This editorial appeared in the June 25 edition of the Columbia (Mo.) Daily Tribune. It was written by Henry J. Waters III, the Tribune's publisher.

This has been a good year for Northeast Missouri State University in Kirksville. An act of the Missouri General Assembly, recently signed by Gov. John Ashcroft, is transforming it from a regional college into the statewide public liberal arts and sciences institution, complete with a statewide board of governors, enhanced funding and new prestige.

The move was recommended by the state Coordinating Board for Higher Education as part of a controversial plan to restructure the state's public institutions of higher education.

The enhanced designation was not difficult politically, however, because NMSU has already been showing its stuff under the strong leadership of President Charles McClain.

McClain has had one of the most successful academic improvement programs in the nation. At a time when standards on many campuses are slipping, admissions standards and academic policies at Kirksville have been tightened.

McClain's Value-Added Program has received well-deserved praise from throughout the nation. It uses individual progress instead of mere grade points as the measure of student success.

Almost every educator touts individualized education, but few do anything about it. McClain has incorporated it as the cornerstone of his program.

In justifying the new NMSU designation, Missouri Commissioner of Higher Education Shalia Aery said the academic ability of students at NMSU is "equal to or above" those at UMC and that Missouri

college-age students need an "affordable alternative of a small select school with high academic standards."

The coordinating board thinks NMSU can also attract students from outside Missouri. McClain, never one to hide his light under a basket, thoroughly agrees. He thinks his school can compete with Miami of Ohio or William and Mary in Virginia, prestigious small public universities that attract students from all over. Why not? He has made great strides in that direction already, prompting the enhanced designation and giving him the chance to go even further.

I am happy and even surprised that the political apparatus of Missouri has seen fit to encourage the NMSU president with this strong show of support. It proves that politicians *will* reward credible leaders of public programs and go for quality on occasion. Hope remains.

McClain has earned his reward. Of course, much remains to be done before his dreams are fulfilled, but how exciting that a Missouri institution might develop a nationwide reputation for academic excellence instead of say, athletic prowess. I'd much rather put my eggs in the academic basket. After all, that's what colleges and universities are supposed to be all about.

A sidewalk linking Barnett Hall with the rest of campus was recently completed. The sidewalk runs from Patterson Street along the west side of Franklin Street, and costs approximately \$45,000. NMSU officials had been concerned about student safety in the area, as many students had to walk along the shoulder of busy Franklin to get to Barnett.

The National Museum of Natural History in Washington will permanently store specimens of small Missouri mammals prepared by 11 NMSU students. The specimens are part of an exchange between NMSU and the Museum, which is part of the Smithsonian Institution. Scott Ellis, assistant professor of zoology, arranged the exchange, in which the University will receive several porpoise skulls for use in biology courses.

NMSU will open its first coeducational residence hall next fall. Blanton-Nason Hall was designated as the hall where men and women will both live next year, alternating by floors. The Board of Regents approved the plan at its March meeting, along with academic restrictions to the proposal, including minimum requirements for grade point average and ACT or sophomore test scores.

NMSU students for counseling six hours a week. She began her work in mid-March after the Board of Regents endorsed a contractual arrangement with the Mark Twain Mental Health Center.

Stuart Vorkink, associate professor of political science, was named the first recipient of the Piranha Award in April. The award, sponsored by Student Senate, recognizes demanding and effective instructors who display a commitment to the learning process. Eight faculty members were nominated and students voted to determine the award winner.

A Kirksville jury awarded the parents of David Andres \$181,000 in a wrongful death suit against the Alpha Kappa Lambda social fraternity. Andres, a NMSU sophomore in 1979, died from acute alcohol intoxication. The jury ruled that the local AKL chapter was 45 percent responsible for the death, while the national chapter and Andres were each 27.5 percent responsible. Both the chapters plan to appeal the decision.

NMSU's Student Health Clinic has taken on a new look in the past few months with the hiring of a full-time physician and a part-time mental health counselor.

Dr. John Morgan had served for six years as the director of student health at the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine. Morgan, a 1970 KCOM graduate, had also worked part-time at NMSU's clinic for two years.

Tax benefits more certain for 1985 donations

A number of tax simplification and fair tax proposals are currently being discussed in Congress and by the Treasury Department. No one knows if any tax revisions will be passed this year and what changes, if any, will be made. These proposals cause people to be uncertain about the future and about their planning efforts. It would appear that it will be late 1985 before any kind of a major tax law change could possibly be passed by Congress, and in all likelihood, whatever is passed will not go into effect until Jan. 1, 1986.

If an individual or family is considering a charitable planned gift of some significance to an organization, it would be wise to carefully consider making the gift in 1985. We know what the laws are for this year and know the tax benefit of a 1985 gift. It is possible that the changes in the tax laws could make a charitable gift less beneficial in 1986, so it is our suggestion that individuals who are considering making a substantial gift should look at concluding the gift plan sometime during 1985.

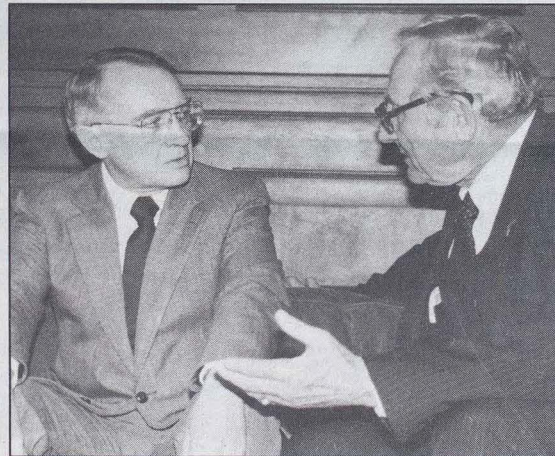
A gift of appreciated property may be especially beneficial this year. Currently, a gift of appreciated property may be deducted up to full fair market value with no taxation of the capital gain. The current Treasury proposal calls for gifts of appreciated property only to be deducted up to cost basis. This change would make appreciated property gifts significantly less tax beneficial.

