THE PARKING LOT between the Administration/Humanities Building and the Student Union Building is now entirely reserved for staff and faculty (red stickers) only. No parking is allowed in the circle drive at any time. Other parking policies for the summer are as follows:

- *The front bay of the parking lot between the Security Office and Centennial Hall is for visitors only. The rest of the entire lot north of Centennial Hall is for commuting students (blue stickers) only.
- *Centennial Hall residents should park directly west of the hall on the gravel lot.
- *The area behind Centennial Hall at the entrance is a no-parking zone.
- *Red areas plainly marked for red-C stickers must be honored. No green stickers are to be parked in these areas. Violators will be ticketed.
- *No parking is allowed on the Mullenix access road except for delivery trucks when loading and unloading.
- *For the summer only, commuters (blue stickers) may park on the east side of campus in green sticker lots.

SUMMER RECREATIONAL SWIMMING for faculty, staff and students will be from 2-4 p.m. and 6-8 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. Saturdays at the Natatorium.
