Charles J. McClain Scholarship.

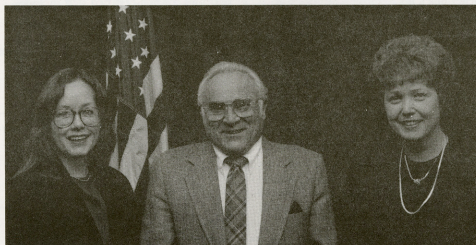

# Tel-Alumni Sets \$115,000 Goal

The tenth annual Tel-Alumni campaign is scheduled for Jan. 21 through Feb. 22. Tel-Alumni is a phone-a-thon to raise private support for the NMSU Development Fund; the event is organized by the Alumni/Development Office and Student Senate. This year's goal of \$115,000 is \$10,000 more than last year's goal.

Approximately 450 faculty, staff and student volunteers will attempt to contact more than 14,000 alumni across the country. The campaign ranks as one of the largest philanthropic activities in northeast Missouri.

Calling will be segmented by academic division. Thirty phones, located in the Student Union Building Rooms 2 and 3, will be used each evening, Sunday through Thursday from 6:15 to 9:15 p.m. Volunteers will be given a complimentary meal, soft drinks while calling, nightly prizes and after completing three hours of service a three-minute phone call anywhere in the nation.

Proceeds from Tel-Alumni are placed in the NMSU Development Fund, an agency of the University, which

receives, manages and distributes all private financial support given to NMSU. Assets of the Fund are invested and the resulting interest income provides funding for scholarships, student loans, instructional support and other projects, supplementing state funding. For the year ending June 30, 1989, more than \$68,000 in scholarships and nearly \$250,000 in loans were awarded. Since 1980, the NMSU Development Fund has grown steadily and now stands at \$2.8 million.

In addition to raising money, Tel-Alumni serves as a valuable source of information to the Alumni Office, providing updates on alumni addresses, phone numbers, careers and personal news.

## Lyceum Features Wind Quintet

The Lyceum Series will present the Webster Wind Quintet in concert at 8 p.m., Jan. 22, in Baldwin Auditorium. Free tickets for students, faculty and staff will be available beginning Jan. 17 in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB.

The Webster Wind Quintet was started in 1981 by Jan Gippo. The members were to be artists-in-residence and be the only on-going chamber group in the St. Louis area to be dedicated to wind music performance. All the members of the Quintet are in the Saint Louis Symphony and on the faculty of Webster University.

In 1983, Gippo started the Webster Chamber Players. This group also performs wind music, but is augmented by strings and other instruments the music might require.

The quintet presently consists of Robert Coleman, clarinet; Jan Gippo, flute; Roger Kaza, French horn; Robert Mottl, bassoon; and Thomas Parkes, oboe.

Coleman, a native St. Louisan, joined the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra in 1960 and currently serves as assistant principal clarinet. Prior to this appointment, he attended the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, N.Y.

Gippo holds a bachelor's degree and master's degree in applied flute and wind ensemble, conducting, from the New England Conservatory in Boston. He is one of the founders and a former president of the St. Louis Flute Society.

Kaza joined the Saint Louis Symphony horn section in 1983, having played previously with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra, Boston Symphony and the Boston Pops where he was principal horn. He attended Portland State University, and later transferred to the New England Conservatory.

Mottl received his Bachelor of Music Education degree and master's in woodwinds at Indiana University. He is in his 14th season with the Saint Louis Symphony Orchestra as assistant principal bassoonist.

Parkes earned a Bachelor of Music degree from the Manhattan School of Music in New York City.

## Warren Selected For C-SPAN Seminar

Helen Warren, assistant professor of language and literature, has been selected to attend C-SPAN's Winter 1990 Seminar for Professors, Jan. 15-16, in Washington, D.C.

Warren is one of 33 college and university instructors selected through a competitive process. All 1,800 college-level members of C-SPAN in the Classroom, the cable television network's free national membership organization for educators, were invited to apply.

C-SPAN in the Classroom is the network's free educational service which was created to assist teachers who use C-SPAN's programming as a teaching tool. All C-SPAN programming is available free to schools to use as a teaching resource.

The seminar, C-SPAN's fifth professor conference since 1987, focuses on issues relating to educational uses of C-SPAN's public affairs programs.

In addition to professional roundtable discussions and workshops, Warren will participate in a live, nationally televised viewer call-in program.