The nature of any tax revision that will eventually be passed is unknown, but it would be wise to gain maximum tax benefit of any charitable gift. Northeast Missouri State University is available to assist you with any tax planning if you consider making the University a gift.

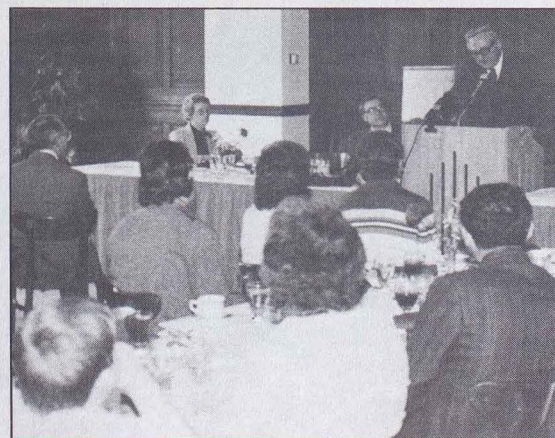

NMSU named statewide liberal arts and sciences university

HOUSE BILL NO. 196

83RD GENERAL ASSEMBLY

AN ACT

To establish a liberal arts and sciences state university in the city of Kirksville, Adair County, Missouri, and repealing sections 174.010, 174.020, and 174.030, RSMo Supp. 1984, and enacting in lieu thereof seven new sections, with an effective date.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows:

Section 1. Sections 174.010, 174.020, and 174.030, RSMo Supp. 1984, are repealed and seven new sections are enacted in lieu thereof to be known as sections 174.010, 174.020, 174.030, 174.600, 174.610, 174.620, and 174.630, to read as follows:

174.010. For the purpose of establishing state teachers colleges and state colleges the state is divided into seven districts as follows:
(1) The counties of Bates, Benton, Camden, Cass, Cole, Cooper, Henry, Hickory, Jackson, Johnson, Lafayette, Maries, Miller, Moniteau, Morgan, Osage, Pettis, Phelps, Pulaski, St. Clair and Saline shall constitute the first district.

(2) The counties lying south of the Missouri River and east of a line beginning at the northwest corner of Gasconade County and running south with the western boundaries of Gasconade, Crawford, and Dent counties.

There will be a new state university in Kirksville, Mo., under provisions of House Bill 196, passed during the recently completed session of the Missouri Legislature. It will be governed by a 10-person Board of Governors and will serve the entire state of Missouri as a statewide liberal arts and sciences institution.

The name of this new institution is Northeast Missouri State University.

Gov. John Ashcroft came to campus June 20 to sign the bill in ceremonies held on the Quadrangle in front of the Kirk Memorial Building.

Speaking from the desk of John R. Kirk, fifth president of NMSU, the governor said, “This designation of NMSU. . . is well deserved. Northeast Missouri has, in recent years, won national acclaim for its ‘value-added’ approach to undergraduate instruction.”

"I commend the board, the administrators, the faculty and staff, and the students of NMSU for making this institution one of Missouri's leaders in the field of higher education," Ashcroft said.

Thus, there is a new beginning for this 119-year-old former private college, normal school, teachers college, regional state college, regional state university and now statewide university.

The change was an outgrowth of a two-year study by the Coordinating Board for

Higher Education,

"Strengthening the Investment in Missouri Public Higher Education," which called for major changes in the state's system for higher education to increase quality and end duplication.

According to the study, "There is a need

in Missouri for a relatively small, select, residential public liberal arts institution. Missourians deserve an affordable public institution that focuses on undergraduate education with high admissions standards, and with an undergraduate curriculum for every major that requires approximately 60 hours of liberal arts."

Last fall, the House Higher Education Committee held hearings across the state under the leadership of chairman Winnie Weber (D-House Springs). In December, she filed the bill that authorized the change for Northeast.

But what exactly does the change mean?

"For alumni, Northeast will have new prestige and along with it, new responsibility, as it will be the only university of its kind in the state, for that matter, the Midwest," President Charles J. McClain said.

"I think some alumni, when they initially heard of the proposal, were worried that Northeast would only be offering majors in, say, literature and music; in other words, a strict definition of liberal arts. But the law provides that the new Board of Governors which takes office Jan. 1, 1986, defines the majors as part of its mandated planning process," McClain said. The legislature also provides for maintenance of the current 120 degree programs.

"For instance, I see business, education, accounting and technology, among other majors, as still being important to Northeast in the future," he added.

Composition of the new Board of Governors will be seven members from across Missouri, one student and two from outside Missouri. The current Board of Regents all must live within the 25 counties of northeast Missouri.

Northeast will be the only public college or university in Missouri with out-of-state board members.

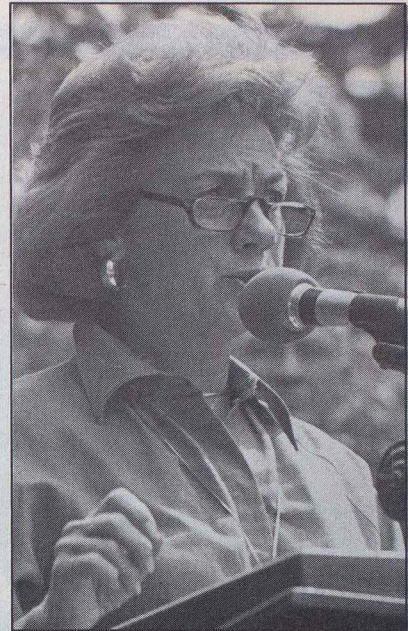
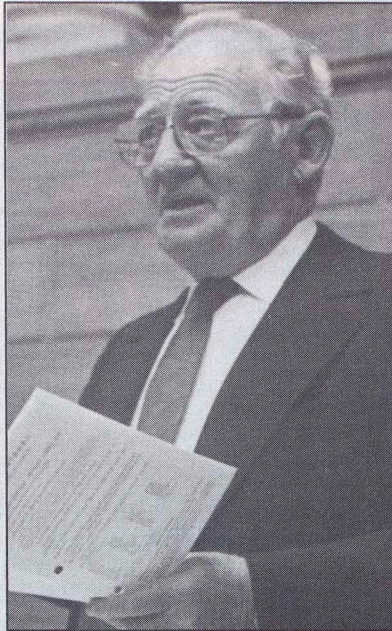
"Perhaps someday, a supportive alumnus who happens to live outside Missouri will have the opportunity to serve on the Board of Governors of his or her alma mater," McClain said.

