"THE WORLD OF MARK TWAIN" will be discussed in three lectures on Wednesday and Thursday by Dr. John Hollenbach, professor of English from Hope College in Holland, Mich.

At 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, he will present a talk on "My Mark Twain" in the Little Theatre of Baldwin Hall. The series will conclude with "Mark Twain's Quarrel with God" at 10:30 a.m. Thursday in 305 Administration/Humanities Building.

The lectures are sponsored by the Language and Literature Division with a grant from the Missouri Committee for the Humanities, the state-based association of the National Endowment for the Humanities.
