Two summer Chinese study sessions are being offered at the National Taiwan Normal University and the Maderin Training Center. The first session runs from June 1-July 31, and the second session runs from July 1-Aug. 31. Applications are due by March 20 and April 20 respectively. Six hours of credit is available. Students must be at least 18 years of age and interested in learning Chinese. Tuition for the program is approximately \$200 per session. Living expenses in Taiwan are approximately \$450 per month. Lyceum Presents Small-Town Comedy



Northeast will have the opportunity to meet the crazy characters of Tuna, Texas, as the Lyceum Series presents the Arkansas Repertory Theatre production of "Greater Tuna" at 8 p.m., Tuesday, Feb. 28 in Baldwin Auditorium. The performance is a Mid-America Arts Alliance program. Free tickets will be available for students, faculty and staff beginning Feb. 24 in the Student Activities Board Office, SUB.

"Greater Tuna," by Jaston Williams, Joe Sears and Ed Howard, is a comedy about small-town America. The story is set in Tuna, Texas' third smallest town, "where the Lions Club is too liberal and Patsy Cline never dies."

Featuring the talents of J.C. Mullins and Terry Sneed, "Greater Tuna" was first produced by The Rep in 1986, with founding artistic director Cliff Fannin Baker directing. It received rave reviews from critics and audiences alike and broke all box office records for the 13-year-old professional theatre.

Local radio personalities Thurston Wheelis (Mullins) and Arles Struvie (Sneed) introduce and perform many of the town's residents on their morning news show at Tuna's radio station OKKK. From little Jody Bumiller and his eight dogs to Aunt Pearl Burras with her strychnine pills to would-be cheerleader Charlene Bumiller, Mullins and Sneed race through some 20 characters, each with different costumes, make-up and wigs.

The Arkansas Rep was founded in 1976 by Baker. He and a handful of Arkansas citizens, devoted to live theatre, decided to provide high quality, professional theatre and educational programming for the state and the region. Year-round programming includes an eight-show MainStage series, a three-show SecondStage series and several special event productions.

Baker has directed more than 80 MainStage productions. He has been guest director for the famed Alley Theatre in Houston, Southern

Rep in New Orleans and at American University in Washington, D.C. He is a past recipient of the Rockefeller Scholarship for the Arts and is a member of the Society of Stage Directors and Choreographers.

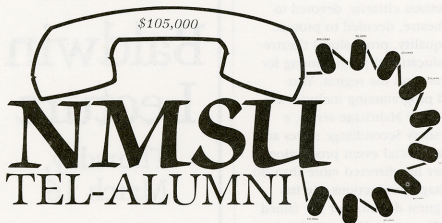
