

Faculty/Staff Make a Difference

Northeast faculty and staff are making a difference this year in allowing the University to better compete for grants and private gifts from corporations and foundations through their support of the 1995-96 faculty/staff drive.

"We want to emphasize participation, not the size of the individual's gift. The greater the number of faculty and staff who participate in the Development Fund, the greater the impact they make on grant and funding proposals," noted Ralph Cupelli and Eva Jane Noe, the 1995-96 Faculty/Staff Drive co-chairs. "Faculty/staff participation is often a criterion when awarding funds. They want to know if we believe in what we are doing. Our participation sends a clear message."

Since the beginning of the campaign, more than 190 Northeast faculty and staff have responded bringing the total to 319. Everyone's help is needed to reach the 1995-96 goal of 55 percent. The official drive ends on March 1.

Saint Louis Symphony to Perform



José-Luis García, an internationally recognized Spanish musician, will conduct the Saint Louis Symphony Chamber Orchestra on March 12, at 7:30 p.m. in Baldwin Auditorium as part of the Lyceum Series.

The Saint Louis Symphony, known for its spirited performances of American music, has been recognized as one of the finest ensembles in the nation by critics and audiences alike.

America's second oldest orchestra (founded 1880), the Saint Louis Symphony is recognized internationally as an orchestra of highest calibre, performing a broad musical repertoire with skill and spirit. The Orchestra has accumulated one of the world's most impressive lists of awards, honors and tributes, including four Grammy awards and 50 Grammy nominations over the last 17 years.

The Orchestra is widely acclaimed for its leadership in programming creative and engaging works, including several commissions and premieres each season.

García is one of the most internationally recognized Spanish musicians of our time, having established a world-wide reputation as violin soloist, conductor and pedagogue.

García was leader-director of the world famous English Chamber Orchestra for more than 20 years. Over the last 30 years he has appeared as a soloist with many of the major orchestras in Europe, and since the 1980s, he has increased his activities in North America. He has appeared frequently as a conductor and soloist with the the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra, the Utah Symphony Orchestra and others.

Since 1989 he has been a distinguished visiting professor to the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, and music director and conductor of the Royal Conservatory Orchestra. His most recent appointment is to the Queen Sofia School of Music in Madrid where he spends one week every month as violin professor and music director and conductor of the school's orchestra.

Northeast to Host NCAA Division II Midwest Regional Wrestling Championship

Northeast will play host to the NCAA Division II Midwest Regional Wrestling Championships Feb. 29 in Pershing Arena.

This is the first time Northeast has ever hosted a championship wrestling event. The tournament starts at 9 a.m. Three matches will be wrestled simultaneously throughout the day with the finals starting at 7 p.m.

Tickets cost \$3 for the morning session, \$3 for the finals and \$5 for an all-day pass. Cost is \$1 for senior citizens and children under 12 per session. Tickets will be available at the ticket booth in Pershing Building or by calling 785-4167.

"We at Northeast Missouri State University are pleased to have been selected as the host site for the regional wrestling championships," said Athletics Director Walter Ryle. "Our selection indicates national recognition of our commitment to a quality wrestling program and provides our students with an opportunity to compete at home before a large regional

group of wrestling fans. It also allows high school wrestlers a chance to see quality Division II wrestling at its finest."

The Bulldogs have three returning national qualifiers. Senior Kevin Bates (126 lbs.), junior Andy Rouse (150 lbs.) and sophomore Karega Scott (118 lbs.) will be looking to return to nationals.

The University of Central Oklahoma is the defending Midwest regional and national champion. Each wrestler will be competing for a chance to advance to the national championships at his weight class. The national tournament is March 15-16 in Greeley, Colo.

Other teams participating in the Midwest regionals are: Central Missouri State University, University of Central Oklahoma, University of Minnesota-Duluth, University of Minnesota-Morris, Moorhead State University (Minn.), Northern State University (S.D.), Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville, Southwest State University (Minn.), and University of Wisconsin-Parkside.

Congratulations to the 1996 Educator of the Year finalists: Joe Benevento, associate professor of language and literature; Kenneth Hahn, associate professor of science; Yinfa Ma, associate professor of science; Anne Moody, assistant professor of science; Steve Smith, associate professor of mathematics and computer science; and Philip Wilson, assistant professor of science.
