THE ARTS IN THE PARK summer program begins with the movie "Butch Cassidy & The Sundance Kid" at 7 p.m. Thursday in the Tangerine Room of the Student Union Building. Other activities planned for the summer include more movies, picnics, games, a band concert, and an ice cream social. The ESP team of Bob and Elizabeth also will present a show. All Arts in the Park programs are open to the University community at no charge except movies. Movie admittance is 50 cents per person.

SUMMER FRESHMAN ORIENTATION officially begins on Friday when the Pershing Scholars will visit the campus. More than 1,200 freshman students and their parents are expected to participate in orientation activities from Friday through Thursday, July 13. About 50 students per day will attend a registration meeting; a welcome session by University administrators; a discussion of what's happening in his or her division of interest; a presentation about residence hall living; an enrollment session with freshman counselors; and a divisional open house. The parents' program follows the students' program also including campus tours and a college adjustment seminar for parents.

SUMMER SPORTS ACTIVITIES will be discussed at a meeting to be held at 7 tonight in Ryle Hall Cafeteria. Guys and gals may sign up for summer softball and volleyball teams and familiarize themselves with the rules. Everyone is invited to attend.

SIX FLAGS FUN SEEKERS CLUB CARDS are available at the Public Relations Office in McKinney Center. Any member of the University community may obtain a card to use on a St. Louis vacation. Special rates to Six Flags Over Mid-America in addition to lodging savings at motels and campgrounds are offered.

RECREATIONAL SWIMMING for faculty, staff and students will be from 4:30-8:45 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 10 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. Saturdays in the natatorium. Family swim hours will be from 4:30-8:45 p.m. Wednesdays and Fridays and from 10 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. Saturdays. For further information, contact Fontaine Piper, natatorium director, ext. 7231.

THE CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER will be open for both summer sessions. Summer hours are from 7:15 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Friday. The center at Elson and Normal Streets provides children with a mid-morning snack and a noon lunch. Fees are \$15 per week. To enroll a child, parents need not be affiliated with the University. THE SUMMER SCHOOL SERVING SCHEDULE by American Food Management in the residence halls will not include dinner on Monday, July 3; brunch and dinner on Tuesday, July 4; dinner on Friday, July 7; and dinner on Friday, Aug. 11. These meals will be served on a head count basis for contract patrons with their meal tickets and those eating on their own at the casual meal rate. No meals will be served on Saturdays, July 8 and Aug. 12. The schedule is based on 20 meals per week with no food service on Sunday evening.

A TOWN AND GOWN SWIM will be established from 6-8:45 p.m. Wednesdays and Fridays during both summer sessions at the natatorium. Individuals and families from the community may use the facility. Fees are \$10 per individual or \$20 for families. Participants must obey all rules of the facility. The University also will be sponsoring a youth swim program with details to be announced.

A LOCKER RENTAL PROGRAM has begun for students, faculty and staff not enrolled in swim classes who wish to have a permanent storage locker at the natatorium. The fees are \$5 for both summer sessions, \$7.50 for the fall semester and \$10 for the academic year. For further information, contact the natatorium director at ext. 7231.

THE CINCINNATI REDS will conduct a baseball tryout camp from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday, June 13, at the NMSU field, south of Stokes Stadium. Players must be 16 years of age to participate, and American Legion players must have written permission from their coach or post commander. Shoes, gloves and uniforms must be furnished by players.
