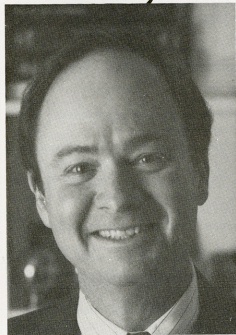


Zemsky to Deliver Baldwin Lecture



The thirty-second Joseph Baldwin Lecture and Recognition Banquet will be held at 6:30 p.m., March 16, in the SUB Georgian Room.

Robert Zemsky, founding director of the University of Pennsylvania's Institute for Research on Higher Education, will deliver the address on how we re-establish the coherence of a baccalaureate education in an increasingly heterogeneous society.

Established in 1980, the Institute for Research on Higher Education plays a

major role in national policy studies, analysis and consultation. Zemsky heads the Higher Education Research Program, sponsored by The Pew Charitable Trusts. He is co-editor of the program's publication, *Policy Perspectives*.

Since 1986, Zemsky has directed the development of a prototype undergraduate coursework database, drawing on transcripts submitted by a nationally representative sample of 35 institutions. Sponsored by the Association of American Colleges, Zemsky's work provides the first empirical basis for conclusions about the "real curriculum," including what courses are taken and in what combination, with what success and by which groups of students.

Zemsky holds a bachelor's degree from Whittier College and a doctorate from Yale University. He is a trustee of Franklin and Marshall College, a Woodrow Wilson Fellow, a recipient of a post-doctoral fellowship from the Social Science Research Council, and has held visiting appointments at Johns Hopkins University and the University of Michigan.

At Penn, Zemsky has served as chief planning officer since 1981. He is also a former master of Hill College House.

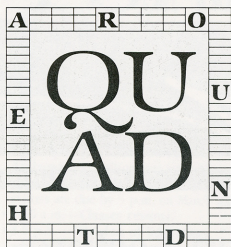
Lyceum Presents Ballet

Conference Presents Linguistics Redefined

Scholars from the United States and abroad will convene on the NMSU campus March 18-20 to present lectures at the first Linguistics Redefined Conference. For further information about the conference, contact Hayley Davis, assistant to the professor of Ryle Hall North Residential College, at 785-5766.

The conference, sponsored by Ryle Hall North Residential College with assistance from Missouri Hall North and Ryle Hall South residential colleges, is the brainchild of Davis. She thought of the idea and is coordinating the event. She said it will cover language as well as other disciplines such as literature and rhetoric.

"The conference's purpose is to show that language is not necessarily autonomous like many traditional linguists think," Davis said. "This is why we are calling it a linguistic redefined conference."

Ray Harris of Hong Kong University and Oxford University will present the keynote address. Other speakers include Bonnie McElhiny from Stanford Univer-

sity; Marc Schnitzer and Marshall Morris from the University of Puerto Rico; Dusan Bjelic from Boston University; Nigel Love from the University of Cape Town, South Africa; and Gillian Overling from Wake Forest University, to name a few. NMSU faculty presenters include Paul Mineo, Greg Richter, Bob Mielke and Chandler Monroe.

Davis said local merchants contributed money for the conference. The conference was originally planned for two days, but due to the number of responses from speakers it was extended another day. She said the Language and Literature faculty and staff have been supportive although they were skeptical at first.

Davis is also attempting to interest a publishing company in writings of the event. One of the speakers will be noting work presented. Davis hopes papers can be submitted, reviewed and selected for a book on the conference.

"I'm looking forward to this and am excited to have the opportunity to put something like this together," she said.

Roberts Presents "Ragtime Revels"

David Thomas Roberts, a leading ragtime pianist and composer, will present "Ragtime Revels" March 14 at 8 p.m. in the SUB Activities Room. The presentation is sponsored by Missouri North and Ryle South residential colleges. Admission is \$1.

Roberts is a native of Mississippi and has composed nearly 60 ragtime pieces of music, far more than Scott Joplin and many others. Roberts says his objective is to expose a wider audience to the serious ragtime compositions and ragtime-based eclectic piano music.

An accredited performer, Roberts has given recitals in St. Louis, Kansas City, Mo., New Orleans, Denver and Los Angeles. His works include *Music For a Pretty Baby*; *Through the Bottomlands*; and *David Thomas Roberts Plays the Amazon Rag*, to name a few. He regularly participates in major musical festivals and has made numerous television appearances and has his own radio show, "David Thomas Roberts' Ragtime Spectrum," which originated on New Orleans' WWOZ.

State Ballet of Missouri *cont.*

The State Ballet of Missouri is Kansas City's only year-round professional performing ballet organization. Founded in 1957, the Ballet was restructured in 1980. Under Bolender's direction, the Ballet has assembled a corps of dancers of exceptional talent and virtuosity. Formerly the Kansas City Ballet, the company's name was changed in 1986 due to an expanded scope of operations and the building of a performing calendar in St. Louis.

The upcoming program at Northeast will include "Pastorale" by Francisco Moncion, "Enough Said" by Clark Tippet and "Raymonda Variations" by George Ballanchine.

Prior to becoming



artistic director for the State Ballet of Missouri, Bolender enjoyed a celebrated career as a dancer, choreographer and director. Highlights of his career include serving as principal dancer for the New York City Ballet, as well as for the American Ballet Theatre and serving as choreographer for each company. He has choreographed works for Joffrey Ballet, Vienna State Opera Ballet, San Francisco Ballet and the National Theatre Ballet in Munich, to name a few. In addition, he has directed musical comedy for television, and his choreography is represented in the repertoires of major dance companies in the United States and abroad.

Industry/Education Effort Wins Award

The Orscheln Co. of Moberly, Mo., recently received the New Product Award from the Society of Professional Engineers. The award, which recognizes a new product, process or material developed and manufactured in the United States, was presented to Orscheln for the invention of the Orscheln World Class Cable. The cable is an improved parking brake cable designed for automotive and industrial vehicles. Kenneth Fountain, professor of chemistry, helped Orscheln become the first Missouri company to receive the New Product Award.

In 1985, Fountain was awarded a \$117,438 grant from the state of Missouri for corrosion inhibitors research which Orscheln matched.

Fountain had invented the corrosion inhibitor before receiving the Missouri grant, but the grant made it possible to do more extensive research, perfect and put the invention to work on large-scale production. The cable can now withstand 10 years and 100,000 miles of wear and corrosion. Past brake cables invented and produced by Orscheln could handle only around 50,000 miles.

Fountain, a consultant for Orscheln for several years, developed a thin ceramic coating in the form of a zinc-silicate compound covering each wire in the parking cable strand. This coating isolates each steel component from the corrosive under-vehicle environment. To put the compound into pro-

duction and in an effort to bring industry and education together, Fountain and Orscheln applied for the grant administered by the Missouri Coordinating Board for Higher Education. Fountain and a team of student assistants did the initial work at Northeast, and Orscheln's research and development team applied the coatings and conducted product tests.

World Class Cables are currently used in production at General Motors Light Truck, Buick, Oldsmobile and Cadillac Division. They will also be released for production at Mazda and Chrysler in 1991. Orscheln Co., the manufacturing division of Orscheln Industries, is a leader in manufacturing parking brake cables.
