These numbers will be admitted at 8 a.m., 7, 8, 9, 0; at 9 a.m., 4, 5, 6; and at 10 a.m., 1, 2, 3. Card distribution will end at 10:30 a.m. Classwork will begin on registration day on a special one day schedule:

THE BOARD OF REGENTS of Northeast Missouri State University will hold its regular monthly meeting at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday in the President's Office/Board Room in the Administration/ Humanities Building.

STUDENT IDs for those students who have had their pictures taken by Safety and Security are ready today. Safety and Security, located in the lot next to Centennial Hall, will begin taking ID pictures again July 18.

A WET T-SHIRT CONTEST will be held on Thursday evening, July 20, in Red Barn Park. Twenty-five T-shirts will be awarded to the 25 persons who guess the closest number of gallons of water used by the average hall resident in an academic year. Entries will be taken and winners will be announced that evening. The contest is sponsored by the summer Energy Conservation Advisory Committee. A CONFERENCE IN SPECIAL EDUCATION called "Mainstreaming the Exceptional Student" will be held July 10-21 for two hours of undergraduate or graduate credit. This workshop will focus on the Behavioral Disordered, Learning Disabled and the Mentally Handicapped. Registration will be from 9 a.m. to 12 noon today in the Alumni Room of the Student Union Building. Workshop director is Velma Y. Morton, instructor in special education.

A MARK TWAIN SEMINAR called "Mark Twain's Western Experience" will be offered for three hours of academic credit during the second summer session. The course will focus upon the uniquely American experiences of Mark Twain between 1835-67 which contributed to the literary content and art of his works. Several field trips will be taken to points of interest concerning Mark Twain in Hannibal, St. Louis and Florida, Mo. Mrs. Madelene Sykes, instructor of English, will conduct the seminar.

A HOLOGRAPHY WORKSHOP will be offered from 12-3 p.m. July 10-28 through the Science Division. The workshop is designed to let students make their own holograms (three-dimensional pictures made with a laser light) as well as present the basic principles of holography. The course carries three hours of undergraduate or graduate credit. No previous courses in physics or mathematics are required although they would be helpful. Several art majors have taken the workshop and performed very well in it. A minimum of 18 students is required to hold the workshop.
