Sports Association Honors Cable

Bill Cable, who is currently in his 36th year as director of sports information, has

been named winner of the 1994 Warren Berg award by the College Sports Information Directors Association.

Cable will receive the award in Chicago, June 30.

Established in 1985, the Berg Award is presented annually to a member who is in NCAA Division II or III or the NAIA of

CoSIDA who has made an outstanding contribution to the field and has brought honor and prestige to the profession.

Cable is a member of the CoSIDA Hall of Fame and the Northeast Missouri State University Athletic Hall of Fame.

After graduating from the University of Missouri-Columbia with a journalism degree in 1956, Cable worked two months at Northeast before leaving for a two-year hitch in the Army. He served mostly in Korea, where he edited an award-winning company newsletter.

For 14 years following his return to Northeast in 1958, Cable created and organized the Sports Information Office, directed the institutional publications office and helped with the workload in the news bureau.

By 1972, Cable was named Northeast's first full-time director of sports information.

Since joining CoSIDA in 1971, Cable has attended 21 workshops, has served on the CoSIDA board of directors and has participated on several workshop panels and table topics. He is currently a member of the

Academic All-America Committee. Forty-nine of his publications have received CoSIDA awards.

Cable is serving or has served on: the board of directors of the Kirksville and U.S. Jaycees, the Kirksville Kiwanis Club, the Kirksville First United Methodist Church, the Kirksville Baseball-Softball Association, Northeast Missouri Area Health Council and the Kirksville Sheltered Workshop.

Cable and his wife, Dianthe Truitt Cable, have two daughters, Krista Cable Llewellyn and Sara Cable. ☺

Tree Name Plates Enhance Learning Environment

This spring, faculty, students and campus visitors were greeted by blooming flowers, budding branches and name plates that seemed to sprout from tree trunks across campus. The name plates generated discussion concerning their purpose and the welfare of the trees on which they were placed.

Mark Lee, chief of administrative services, said the name plates were placed on the trees to further Northeast's learning environment. Each name plate carries the name of the tree and allows passers-by to identify the tree at a glance. The name plates encourage active learning by providing a natural laboratory for students.

Donna Ford, assistant professor of biology, said that the name plates "show a concern for the grounds and the environment." The decision to use name plates was explored

extensively with the health of the tree in mind. Name plates attached to the trees were chosen over grounded name plates for public safety reasons. Encircling name bands were rejected as they could inhibit trunk growth. The final decision called for name plates that could be attached directly to the tree.

Ford maintains that the aluminum nails that secure the name plates will in no way harm the tree. In addition, there are springs attached to the nails between the actual plate and the tree. These springs allow the tree trunk to continue expanding in diameter. A treatment was also painted onto the tree where the nails were driven in. Ford claims that attaching a name plate to the trunk is a common practice and is the method of identification for the Missouri Botanical Gardens. ☺

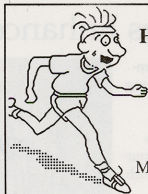
