TROMBONIST CARL FONTANA will be the featured soloist at the 10th Annual Phi Mu Alpha Jazz Festival to be held on campus Saturday. At 7:30 p.m. Fontana, a studio musician in Las Vegas, will perform in Baldwin Auditorium with winning high school bands and NMSU jazz ensembles. Competition for the high school bands will begin at 8 a.m. Saturday and continue throughout the day. Tickets for the contests and evening concert are \$2 per person and are on sale from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. today and tomorrow in the Student Union Building. Tickets are also available in the Fine Arts Division Office. The festival is sponsored by Phi Mu Alpha, an honorary professional music fraternity.

"CRISIS AND CHANGE" is the topic of the 21st Annual Baldwin Lecture scheduled for 6:30 p.m. Monday, Feb. 27, in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building. Dr. Henry Bamman, a 1946 NMSU graduate, will present this year's lecture. He is currently professor of education and director of reading at California State University-Sacramento. THE MAIAW WOMEN'S SWIMMING AND DIVING CHAMPIONSHIPS begin at 2 p.m. today in the Natatorium. Finals for Thursday are scheduled for 8 p.m. On Friday and Saturday the action gets underway at 11 a.m. with finals scheduled for 7 p.m. Approximately 96 participants from 10 teams are expected to attend the championships.

AN AESTHETIC EDUCATION/HUMANITIES AWARD of \$250 will be given to a graduate or undergraduate student currently enrolled at NMSU who demonstrates a keen interest in the general area of the humanities. The recipient must have a GPA of at least 3.0. To apply, a one-page autobiographical sketch should be submitted to Dr. Dale Jorgenson, head of the Division of Fine Arts, by March 20, 1978. The sketch should contain a description of: present major, recent creative activities and hobbies and other interests. This award is funded with royalties from books written by Dr. James Paulding, assistant professor of Humanities and Allied Arts, and Dr. Leon Karel, professor of Aesthetic Education and Humanities.