NMSU president Charles J. McClain (right) and Gov. John Ashcroft shake hands as the governor arrives at the airport.

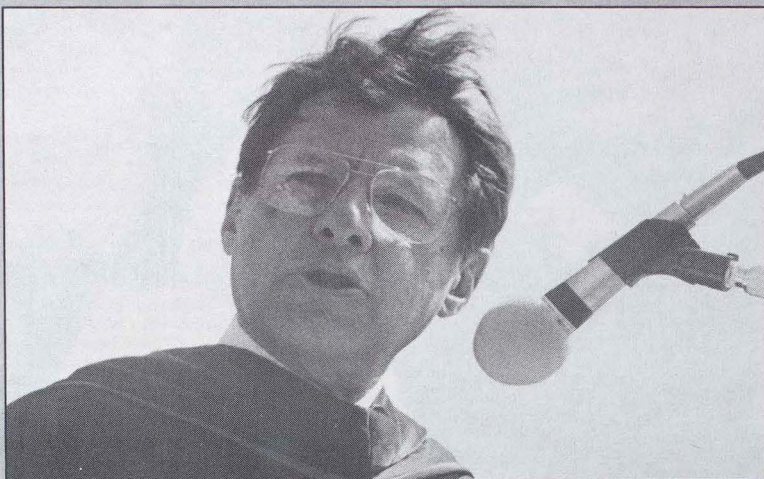




*(Above) Ashcroft presents a pen used to sign the bill to 104-year-old Ottie Greiner ('02), the University's oldest known living alumnus.

Commencement speaker praises NMSU for leadership in education

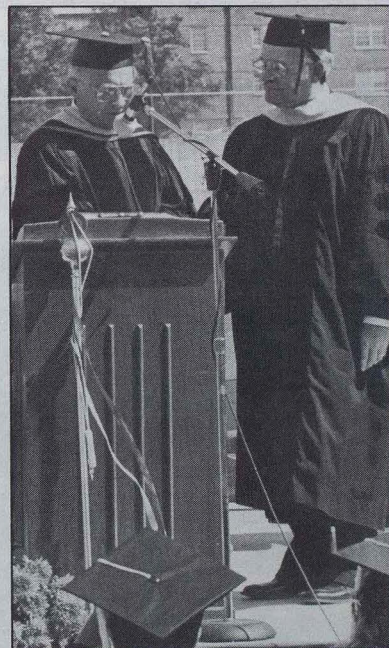
Allan W. Ostar, president of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, addressed more than 900 NMSU graduates in May 10 commencement ceremonies.

Degrees were given to 901 graduates, as 830 received bachelor's degrees, 69 earned master's degrees and three were given education specialist degrees.

Ostar has been head of AASCU for 20 years. AASCU awarded the G. Theodore Mitau Award for Innovation and Change in Higher Education in 1983 to NMSU for its Value-Added Program. The organization is made up of 360 member institutions and headquartered in Washington. Ostar was recently listed in a national poll as one of the 44 most influential leaders in American higher education.

Ostar congratulated the University for its efforts in upgrading higher education.

"All of you here today have good reason to be extremely proud of your university," Ostar told the crowd. "The past 18 months have brought Northeast Missouri State nationwide renown as the institution that pioneered in the development of the Value-Added approach to improving and measuring the quality of undergraduate education."

"As president of AASCU," he continued, "I can personally attest to what the development of your Value-Added Program has done to enhance Northeast Missouri State's reputation in American higher education. Your university stands tall, not only among AASCU institutions, but in higher education generally, with an innovative program now sure to be widely emulated in the years ahead."

Ostar also discussed a book written about the Value-Added Program. The book, "In Pursuit of Degrees with Integrity," was published by AASCU last fall. Ostar said the book "has become one of the most popular publications both within and outside our association that we have published."

Ostar talked about the importance of higher education and especially of state colleges and universities. He noted that many students at these schools are the first members of their families to attend college. "State universities such as yours offer the promise and the hope of both quality and equality," Ostar said.

He also warned against what he sees as a governmental trend toward reduced spending for education. "Today, for the first time in over a quarter of a century, the federal government appears to be backing away from its commitment to provide the opportunity for an education to all who have sought one, with the result that the federal government is spending more money on the next generation of weapons than on the next generation of Americans," Ostar said.

Ostar concluded by congratulating the graduates on their accomplishments and praising their University education. "By preparing you to develop high standards of personal achievement for full and purposeful lives," he said, "Northeast Missouri State has added a value to your lives; a value that cannot be graded and a value that cannot be taken away."

The valedictorian of the 1985 graduating class was Joni Brockschmidt of Monett, Mo. Brockschmidt majored in statistics and earned a perfect 4.0 grade point average at Northeast.

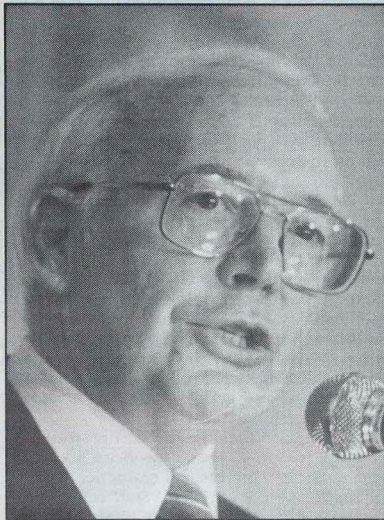

Bell delivers Baldwin Lecture

Former U.S. Secretary of Education Terrel H. Bell delivered the 28th Joseph Baldwin Lecture at NMSU April 11. Bell served as secretary of education for four years, leaving office in January.

