## Lyceum Program Features African Songs and Folk Tales



The St. Louis Black Repertory Company will present Charles Smith's *Takunda* at 8 p.m., March 1, in Baldwin Auditorium.

Free tickets for students, faculty and staff are available in the Student Activities Office, SUB, and at the door. The performance, which is an NMSU Lyceum Series presentation, has been partially funded by the Missouri Arts Council, a state agency.

The St. Louis Black Repertory Company (commonly referred to as the Black Rep) was originally scheduled to perform *Nobody Knows. Takunda* promises to be a successful substitution. This past October, the Midwest African American Theatre Alliance awarded the Black Rep "Best of Festival" honors in the "spoken word" category for the Company's production of *Takunda*.

*Takunda* is a moving celebration of the strength of the human spirit, from beautiful legends about the origins of the Earth to the grim realities of apartheid. The time is 1973. The place is a region of Southern Africa, then known as Rhodesia, now known as Zimbabwe. Told through songs and authentic Afri-

can folk tales, this is the story of an innocent 16-year-old girl struggling to come of age in a strange and often cruel world.

The Black Rep, which brought *Ain't Misbehavin'* to the NMSU stage in 1986, was founded in December 1976 by producing director Ron Hines. The Black Rep is the largest black performing arts company in Missouri. The company was founded to heighten cultural, social and educational awareness in the community and to provide opportunities for the community to participate in an ongoing arts program. As that community has expanded, so have the Company's programs.

The Rep now produces six main stage shows, maintaining a strong commitment to producing the works of black American and Third World writers. In addition, an extensive educational component produces more than four touring shows, workshops, residencies and a professional intern program.

## Tel-Alumni Raises \$117,552

The 1990 Tel-Alumni campaign ended last week setting a new record for money pledged and surpassing this year's goal of \$115,000. The annual Tel-Alumni phone-a-thon, which is organized by the Alumni/Development Office, raises private support for the NMSU Development Fund.

Assets of the Fund are invested and the resulting interest income provides funding for scholarships, student loans, instructional support and other projects, supplementing state funding. For the year ending June 30, 1989, more than \$68,000 in scholarships and nearly \$250,000 in loans were awarded.

## Women's Center Opens

Programming and a library to address women's issues are among the goals of Northeast's newly formed Women's Center. The Center has been approved on a trial basis this semester, and is located in the lower lounge area in Ryle Hall.

Other goals of the Center include offering counseling referral, establishing positive contacts with other universities' women's centers, establishing and operating self-help groups for students and providing a place for students to gather on an informal basis and discuss women's issues.

Programming for 1990 has already begun, with sessions examining discrimination and abuse. Upcoming programs and discussions will address topics as varied as black women in the 20th century, pornography and censorship from a feminist perspective, automechanics and women oppressing women. Books currently available in the Women's Center include *The Temple of My Familiar*, *In A Different Voice*, *The Politics of Reality and Breathing Lessons*.

## Goldwater Nominees Selected

Northeast sophomores Tony Ballmann and David Semon have been nominated by the University as candidates in the Goldwater Scholarship competition.

Ballman, a biology major, intends to pursue a career in molecular biology or molecular genetics and cellular biology. Semon, a physics major, wants to pursue graduate work in astronomy.

The Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship and Excellence in Education Program was established in 1986 to pay tribute to the leadership, courage and vision of Sen. Goldwater. It is an endowed recognition

designed to foster and encourage excellence in science and mathematics. Awards are made on the basis of merit to students who intend to pursue careers in mathematics and the natural sciences.

One Barry M. Goldwater Scholar is chosen from each of the 53 U.S. jurisdictions. The scholarship covers eligible expenses for tuition, fees, books and room and board, up to a maximum of \$7,000 annually. Scholarship recipients will be eligible for two years of support.

Ballmann and Semon will be notified of their status in the Program this May.
