NOTED PSYCHOLOGIST OF THE GIFTED, Dr. Harold C. Lyon Jr. will speak at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday in a community/university symposium in the Activities Room of the Student Union Building on "Discovering Our Potential for Excellence." In his address, Lyons will summarize and discuss the recent developments in the exploration of individual human potential. The licensed psychologist is presently the Abraham Maslow Professor at Antioch College, Columbia, Maryland, and Georgetown University and is also the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of American Excellence, a non-profit organization on behalf of human excellence initially created as the Foundation for Human Gifts with a grant from the Lipper Foundation. He also served as Director of Education for the Gifted and Talented in the Federal Government. The public is invited to attend.
