## Rotary Contributes to Academy

The Joseph Baldwin Academy was founded at Northeast to enrich the learning process of young gifted and talented students by challenging them with a college curriculum. Students who are completing the seventh or eighth grade, score in the top three percent on a nationally normed achievement test and are nominated by their school's principal or counselor are eligible.

This year the University received more than 3,300 applications. Of the 220 selected participants, 12 students are from the Kirksville R-III school system. Twenty-six of 66 eligible area students applied to the Academy. Session I will run June 16 through July 6; session II, July 14 through August 3.

A 12-day trip to Egypt is being sponsored by the Division of Education and the NMSU Alumni Association, July 27 through August 8. # New College Guide Features Northeast

Among the 300 institutions across the country featured in the first edition of *THE BARRON'S 300: Best Buys in College Education* is Northeast. The new college guide features colleges and universities which provide "quality academic programs at prices below the national average."

More than 450 schools were researched based on their tuition rate compared with the average rate for all colleges, colleges in their region and colleges of similar academic emphasis. Other objective criteria included average test scores of entering freshmen, percent of faculty with doctorates, data on room and board and percent of students who graduate and go on to seek higher degrees.

Colleges and universities selected for *THE BARRON'S 300* provide additional data on their academic, extracurricular and financial aid programs which "warrants them placement is so select a group."
