The Young Americans is a talented, finely trained group of youthful singer-performers selected from recommended students representing more than 200 high schools and colleges in Southern California and throughout the nation. Tickets for tonight's performance are available from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. today in the Student Union Building for all students, faculty and staff members.
