MORE THAN 584 HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS have applied for the Gen. John J. Pershing Scholarships, Undergraduate Research Stipends and/or President's Honorary Scholarships for the 1984-85 academic year. One hundred eighty-nine of the 227 high school students who applied for Pershing Scholarships or stipends rank in the upper 90-99 percentile of their high school class. In 1983, only 207 high school students had applied for the Pershing or the stipend on the day after the published scholarship application deadline. The deadline for application was Feb. 15.
