Park tours for

Two-wheeled travelers

To create twice the fun and half the work, Lorren and Frances Dennison of Central City, Iowa, shared the pedaling on a bicycle built for two.

The pair and their tandem bicycle rode with about 40 other cyclists across 220 miles of northeast Missouri during the first "Environmental Studies, Missouri State Parks by Bicycle" workshop. The workshop was co-sponsored by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. The participants traveled to five state parks in five days, observing and collecting data along the way. In the evenings the travelers saw programs about different aspects of the Missouri state parks system and the area.

The programs were not the only opportunity to learn. "You learn to appreciate energy—gas at a buck a gallon doesn't seem so bad when you're going up hills," Joe Powers of Fort Madison, Iowa, said.

John Settlage, professor of science and director of the workshop, said the workshop also let the participants prove something to themselves. "It's the idea of doing a little more than you're capable of doing."
