THE FALL 1980 SCHEDULES will be distributed today on campus. Additional copies are available at the Public Relations Office, McKinney Center.

FINANCIAL AID applications for the summer and next year are now available in the Financial Aids Office, 100 Administration/Humanities Building. Summer application deadline is April 8, while fall application deadline is June 1. To be considered for the Missouri Grant, applications must be processed by the ACT or CSS Services by April 30. Also, work-study time cards are due the last working day of March. If they are not turned in to the Financial Aids Office by April 1, the student cannot be guaranteed a paycheck in April.

THE STUDENT SENATE, the Alumni Association and the Dean of Students Office are sponsoring the first annual Faculty/Staff/Student Service Recognition Award to be given to a teacher, staff member and student who demonstrate outstanding service outside of the classroom. Students may make nominations by picking up forms from the division and administrative offices. An alumni committee will select recipients. Nominations must be turned in to the Dean of Students Office, 204 Administration/Humanities Building, by Tuesday, April 15.

APPLICATIONS for the spring and summer sessions of the Washington Center for Learning Alternatives are now available in the Dean of Students Office, 204 Administration/Humanities Building. Sessions on "The 1980 Elections" and "Responsible News Reporting" will be held in late May. Applications are due in Washington by April 15. Sessions on "U.S. Foreign Policy" and "Business and Government in a Mixed Economy" will be held in late August. Applications for these sessions are due in Washington by May 9.

THE NORTHEAST MISSOURI VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE CONTEST (FFA) will be held on campus Tuesday. The program is sponsored by the agricultural program of NMSU. Approximately 650 students from 39 area high schools with chapters of the Future Farmers of America will compete in this event.

THE POLITICAL SCIENCE CLUB'S third and final mock presidential primary will be held Tuesday in Centennial Hall. Voting will be open to students eating the evening meal in that hall. In the second mock primary held in Ryle Hall, Jimmy Carter defeated Edward Kennedy by nearly a 5-1 margin on the Democratic ticket and Ronald Reagan defeated both George Bush and John Anderson by more than a 2-1 margin on the Republican side. A total of 173 students voted.

NORTHEAST NOTES

Ernie Cowles, Law Enforcement and Corrections, presented a paper entitled "Prison Discipline Problems and Prison Escape Problems: A Note of Caution on Mixing Oranges and Bananas" at the 25th Annual Southern Conference on Corrections February 29 in Tallahassee, Fla. The paper will be published in the Conference Proceedings.

Shirley Morahan, Language and Literature, and Robert Nothdurft, Science, are directing a series of events called "Einstein and the Eighties" April 23-30. The Missouri Committee for the Humanities has awarded a grant for the program which includes a traveling exhibit of photographs and manuscripts and a special 40 minute film. A panel of scholars will describe the continuing relevance of Einstein during a public meeting on April 28.

Heinz Woehlk, Language and Literature, presented a paper entitled "Beowulf and Roland, or Christians and Treasures" at the convention of the Missouri Philological Association on March 22 in Kansas City. He also has a short story, "The Gift," appearing in the current issue of *Amazing Science Fiction* magazine.

Joe Thomas, Business, served as chairman for a symposium entitled "Writing for the Academic Business Journal" which was presented at the Southwest Division, Academy of Management meeting March 20 in San Antonio, Texas.
