## Warren Named to AAC&U Board

Dr. Paula Brownlee, president of the Association of American Colleges & Universities\*, announced the election of President Russell G. Warren to the Association of American Colleges & Universities Board of Directors at their annual meeting which was held Jan. 22, in Washington, D.C.

"One of the strong characteristics we look for in our board members is the quality of leadership and development of their academic program on their campus," said Brownlee. "Russell Warren epitomizes that characteristic as he is quite well-known for his hard work and commitment to the academic program at Northeast as well as his previous work at James Madison University as the vice president for academic affairs."

According to Brownlee, the board also looks for members who are able to promote the mission of AAC&U, which is to strengthen and promote liberal education on all campuses.

"Russell Warren is certainly a strong and articulate voice for liberal education. Not only is he providing a voice nationwide, but he is currently providing the leadership with his colleagues to make that mission a reality on your own campus."

Warren will serve on the 15-member board, which meets three times a year, for two consecutive two-year terms. Some other members of the board include: Francis Lawrence, president of Rutgers University, Sara Castro-Klaren, professor at John Hopkins University, Melvin D. George, president

of St. Olaf College, and Frank F. Wong, vice president for academic affairs at the University of Redlands.

"It is a privilege to have the opportunity to work with, on a regular basis, some of the best academic minds in

the nation," said Warren. "Each member of this board is totally committed to finding ways to improve liberal arts instruction nationwide and Northeast will benefit from that exchange." □

*\*According to Brownlee, the board of directors voted at their recent meeting to officially change the name from the Association of American Colleges to the Association of American Colleges and Universities. "This change was made to express both the reality of our membership and the fact we believe in the promotion of liberal education on all campuses, not just those that have traditionally been thought of as offering the liberal arts education," said Brownlee.*

## Northeast Joins Liberal Arts Council

President Russell G. Warren has announced that Northeast has joined with nine of the nation's public colleges and universities to create a consortium—the Council of Public Liberal Arts Colleges (COPLAC)—to enhance the education of undergraduates in state-funded institutions of higher education. The announcement was made by Warren following a meeting of members of the consortium who met in conjunction with the 80th annual meeting of the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) in Washington, D.C.

In addition to Northeast, founding members of the consortium are The College of Charleston (SC), Evergreen State College (WA), Keene State College (NH), Mary Washington College (VA), Ramapo College (NJ), University of Maine at Farmington, University of Minnesota at Morris and University of North Carolina at Asheville. Additional members who meet the group's criteria are welcome.

"The mission of COPLAC is to make everyone aware that a

quality liberal arts and sciences program, often associated only with private schools, can be obtained at a public school, and even more importantly, at a public school price," said Warren.

Members of COPLAC tend to be small for public institutions, ranging in size from about 1,000 to 7,200 undergraduates. In addition to their strong liberal arts and sciences base, all members strive to involve students actively in learning and to integrate residential programs into the academic process. Its programs address such issues as development and refinement of liberal arts curriculum, strategies to promote active learning and to strengthen academic community, and methods to achieve maximum utility from limited state funding.

The council will meet annually on the campuses of member colleges. Their next meeting will be held in June at the College of Charleston. Northeast will host the council in 1996. In addition, group members will exchange information informally at national meetings such as AAC&U. □

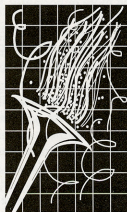

# Faculty and Staff Set New Record

With five months remaining in the 1993-94 faculty/staff campaign, Northeast faculty and staff have set a new record—a 31 percent increase in giving so far, compared to all of last year! 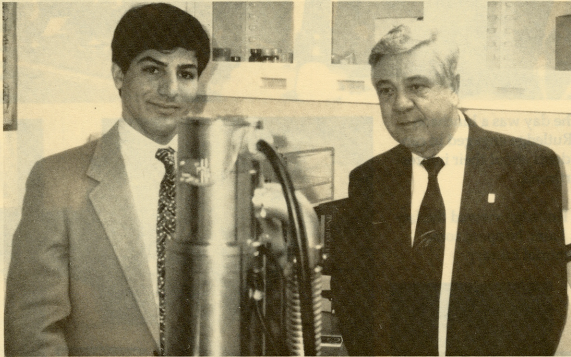

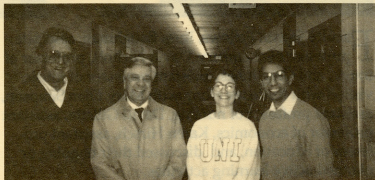
## Board of Governors President Larry Rutledge Visits Campus

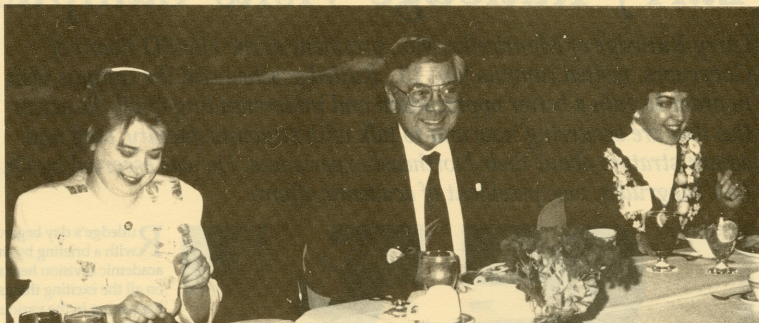

Next he visited Barnett Hall (below left & right) to see the new areas for the Communication Disorders and Nursing Departments.

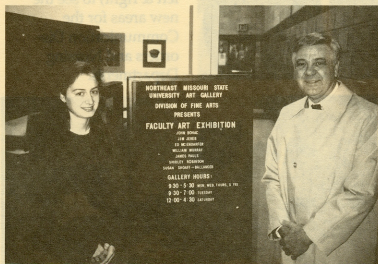
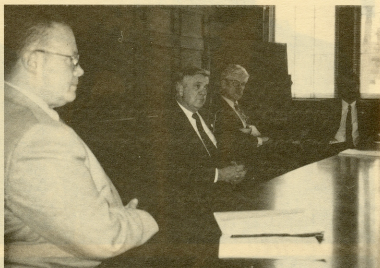
