Independence Day--Classes Dismissed, University Offices Closed

THE INDEPENDENCE DAY holiday will be taken Monday, July 4. All offices will be closed on the University campus. Classes will be dismissed on Monday scheduled to resume at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday. Northeast Today will not be distributed on Monday, but will return on its regular publication date on Wednesday.

SPECIAL HOLIDAY HOURS have been scheduled for the Student Union Snack Bar and Pickler Memorial Library. On Friday, July 1, the Snack Bar will close at 5 p.m. and will remain closed through Monday, July 4. The Snack Bar will resume regular hours on Tuesday, July 5.

The Library will also close at 5 p.m. on Friday, July 1. It will remain closed on Saturday and Sunday. Monday, July 4, hours will be from 6-10 p.m. Regular library hours will resume on Tuesday, July 5.

COMPREHENSIVE EXAMINATIONS for the M.A. candidates in education as well as in counseling and guidance will be Thursday and Friday. Majors in elementary education, elementary school administration, secondary school administration, and teaching of reading will take the exams from 1-5 p.m. Thursday in Violette Hall 265. Interested persons should sign up in the Education Division Office in Violette Hall 258. Counseling and guidance majors are scheduled for comps from 1-5 p.m. Friday in Violette Hall 251. Students should sign up with advisors and the Education Division Office.

THE PZAZZ DISCO DANCE will be at 8 p.m. Thursday on the mall by the Student Union Building. Disc jockey Emmett Vaughn of campus radio station KNEU will spin records for music.
