What's Hot This Summer in Kirksville

Here you are, spending another or perhaps your first summer in Kirksville. Whether you were here for the fall and spring semesters, or are just dropping in to work on your master's during your vacation, don't worry. There's plenty of action in this college town, even though most of the students have gone home.

Among the most popular fair-weather gathering spots is Thousand Hills State Park and its accompanying Forest Lake. Enjoy the lake's sandy beach, open spaces and picnic shelters. If you'd rather not grill outdoors, eat inside at Thousand Hills Dining Lodge where you can enjoy the lakefront view and air conditioning at the same time.

You also have the opportunity to hike at the park, water ski, sail, canoe, fish or just take a quiet pontoon boat ride on the lake.

For those of you who prefer the feel of solid concrete under your feet, the absence of fish and water you can see through, Kirksville offers a municipal swimming pool. Just off Baltimore, the pool is surrounded by a park for those who would rather relax under a shade tree than bark in the sun.

The University boasts one of the best indoor pools in the Midwest. Faculty, staff, students and their immediate family may use the facility during open hours at no charge.

For those of you who would rather spend 30 minutes under a sunlamp than two hours sweating in the sun, the city contains a number of tanning salons. Consult your yellow pages for listings.

In addition to pools, the Kirksville area offers a number of softball and baseball diamonds, parks and wide open spaces in which to play touch football, soccer, volleyball or whatever you choose.

NMSU provides a number of tennis courts, racquetball courts and weightlifting facilities. The University also has an outdoor track for joggers who prefer to stay off the streets.

For information about outdoor recreation opportunities in Kirksville, call the Kirksville Parks and Recreation Office at 627-1480.

Movie-goers should take advantage of the Petite Three Cinema on Baltimore, the Kennedy Theatre on the corner of Elson and McPherson and Wednesday night movies in Baldwin Hall, sponsored by the Student Activities Board. All SAB movies begin at 7 p.m. and cost \$1 at the door.

Those who enjoy theatrical productions should watch for information about plays at Kirksville's Traveler's Community Theatre. NMSU's Summerplay has three productions scheduled this season, including

"The Robber Bridegroom," "The Seven Year Itch" and "The Dining Room."

In addition, art enthusiasts can tour the University gallery or browse through items for sale and display by local collectors and artists at Red Barn Market Days. The market is set up the first Saturday of each month, May through September, at Brashear Park.

Music lovers can enjoy listening to Kirksville's two rock radio stations, KRXL-FM 94.5 and KTUF-FM 93.5, or to the country-and-western format on KIRX radio—1450 on your AM dial.

The area provides several museums, including the Adair County Historical Society Museum in the Adair County Courthouse, open noon to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The Still National Osteopathic Museum offers a look at the history of osteopathic medicine which had its beginning in Kirksville. The museum, located on the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine and Kirksville Osteopathic Health Center campus, is open from 9 a.m. to noon, Tuesday through Friday.

On the NMSU campus, Pickler Memorial Library houses the Schwengel-Lincoln Collection. The Abraham Lincoln books, art and memorabilia in the collection were donated by NMSU alumni Fred and Ethel Schwengel. The collection is open to the public from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, except during University holidays.

Also on campus in the E.M. Violette Museum, housed in the basement of the historical Kirk Memorial Building. The museum displays pioneer household and farm items, Indian artifacts and Civil War, World War I and II memorabilia. Viewing is by appointment only. Call 785-4537 or 785-4526 weekdays to set one up.

Children of NMSU faculty, staff and students have a chance to learn through recreation by enrolling in the Tween Club. For more information, call the 1000 Hills Summer Youth Camp Office at 785-4439.
