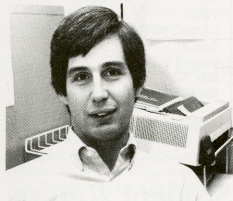

Zoumaras Researches for Biography of C. Douglas Dillon

Thomas Zoumaras, assistant professor of history, was recently recognized in *The Boston Globe* for his work in writing the biography of C. Douglas Dillon, treasury secretary during the John F. Kennedy presidency and ambassador to France during the Eisenhower administration.



Zoumaras and Dillon met at a symposium at Princeton University in 1987. Zoumaras wrote his doctoral dissertation on Eisenhower's foreign economic

policy, and when he heard Dillon speak and discussed ideas with him, he found they disagreed on several points. The exchange intrigued Dillon enough to ask if Zoumaras would be interested in writing his story. They worked out a deal last summer after Dillon agreed to certain conditions, including giving Zoumaras total editorial control over the book's content.

Recently Zoumaras was selected by the John F. Kennedy Library to receive the first Theodore C. Sorenson Research Fellowship, giving him \$5,000 toward his work with Dillon. He is looking for other grants to further supplement his book as well as negotiating for a publishing contract with Random House, so his book may be promoted as a trade rather than solely as a scholarly publication.

Research is well under way. During January, Zoumaras spent four days at Dillon's winter home in Jupiter Island, Fla. He plans to meet with Dillon every

month, interviewing and spending time with him to get a feel for his lifestyle. It is a lifestyle that will take Zoumaras to Dillon's chateau in France this September when Dillon supervises the fall grape harvest at his winery, Haut Brion. Zoumaras may also visit Dillon's estate in Far Hills, N.J., where he keeps his blue-ribbon herd of Guernsey cattle.

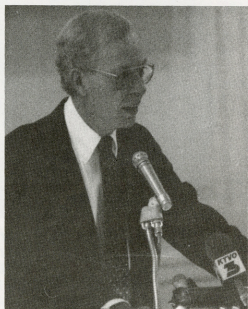
Zoumaras said age hasn't slowed down 80-year-old Dillon. He still maintains an office in Radio City Music Hall, N.Y., and manages the Dillon Fund, a family trust involved in various philanthropies. He has served on eight commissions since officially leaving government service in 1965. However, he told Zoumaras he would not be a public servant today, because he feels too much emphasis is put on their private lives and not enough attention directed at their public activities.

Zoumaras hopes to have Dillon's biography completed in three to four years.

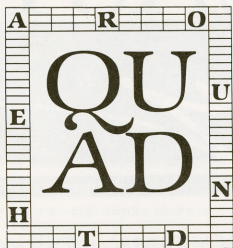
Soviet Revue Replaces Peking Acrobats

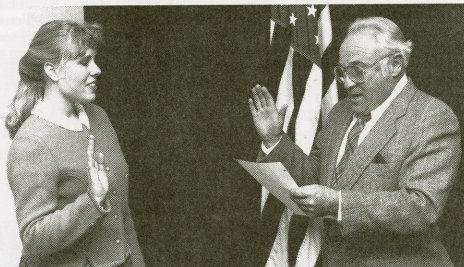

Teleconference Features Nationally Known Consultant

The Division of Business and Accountancy is sponsoring a video teleconference with Peter F. Drucker from 10:15 a.m. to 2 p.m., Feb. 8, in the SUB Tangerine Room.

The teleconference will be produced live from San Diego, Calif., and is composed of three sections, "The Care and Feeding of the Small and Growing Business," "Maintaining Competency of Executives and Professionals in the 1990s," and a question and answer period. Students and faculty are welcome to attend all or part of the program.

Drucker is an economic, business policy and management organization consultant. Since 1971, he has been the Clarke Professor of Social Science and Management at Claremont Graduate School in California. He was previously a professor of management at the Graduate Business School of New York University,

where he still serves as Distinguished University Lecturer, and a professor of politics and philosophy at Bennington College in Vermont.

Drucker also has experience in several other fields. He has worked as an economist for an international banking house and for a group of European banks and investment trusts, and was the American correspondent for a group of British newspapers.

Drucker has written extensively on politics and economics, as an editorial columnist for *The Wall Street Journal* and frequent magazine contributor. His books have been published in more than twenty languages.

He has received numerous awards, including 15 honorary doctorates from universities in five countries and Orders from Japan and Austria.

Debate Team Earns High Marks

Northeast has one of the top debate teams in the nation, according to the Cross Examination Debate Association. The team was ranked 11th in the Association's fall poll, based on the number of debates won in intercollegiate competition. After winning the state championship last spring, the team had many standout performances this fall.

In individual debate competition, freshman Joseph Bommarito and junior Erik Hansen placed third in the novice division at the University of Missouri-St. Louis Debate Tournament. Hansen was awarded third speaker at the tournament while Bommarito placed fifth. Junior Douglas Erwin placed second in dramatic interpretation, fourth in communication analysis and fifth as overall speaker. He was also a semi-finalist in prose.

Erwin earned second place in dramatic interpretation at the University of Nebraska, and at Southwest Missouri State he placed second in communication analysis and third in prose interpretation. He also placed fourth in communication analysis at Loras College, while sophomore Timothy Naeglin and senior Darcy Maile placed fifth in dramatic duo. Jennifer Martin placed fourth in poetry interpretation at Southwest Missouri State and also teamed up with Erwin to earn third place in dramatic duo.

The debates revolve around one topic each semester. This fall's topic was "Resolved: that violence is a justified response to political oppression." The topic for the spring semester is, "Resolved: that the trend toward increasing foreign investment in the United States is detrimental to this nation."

Conference to Address Women's Issues

Women's issues will be addressed during the second annual Women's Conference, March 24. The event will take place from 9:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. in the SUB, and there is a \$3 registration fee.

The day's activities are being planned by a Women's Conference steering committee made up of faculty, staff and students. Each participant will be able to attend five of the various sessions offered throughout the day. Topics for the

sessions include: sexism on campus, dual working couples, women as portrayed in advertising, women and interviewing, and women and their spiritual beliefs. A banquet and keynote speaker will conclude the conference.

their exit visas due to the current political situation in the People's Republic of China.

The Soviet Revue's varied background and repertoire reflect the diversity of cultural and entertainment traditions within the U.S.S.R. Among the 27 performers are father and son tightrope walkers from the Dagistan region of the Soviet Union, an Armenian contortionist, a Ukrainian pole-walker, a Siberian wire-walker and numerous acrobats, jugglers and dancers from Moscow.

The Soviet Acrobatic Revue will conclude their 60-city tour in May. The use of cameras or tape recording equipment during the performance at Northeast is strictly prohibited.
