## Cable Named to CoSIDA Board



William Cable, sports information director, has been elected to the 15-member board of directors of the College Sports Information Directors of America

(CoSIDA). The Board consists of six executive officers, two at-large members, four college representatives and three past presidents. Cable will serve a three-year term as the College Division Representative for the Central Region. He replaces George Ellis of North Dakota State University-Fargo. CoSIDA has approximately 1,600 members.

Cable was elected as a college division representative after being recommended by the nominations committee at the 1990 CoSIDA National Workshop last week in Houston. This year, Northeast received five awards for publications work for NCAA Division II schools at the CoSIDA workshop: a first place award for the best cover design, which appeared on the men's and women's tennis press guide; second place

awards for the men's golf press guide, men's soccer press guide, and men's tennis press guide; and a third place for the football press guide.

Cable contributed to the creation and organization of the Sports Information Office at Northeast, and in 1972, he was named the first full-time director of sports information at the University. There are now 10 women's and 11 men's sports at Northeast. In 1988,

Cable was selected to the Citizens Savings-CoSIDA Hall of Fame.

This year's CoSIDA Workshop marked the 17th that Cable has attended since he joined the organization in 1971. He has worked on several committees, including the Future of CoSIDA, the Academic All-America Committee for Student-Athletes and workshop panels. Thirty-one of his athletic press guides have received CoSIDA awards.

**Jim Barnes**, professor of contemporary literature, gave a reading of his poetry at the Pompidou Centre of Contemporary Art, in Paris, France, June 13. He has had a translation from the *French of William Cliff* titled "For Breakfast We Had" accepted for publication in *Artful Dodge*, an Indiana literary magazine. His poem "The Ranch, Wild Horse Canyon, 1943" has been accepted for winter publication by the *New England Review*. He has been asked to give a reading of his work at the University of Kansas in November.

**Jim Thomas**, Ryle North College professor and professor of English, received word from the Council for International

Exchange of Scholars that he has been awarded a Fulbright for the upcoming year to teach at the University of Sophia in Bulgaria. Thomas was in Florence, Ore., at the time, attending the annual meeting of the Sports Literature Association where he presented a paper on Brautigan's *Troutfishing in America*. His book of poems, *Seed Time, Harvest Time*, will be forthcoming in July, published by Northeast's Thomas Jefferson University Press.

**David Parteneimer**, assistant professor of English, had his essay "Intelligence Oblige: The Educator's Responsibility" published in the *National Language Arts Yearbook*.