Bell praised Northeast for its commitment to excellence in education. "This university is making itself known in Washington, D.C., and across the nation," Bell said. "The leadership of the president, faculty and staff toward quality education and accountability is a tough act to follow and many colleges and universities are looking to this university as a pioneer and leader in the reformation of education."

While in the Reagan administration, Bell formed and appointed members to the National Commission on Excellence in Education. That commission released the landmark report, "A Nation at Risk," which brought education back to the top of the national agenda.

"Where other institutions have lowered standards and played the numbers game to fill classes with warm bodies," Bell said, "your university has had the courage and foresight to increase standards when it wasn't in vogue. You are just now being recognized for what has been going on here for many years and had we, as a nation, exercised your commitment, the National Commission on Excellence in Education report, 'A Nation at Risk: The Imperative for Educational Reform,' would have taken a different direction."

Bell also complimented University administrators, faculty and staff for their efficiency. "I can't believe you only have one vice president on this campus," Bell said. "You have a very lean, mean administration here. I'm impressed by that."

In his introduction, NMSU President Charles McClain noted that Bell was visiting the University on an important day. The state House of Representatives had earlier that day voted 145-10 to make Northeast the state's liberal arts and sciences university.

Bell said, "The House landslide vote to make NMSU the liberal arts and sciences university for the state is a great vote of confidence for this school. Here's hoping the Senate follows suit and this University achieves even loftier goals in the years to come."

Bell is currently a professor of educational administration at the University of Utah (Salt Lake City). Before his appointment by President Reagan, Bell was Utah's higher education commissioner and was U.S. commissioner of education from 1974-76. He has also been a superintendent in Idaho, Wyoming and Utah, spanning four decades in education.

Bell received his bachelor's degree from Southern Idaho College of Education (Albion) and his master's degree from the University of Idaho (Moscow). He earned his doctorate degree at the University of Utah in 1961.

The Baldwin Lecture is named in honor of Joseph Baldwin, who founded the Uni-

versity in 1867 and served as its first president. The series was started in 1957 by former President Walter Ryle to help perpetuate the spirit of Baldwin's vision and industry.

In addition to Bell's address, NMSU faculty and staff retirees and those celebrating their 10- and 25-year anniversaries were honored.

St. Louis alums form chapter

St. Louis area alumni have formed a chapter of the NMSU Alumni Association. The nucleus of the chapter is a group of 22 Northeast graduates that will plan and coordinate activities for more than 3,800 alumni on both sides of the Mississippi River.

Marilyn Barban Morris ('76) and Paul Ward ('40) completed the initial planning for the group. Morris said the motivation behind establishing the chapter was "to increase alumni participation and awareness and to promote fellowship among area alumni; and of course, to assist the University with recruitment and promotional activities."

Morris will serve as the chapter's first president. Other officers are: Gerard Winterbottom ('77), vice president; Sue Iman ('83), secretary; Kathy Iman Douglas ('81), treasurer; and Karen Gordy ('84), corresponding secretary. These officers will serve until September 1986, and officers will then serve annual terms.

A survey has been sent to all St. Louis area alumni to determine the new chapter's course of action. Members of the chapter's telephone committee called the alumni to urge them to reply.

The results of the survey should be compiled by late June. "We hope to find other alumni who are interested in participating in our organization and also determine what they're interested in doing as a group and in what ways they would like to assist the University," Morris said.

The chapter has started a few projects, and the St. Louis Alumni Survey should provide a great deal of direction for the chapter, Morris said.

Chapter members have drafted a set of bylaws. After revision, a final copy will be submitted to the NMSU Development Fund's Board of Directors for approval. When the Development Fund Corporation was established, the Alumni Association became a subsidiary organization which is governed by the Board of Directors.

The first chapter newsletter will be published in late summer. Under Gordy's direction, the newsletter will contain survey results, detailed information on the chapter and a schedule of upcoming events.

The major social event for the chapter in the fall will be the football game between Northeast and Southeast Missouri State (Cape Girardeau) Nov. 16. The chapter plans a pre-game alumni reception. Winterbottom is working with the Alumni Office on the details.

NMSU's last house-mother says farewell

In August, an era will close as Alice Wiggins retires from her job as director of Brewer Hall on the NMSU campus. Mrs. Wiggins has worked with the University's residence halls for 15 years and is the last of the housemothers who characterized NMSU residence hall living in the 1960s.

"She made a professional transition from housemother to hall director," Ron Gaber, director of residence life, said. "And she made that transition well, combining the best elements of both positions."

Mrs. Wiggins became the director of Brewer Hall in 1976, after serving as housemother, assistant head resident and head resident.

"The job itself has changed just as much as the name of the job," Mrs. Wiggins said. "Students now feel they are restricted. Compared to the restrictions placed on students when I began my job here, these women run free. Back then, a man entering the hall had to check in, leave his identification, have an escort, then check out and get his card back when he wanted to go. Now we're going to have a coed dorm."

Mrs. Wiggins is not opposed to that progress, and she favors the coeducational status of Blanton-Nason Hall next fall. "A hall full of all males or all females is not natural, and not representative of the real world," she said. "Why not use the four years a student spends in college to help them adjust to the world as it really is?"

Mrs. Wiggins will work this summer with the football camp and Upward Bound programs, and then will move to Utah. Her only son, Dale, lives in Salt Lake City, and she will live with him and his family. "I want to be in more of a family setting," Mrs. Wiggins, a widow, said. "My grand-

daughter is 14; my grandson is 11. I've got to catch up on things."

Mrs. Wiggins has spent her entire life in Missouri, having grown up in Atlanta, Mo. She said she will miss Missouri and her work on the NMSU campus. "It (Utah) is a long way away. I hope some of my friends from here will visit me there. I know it will be interesting coming back here in the future, to see the changes, and the things that haven't changed," Mrs. Wiggins said.

