COMPETITION WILL BE KEEN for approximately 2,700 high school students from 70 Missouri and Iowa high schools who will be competing in this year's Northeast Missouri High School Academic Festival to be held Tuesday on campus. Fifty-one Academic Festival Scholarships will be awarded to students demonstrating outstanding ability in seven academic areas including business education; health, physical education and recreation; home economics; language and literature; mathematics; science; and social science. A hospitality suite and contest headquarters will be located in the Quiet Lounge of the Student Union Building.
