THE GILBERT AND SULLIVAN OPERETTA "PATIENCE" will be performed at 8 tonight and Thursday night in Baldwin Auditorium by the Musical Theatre Workshop.

This operetta is a sprightly satire on the artistic craze of the last century with the affectations of two poets, Bunthorne and Grosvenor, and the silly adoration of their train of young ladies, Director J. G. Severns said.

Some of the prettiest and liveliest music to be found in any of the Gilbert and Sullivan musicals will be presented, Dale A. Jorgenson, musical conductor, said.

Thursday night's performance of "Patience" will take the place of the regular Arts in the Park program. Arts in the Park will continue with a presentation by Psychic Beverly Jaegers of St. Louis at 7 p.m. Thursday, July 14, in the Georgian Room of the Student Union Building.

Final examinations for the second session will be held August 12. Summer Commencement is set for 7:30 p.m. August 12.