Her work with students and other staff members was praised by NMSU administrators. "She has an extremely contagious, positive view of life," Gaber said. "She has a sincere interest in trying to help the students."

Dean of Students Terry Smith said, "No one at this university devotes more time to working directly with the students. Her energy, stamina and genuine concern is absolutely astonishing."

Mrs. Wiggins feels better staff relations are a big reason so much has been accomplished in the University's residence hall system the past few years. "Staff relations are much different than they were 15 years ago," she said. "There were no staff meetings, and very few committees existed."

"I can't boast about any personal contri-

butions because the contributions made were all a part of a team effort," Mrs. Wiggins said. "As a group we succeeded in decreasing vandalism from what was already considered an extremely low rate; we have kept the residence halls in good order; we have established a tutoring program for the residents; and we've reconstructed our resident assistant requirements, paying them a salary in addition to their traditional room and board benefits. I think there are just too many things to name."

"However, I do remember the time I saw the new stop light on Patterson Street work for the first time. We put so much work into that because we had people seriously hurt there. That was probably my fondest memory."

Gaber said, "Her extreme loyalty to the students and staff is one of her most significant contributions. Only a person with a good sense of humor and the willingness to spend both days and nights with the students will be able to fit in as she did."

"Her shoes will not be filled," Smith said. "It'll be like apples and oranges. Mrs. Wiggins has been able to give a sense of perspective to the program; a balance and history that helps us all to be better."

Alums give varsity a scare, bow 13-7

The alumni gave the current Bulldog squad some anxious moments in the early going, but when the final seconds had ticked off the clock, the varsity had prevailed, 13-7, in the fifth annual Spring Alumni Football Game April 27 at Stokes Stadium.

The old grads, who have never won a confrontation with the NMSU varsity, drew first blood. With 8:41 left in the first quarter, Eric Holm (far left, with ball), a member of the current Bulldog coaching staff, tossed a 17-yard pass to Brian McGovern (left) in the end zone. Bruce Wehner's PAT gave the alums an early 7-0 advantage.

The varsity's offense, which was sporadic most of the afternoon, came alive in the second period. Doug Kolb booted field goals of 27 and 26 yards, and Matt Heidmann, starting in place of injured signal-caller Chris Hegg, fired a five-yard aerial to Andre Gillespie for the go-ahead score with 1:32 remaining in the first half.

That touchdown turned out to be the difference in the game, as defense dominated play in the second half.

Maurice "Red" Wade (above), who has coached the alumni in all five encounters with the varsity, may have directed his last team of old grads. This spring, he retired as an instructor in physical education at NMSU.

"I'll be busy with other things now, but I may be able to help some with the coaching of the alumni," Wade said.

Former football mentor Wade retires

Early in spring 1951 at NMSU, Maurice Wade became head football coach, marking the start of a 34-year career as a member of the Division of Health, Physical Education and Recreation (HPER).

Today, he is mapping out his retirement plans after receiving the title of instructor emeritus of physical education at the May commencement.

Wade, known to his friends and associates as "Red," will probably be remembered most vividly as a highly successful football coach.

During a 16-year career as the Bulldog taskmaster between 1951 and 1966, Wade guided his teams to an overall record of 99-41-2 and eight Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association championships. Five of his players were selected as first-team Division II All-Americans.

The Mountain Grove (Mo.) product coached at Central High School in St. Joseph (Mo.) before coming to NMSU in 1950 as an assistant coach under James Dougherty. Wade retired as NMSU's head football coach a few weeks after the 1966 season.

Many of his friends, associates and former players were in attendance when Wade was made a charter member of NMSU's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1983, and at a surprise roast the weekend of the 1985 Alumni Football Game this past April in Kirksville.

Speakers at the roast included five of Wade's former players, George Anastasoff, Don Sparks, LaVerne "Horse" Dabney, Ed Bender and Bill Richerson; his football coach at the University of Missouri, Don Fautot; two Mizzou teammates, Darold Jenkins and Bob Steuber; NMSU basketball coach Willard Sims; and a long-time Kirksville friend, G. E. "Shag" Grossnickle.

Richerson, currently the head of the Di-

vision of HPER, described Wade as an independent and unpredictable man with a complicated personality.

"As a coach, he was a good judge of people," Richerson said. "He was innovative and imaginative but wasn't given due credit for his contributions to the game, such as his Wing-T offense. You saw Red as he was with no pretense."

But Wade is quick to point out other reasons for his successful coaching career.

"I had a lot of help from a lot of people," he said. "Many coaches sent me real good athletes, who could play anywhere (in the lineup). I recruited fullbacks and halfbacks with speed and turned them into linemen."

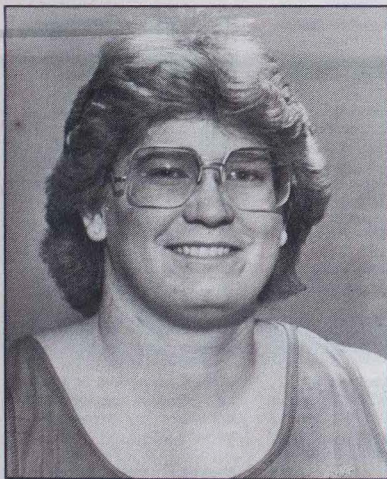
"I had a bunch of well-disciplined players, who appreciated the fact I demanded it (discipline). That goes a long way in football or anything else. I think we're too easy on kids today."

Wade says he has been blessed with a good family that has supported him throughout his career. His wife, Maxine, and a daughter, Judy, are teachers in the Kirksville Public Schools, while another daughter, Sally, lives in Brandenton, Fla.

What are Wade's future plans?

"I'll spend more time with my horses at my farm and do a lot of fishing," he replied, "and see as many football games as possible."

Shot-putter makes Lady Bulldog history

In late May, NMSU senior Marlene Frahm became the first Lady Bulldog to win an indoor and outdoor track and field championship during the same year.

