Health Seminars Held on Campus

The Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education will fund two one-day seminars for northeast Missouri K-12 teachers and allied health professionals June 25 and 26 on the Northeast campus.

The free seminars are designed to acquaint and assist the participants with health resources and implementation of Health Competencies and Key Skills into the curriculum. There is limited enrollment; anyone interested in participating should contact the Division of Health and Exercise Science at 785-4456.

The seminars will run from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. in Pickler Memorial Library.

The day will include several presentations and discussions. Lunch will be provided.

The seminar directors are Nettie Carpenter, guidance counselor at Ray Miller Elementary, and Sandy Elliott, coordinator of Health Services for Kirksville R-3 Schools. The seminar coordinator, Jane Bartling, instructor of health and exercise science, is the seminar coordinator.

Carpenter will present "Working a Key Skill into an Integrated Elementary Curriculum," and Elliott will present "Working a Key Skill into the Secondary Curriculum."

Also making presentations are Mary Sue McGinnis, health educator for the Bureau of Health Promotion for the Missouri State Health Department, and Charlie Hungerford, AIDS education supervisor for the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

McGinnis will present "Health curriculum, resources, support systems and grants," and Hungerford will present "AIDS in the Curriculum and Legal Issues."

A book signing with authors

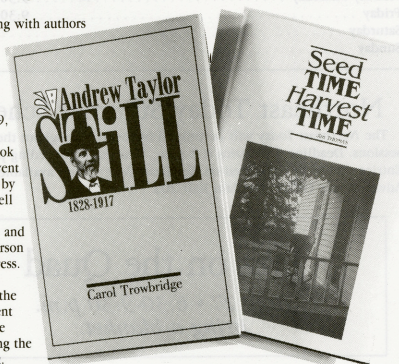

Board Passes Resolution Supporting SB 353

Northeast's Board of Governors became the first governing board of a state institution of higher education to vote its support of Senate Bill 353 at its meeting June 21.

Board Vice President Richard S. Pryor of Blue Springs, Mo., made the motion of support which received a second from James E. "Bud" Moulder of St. Louis. After a friendly amendment by Board member Thomas R. Shrout Jr. of St. Louis which included acknowledgment of the Governor's hand in the passage of the bill, the resolution passed unanimously.

The resolution of support for SB 353, which will appear on the November ballot as Proposition B, calls the legislative action "the best available opportunity to improve education in the state." It further "encourages faculty, staff, students, alumni, and friends of Northeast Missouri State University to support its approval."

If passed by the voters in the November general election, Proposition B will provide an estimated \$385 million for the support of higher, secondary, and elementary education, and job development.

Marlow Ediger, professor of education, has received notification that his biography will appear in *Who's Who in American Education*. His manuscript "The Professional Mathematics Teacher" was published in *The Middle School Journal*, Spring 1991 issue.

Jim Barnes, professor of comparative literature, will have his poetry published in *The National Geographic*, October 1991 issue. The featured poetry will be published in connection with a two-page photograph layout.

Seymour Patterson, associate professor of economics, co-authored an article titled "Trade and Welfare Under Variable Returns to Sale" which was published in the January-March 1990 issue of *The Indian Economic Journal*.

Patrick Ponzio, a freshman pre-med/biology major from Marshall, Wis., has been awarded a 1991 Philip Morris In-College Scholarship. Ponzio competed among a nation-wide pool of students whose parents are employees of Philip Morris Companies, Inc. or one of its operating companies; his father is employed with Oscar Mayer Foods Corp. Ponzio was evaluated on academic achievements, teacher recommendations, range of interests and personal statements.

Charles Leland, a junior chemistry major from Perryville, Ohio, has been chosen the recipient of the 1991 American Cancer Society Summer Research Fellowship Award. The \$500 Fellowship is awarded to encourage students to pursue knowledge in the field of cancer research. Leland will study the area of Anti-Neoplastic Pharmacophore. He is assisting Ken Fountain, professor of chemistry, with an on-going study of computer molecular modeling.