Frahm won the shot put at the NCAA Division II outdoor meet in Los Angeles with a throw of 48 feet, 2 inches. She was also the indoor champion following a 50-1/2 feet throw last winter at the Division II

meet in Fargo, N.D.

As her athletic career draws to a close, Frahm remains relatively unimpressed by the glories she has reaped in her four-year track career at Northeast Missouri State, among them two national championships, All-American status and several conference championships.

Frahm, who will graduate in May 1986, is a three-time All-American. She holds four Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association indoor and two outdoor shot titles and the conference record in both.

She is also a four-time qualifier for national shot put competition and a two-time qualifier in the discus and javelin. Yet, with all these accomplishments, Frahm does not seem to understand why people are so awed by her credentials. In fact, she says that being the best in the nation is no big deal.

"I tell everybody that it's just like another meet," Frahm said. "They say it hasn't hit me yet, but it's just like winning another meet to me."

Frahm began her career in the throwing events as an eighth-grader in Newton, Iowa, and was determined to be the best.

"I went out for track the first year they had it," she said. "It was something to do, and everybody went out for it. I picked the shot, because I could do it better than anybody else. I tried everything, but that's what I was best at."

Frahm competed for Newton High School and won the Iowa state shot put championship, remaining undefeated her senior year. She also set school records in the shot, discus and softball throw.

After nine years of competition and numerous honors, Frahm's fondest memory is not of being an All-American or even of being a national champion.

"Dominating the conference for four years means the most to me," Frahm said. "I go to meets and throw against people, and it seems they've been around for years. But I'm sure they feel that way about me."

Frahm will not see those familiar opponents as much after the current outdoor season ends. She will be able to compete unattached next year, but Frahm is looking forward to a break. Northeast has no regulation track facilities, so she has spent four years of weekends on the road.

"I'm ready for a year off," she said. "I'll compete whenever I feel like it next year, but it will be more of an enjoyment sort of thing. The traveling wears on you. It gets to the point where you just want to get it over with. You're gone every weekend since the middle of January."

Frahm feels her success may help attract a quality athlete to the team.

"People would know the program is decent," she said. "They would have something to work for, to get the records. I don't think they're all that outstanding. There should be people around who can get them."

Frahm plans to finish her teaching degree in physical education and driver safety education next year. If possible, she would like to serve as student assistant to John Cochrane, coach for the women's track and field team.

"Whatever I do, I try to do it to the best of my ability," Frahm said. "I don't like defeats."

Business

Although he officially retired in December, Eugene Croarkin, associate professor emeritus of accounting, still shows up periodically in Violette Hall.

Croarkin, after teaching accounting courses at NMSU since 1954, taught one course this spring and is gearing up to teach a master's course in accounting this summer. But this fall, Croarkin will be fully retired.

A 1939 graduate of Macon (Mo.) High School, Croarkin spent a year at Wright Junior College in Chicago and took night classes at Northwestern University (Chicago) while employed as an accountant and store auditor for Jewel Food Stores.

DIVISION update

Education

"The greatest highlight (of my years at NMSU) is something you can't measure. It's the association with the students, parents and colleagues."

That is how **Orville Bowers ('50)**, professor emeritus of education, looks back on his relationship with the University. The relationship began with his bachelor's and master's degrees, earned at Northeast in 1950 and 1954 respectively. Bowers retired this spring after 35 years at NMSU.

Following his bachelor's degree, Bowers accepted the position of director of audio-visual education at NMSU. Since then, he has served as director of college publications, registrar, associate professor and finally, professor of education. In that time, Bowers said he has seen Northeast go through many changes.

"Since I've been working here, more than half of the (campus) buildings have been built," he said.

But perhaps the most drastic change has occurred in enrollment figures. In 1952 when Bowers started as registrar, 974 students attended, and at the end of his years in that office, the figure increased some 600 percent to approximately 6,300 students. Consequently, Bowers witnessed the implementation of data processing in the registration and recording procedures.

"You get a perspective of the overall aspect of a college when you see it grow," he said. "When we were smaller, we had an administrative structure that was directly responsible to the President's Office, which called for close cooperation between administrative and other academic offices and divisions. I wouldn't say that that's changed because we still have cooperation, but it's a little different structure."

Bowers anticipates being busy in his retirement, including finding time for his genealogy hobby, reading "many of the books I have at home that have not been read yet" and traveling.

Judson Martin was named professor emeritus of education at May commencement following 17 years of service at Northeast.

Martin came to NMSU in 1968 from Bemidji (Minn.) State College to become the University's first director of the Division of Graduate Studies. At BSC he worked from 1946 to 1968 in several administrative positions from registrar to academic dean, and was the first person to work full-time in most of them.

"I decided to take a position at a university (NMSU) that was further south than my past one," he said. The challenge of being the first graduate dean at a college that was "going"—had an established graduate program—was also a drawing factor.

Since his job as graduate dean, Martin has held the positions of interim head of the Division of Education, professor of education and interim head of teacher education.

Dan Ball, head of the Division of Education, said, "He (Martin) left this place in good order when I took over in 1982 and was helpful in the adjustment period."

"Developing and continuing to develop courses necessary for the future of students I've taught since 1971," both undergraduate and graduate, has been a challenge, Martin said.

Life after Northeast looks busy for Martin. "As I've told my classes, I have plans now at least until I'm 92," he said. These plans include moving to Mt. Dora, Fla.; becoming active in people-oriented organizations; continuing weaving for sales and competition; and training his Dobermans.

DIVISION update

Health, Physical Education and Recreation

When the title professor emeritus of physical education was conferred upon Ralph Pink at the May commencement, it signaled the end of a career for him at NMSU, first as a student after World War II and then later, as a coach and teacher for more than 25 years.

At the conclusion of World War II, Pink was enticed to enroll at NMSU by Boyd King, who had just been appointed to coach basketball at his alma mater. King had seen Pink perform in the Coast Guard during the war.

Pink convinced five friends, who, like him, had played basketball at Wood River (Ill.) High School, to come with him to Kirksville. They tried out and made the team.

The rest is history. During the next two seasons, Pink and his Bulldog teammates posted a cumulative record of 59-4, won the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship and advanced to the NAIA National Tournament in Kansas City, Mo., twice. Most NMSU basketball followers consider the 1946-47 and 1947-48 clubs as the greatest Bulldog teams in the history of basketball at the University.

"The accomplishments of the team those two years were something to behold," Pink said. "We had a lot of togetherness, and if someone was having an off-night, someone else would cover for him. It was a lot of fun and a big thrill.

"The only disappointment was that we didn't win the NAIA championship either year. We thought our team was as good as any team in the tournament."

Pink received honorable mention and second team all-MIAA accolades during his career.

After receiving a bachelor of science degree in education in 1948 from NMSU, he attended the University of Missouri-Columbia and earned a master of education degree in 1949. He later received his doctorate from the University of Utah (Salt Lake City).

He coached for two years at Central Methodist College (Fayette), where he guided the Eagles to a couple of conference titles, one trip to the NAIA National Tournament and a trip to the NAIA Regional Playoffs.

Pink left Central Methodist in 1952 to take the head basketball job at Southeast Missouri State in Cape Girardeau, where his teams finished second once and third four times in the tough MIAA. He then moved to NMSU in fall 1958.

Among Pink's duties at NMSU was coaching the men's tennis team, which captured five conference crowns, finished fourth and ninth on two occasions at the NCAA College Division Tournament and amassed a dual record of 79-20 between 1958 and 1968.

"We had some very good tennis teams here (during that period of time)," Pink said. "Four of my players (Dave Romberg, Ron Selkirk, Jim Marsh and Dave Elmore) have gone on to become club pros. It was a lot of fun coaching those teams."

Pink also served as the first full-time intramural director at NMSU and sponsored the Varsity Club for a number of years.

Pink's wife, Jolene, was a cheerleader when he was playing basketball for the Bulldogs. Their daughter, Patty Bolz, and her husband, Brad, live in Kirksville. The Pinks also have a son, Dean, who is involved in the outboard motor business in Auburndale, Fla.

DIVISION update

Mathematics and Computer Science

NMSU's Division of Mathematics has a new name. It was officially renamed the Division of Mathematics and Computer Science in action by the Board of Regents at its March 26 meeting.

The name change will have little immediate effect on the Division, according to Division Head Lanny Morley. The changes in the division have been gradually occurring for a number of years, he said.

The computer science department, now the fifth largest on the NMSU campus, is under the authority of the Division of Mathematics. The name change reflects the enrollment increases in the program and the importance of the field in the world of business.

The division presently has 22 faculty members, with three added since 1982. One faculty member will switch to full-time computer science instructor by the fall. John Erhart, associate professor of mathematics, said curriculum changes came about because of an increase in faculty, not the division name change.

Students in the computer science program had several more electives to choose from during the 1984-85 school year, and one required course was exchanged for another.

"We hope we made the program stronger," Morley said. "We keep upgrading the curriculum."

The Missouri Coordinating Board for Higher Education recommended in the fall that NMSU redirect its resources for more equipment and faculty development in the computer science department. The Missouri Legislature has appropriated \$615,100 to NMSU for this purpose.

Wayne Bailey, assistant professor of mathematics, said the University needs to purchase additional equipment to keep up with recent advances in computer technology and increased use of the University's present computer system. More than 70 percent of the credit hours in the computer science department are received by non-computer science majors.

According to Bailey, the greatest need is increased accessibility to computer terminals and microcomputers. It is also important to expand the computer science curriculum by including classes in computer technology in addition to the current programming classes, he said.

DIVISION update

Practical Arts

The 1984-85 academic year was a time of great change for the Division of Practical Arts. The final change took place June 1, when **Roland F. Nagel ('42)** retired as head of the Division.

Nagel was named professor emeritus of industrial education and head emeritus of the Division of Practical Arts at spring commencement ceremonies. He served as division head for 17 years.

"We are greatly indebted to you for your many years of service to this University," University President Charles McClain told Nagel at commencement.

"This is a good time for the University, as it is earning acclaim for leadership in education. It's a good time for me to step out," Nagel said.

This past year saw many changes in the Division, especially in the agriculture department. The program was first targeted for elimination by the state's Coordinating Board for Higher Education, then switched to the University's Division of Science in a plan approved by the Board of Regents. Nagel sees other changes ahead.

"It is a challenging time for this University in light of the approaching changes," he said. "There will be a Division name change as the University's mission changes. Our Division will have to meet the challenges with new blood and address the question of how a university emphasizing arts and science will fit the applied fields into programs of study."

Other changes during Nagel's stint as division head include the introduction of the industrial technology major and the start of two-year certificate programs in agriculture, industrial and animal health technology.

"We've experienced a lot of growth in the past 15 years," Nagel said. "A strong faculty and administration and good yearly operating budgets have made good progress possible."

Nagel returned to his alma mater in 1956. He had previously taught at Northwestern State College (Natchitoches, La.).

"I took a cut in pay to return to Kirksville," Nagel said. "It was a difficult decision to make, leaving many friends in Louisiana. But I have never regretted my decision."

Nagel's first assignment was to establish a graduate program in industrial education for the Division. Thirty-one students enrolled when the classes were first offered in summer 1957, and that program remains intact today. Nagel taught industrial education classes for 12 years before being named to replace Division Head Otho Barnett in 1968.

"I've enjoyed my time as a teacher perhaps more than any other capacity I have served. The satisfaction I've gained from shaping the young people and seeing your influence in their success is most enjoyable," Nagel said.

Through the graduate program in industrial education, Nagel has met many educational leaders in Taiwan. He also visited that country in 1983. Nagel is considering an offer to teach in Taiwan, but also plans to spend his retirement devoting more time to his family, including his wife, Sue; and daughters Susan, an assistant professor of nursing at NMSU, and Lisa, a junior high vocal music teacher in Hannibal, Mo. Nagel is proud of his accomplishments, but looks forward to his retirement. "Being on campus in various capacities for 35 years is long enough," he said.

DIVISION update

Science

After 25 years as the head of the Division of Science, **Dean Rosebery** ('41) is retiring July 1. Rosebery was named professor emeritus of biology and head emeritus of the Division of Science at spring commencement ceremonies, May 10.

At commencement, NMSU President Charles McClain praised Rosebery for his fine service to both the University and organizations in his field. Rosebery has served as the president of the National Association of Academies of Science for one year, and will continue to have responsibilities to that organization for three more years.

"I feel fortunate to have served a university and its president, who sought to organize the institution for achieving high academic goals," Rosebery said. "Efforts to increase standards and quality of education strengthen faculty and the University."

During Rosebery's term as division head, the science faculty has expanded from six to 35 members. Science Hall was built in 1954, and Rosebery has seen an addition to that building in 1967 and the present \$2.1 million renovations to the hall.

Rosebery is a native of Adair County and attended Kirksville Senior High School. After graduating from NMSU, he attended Virginia Polytech Institute (Blacksburg), where he received his doctorate.

Following graduation, Rosebery took a job with the Fish Division of the Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries in Richmond, Va. After visiting Kirksville in 1952, he took a \$1,000 pay cut to begin teaching biology courses at NMSU.

One of the Division's innovations under Rosebery has been the Air and Space Education for Teachers Program, now into its sixth summer. The program is sponsored by the Federal Aviation Administration, along with several major companies. He hopes to spend much time on the program this summer.

"One of the things I intend to devote considerable effort to will be working with 48 Missouri elementary school science teachers on air and space themes this summer," he said. "I will also be coordinating an advanced program for some of the top high school science students."

Rosebery has long been involved in professional organizations. Besides his current presidency, he is a past president of Science Teachers of Missouri, Missouri Fisheries Society and the Missouri Sciences Academy. He is also presently a liaison for both the Missouri Academy of Science and the American Fisheries Society.

Rosebery has also been quite active in civic affairs. He is a past president of the Kirksville Rotary Club and a former Salvation Army chairman. He is presently a member of Kirksville's Planning and Zoning Commission. He also sponsored the NMSU chapter of the Alpha Kappa Lambda social fraternity for 10 years.

Farming and horses will take up much of Rosebery's time during his retirement. He joked, "When I retire, I'm going to be a rancher because a rancher implies riding on the seat of an automobile, but if you call yourself a farmer, it means you've got to get out and do some work."

Rosebery's main hobbies are flying and travel, and his retirement will allow him more time to dedicate to both. He has advanced to the instrument-rated stage and has flown small planes extensively. He and his wife, Amy, have traveled to Europe. Alaska and the Mediterranean are next on the list.

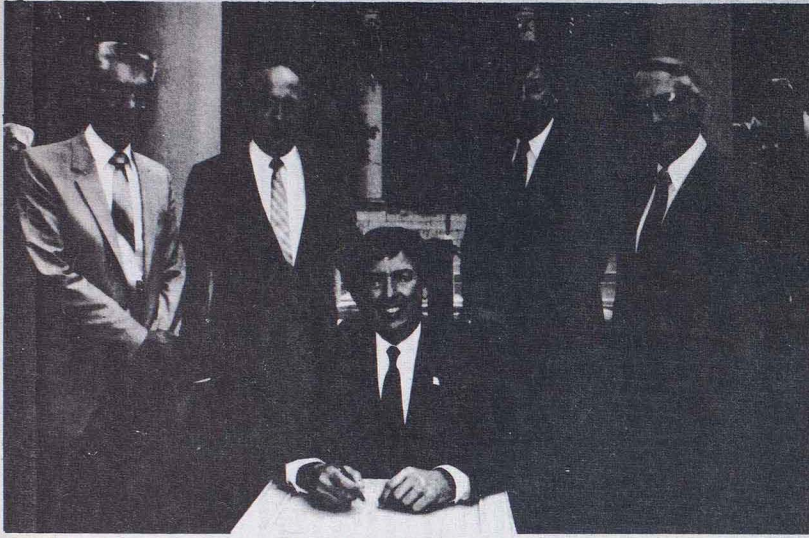

Student combines talents in mathematics, philosophy

Gordon Klein is a modern version of the old Renaissance man, and he would probably be pleased with that description.

The senior computer science major has the highest American College Testing score on campus (a 32 of a possible 36). He is a President's Distinguished Scholar, a member of Who's Who Among American College and University Students, and most recently, a guest instructor of philosophy at NMSU.

Klein of Knoxville, Iowa, became interested in philosophy, and especially the ancient Greek philosophers, when he took Henry Smits' introduction to philosophy class. He grasped the subject well, and Smits invited him back to lecture to the class for three weeks last spring.

"It was natural for him to teach because of his background," Smits, associate professor of philosophy, said. "There was no risk involved. I knew his capabilities."

"I had been interested in it (philosophy) before taking the class," Klein said. "You don't really realize what's going on at the time. It takes maybe six months to realize what you had learned."

Klein said he admired Socrates more than any of the philosophers he had studied. "Plato figured everything out, but Socrates stood for truth. He died for truth. Socrates was the only one whose life stood out and was more important than his works. He lived his philosophy more than the other philosophers," Klein said.

Although he has read numerous works on philosophy, Klein said,

"I don't think I've figured out what anyone else doesn't already know."

Klein said he had gained a lot from his teaching experience, but he was not sure that he wanted to teach for the rest of his life. "In a way, it would be interesting to have your own desk, office and title. But in a lot of cases, the students are just there to get a degree, and they don't really want to be there. It would be a waste of time in this case," he said.

Klein plans to put off graduate school until he knows exactly what he wants to do. "I'm interested in philosophy, math, statistics and computer science," he said.

This modern Renaissance man does have one definite goal, though. Klein is determined to make it to the 1992 Summer Olympic Games in Athens. He wants to visit the home of the many ancient Greek philosophers he admires.
