Editor's comments

Questionnaires are fun! Since I sent one on Homecoming to the graduates of 1930, 1940, 1955 and 1970, I find myself racing to the mailbox every morning to read what some graduates had on their minds. (By the way, Homecoming will be October 24-25, and we will be sending you more information soon.)

One graduate responded that she would not be attending Homecoming because she did not travel to states which had not passed the Equal Right Amendment. What has that to do with NMSU? I don't know.

Most expressed pleasant memories about KSTC, NMSTC, NMSC or NMSU (take your pick).

Adelaide (Cauby) Finley of Sedalia (1930) remembered the performance of "Androcles and the Lion."

"Androcles pulled too hard on the lion's tail," she recalled. "Off it came! Androcles fell over backward and the lion fell forward; the audience was convulsed."

I don't think that "Androcles and the Lion" has been performed at NMSU since that day.

R. E. Hauptmann (1930) of Macon remembers the time Mr. Stokes and he were working on the construction

of the new football field (Stokes Stadium).

"Mr. Stokes set a tripod and transit down and shoved it towards me to catch . . . in amazement I said, 'Mr. Stokes, I don't know how to use this equipment,'" Hauptmann said.

Stokes reportedly replied: "Son, you don't know what's under a cow pile until you turn it over. Get in this car and we will go to the construction site, and I will show you how to set grade stakes."

The class of 1940 boasts having the first Homecoming queen, Martha Decker Blair of Wichita, Kan.

Mrs. Blair writes: "Being Homecoming queen (the first) . . . was truly unexpected by me. I do recall a student saying: 'I hope you win. I voted for you five times.'"

Members of the class remembered many of their favorite teachers, too: Dr. Barrett Stout, "He was always so kind, sympathetic, understanding and a perfect gentleman," writes Edith LaBonta Draper of Overland Park, Kan.

E. L. McNeely, La Jolla, Calif., president of the student council that year, remembers "Agnes Slemmons because of her sense of humor. She

was sprightly, supporting and encouraging."

Members of the class of 1955 gave the faculty high marks, too. Perhaps Robert Moore of Barry, Ill., said it best: "While attending KSTC, the faculty in my opinion was one of the best and most dedicated in the U.S., starting with Dr. Ryle, Dr. White, Dr. Dolan, Mr. Boyd King, Mr. Kenny Gardner, Dr. Rosebery, Miss Nan Wade, Miss Agnes Slemmons, Miss Worrell, Miss Bernice Beggs, Dr. Bray and others who I have failed to mention. They were instructors who taught their classes and were highly interested in quality education. I was happy to be a student and graduate of KSTC."

Mona (Overton) Hamby of Brimson, Mo., said: "I have many memories and a proud feeling every time I read of any happenings or accomplishments of my Alma Mater. I'm glad to be a Life Member of the Alumni Association!"

Lake parties were a common theme expressed in the questionnaires returned by the members of the class of 1970.

Aside from those lighter moments, Mark Rubin of Rock Tavern, N.Y.,

wrote: "Kirksville was a most meaningful, enjoyable and memorable experience for me; I shall always recall my four years there as perhaps the warmest and most joyous days of my youth. A part of Kirksville is carried around in me and gives me great warmth every time I recall it. What a wondrous gift it gave me!"

Statements like that make alumni relations easy.

We will keep you informed about future Homecoming developments in the NEMOSCOPE and through special mailings. Remember the dates and make your plans.

Something old . . .

Missou Hall buddies reminisce

Ask one of today's students at Northeast Missouri State University about Missouri Hall, and he will tell you of a five-story structure, housing more than 600 men, with carpeted lounges, a spacious dining area and a telephone in each room.

But ask any alumnus of the 1950s about the Missouri Hall of that era and you will probably hear of a one-story, T-shaped barracks where living conditions were much less plush and a kind of "animal house" atmosphere prevailed.

In 1947 after the tury of World War II had subsided, veterans began to pour into universities to continue their education. The Federal Emergency Housing Project was constructed at NMSU that year to help hold the surplus of students.

The project consisted of 33 apartments to house married veterans and their families and one dormitory for 62 single vets. The entire area took on several names—"Muddville Flats," "Vetville" and "Grandview Heights"—but the dormitory finally became known as Missou Hall.

Before its rebirth as a men's dormitory, Missou Hall was used as an administration building by the federal government. After the war, it was donated to the college. The project stood directly in front of what is now Ryle Hall, close to where Fair Apartments currently are located.

Tom Churchwell, assistant to the dean of instruction, served as assistant house father in the dorm while a student during the 1950s. Living quarters, he said, were "not real luxurious.

"There were two men to a room. Each room had a double-deck bed, a couple of desks and chairs and two closets the width of a door. It was paneled with siding that looked like knotty-pine barn panels. There was no air conditioning; it was like an oven for the guy on the top bunk."

Missou Hall had one lounge and television, a public shower and washroom and a row of toilets to serve its entire population. Not everything in the dorm worked to perfection, Churchwell remembers.

"There was a flaw in the plumbing," he said. "When you flushed the toilet, you were supposed to yell 'flush!' If you didn't, the guy in the shower would get scalded. It lead to a lot of cursing and a few fights," Churchwell said with a chuckle.

was coming to the University to look over the facilities in Missou Hall.

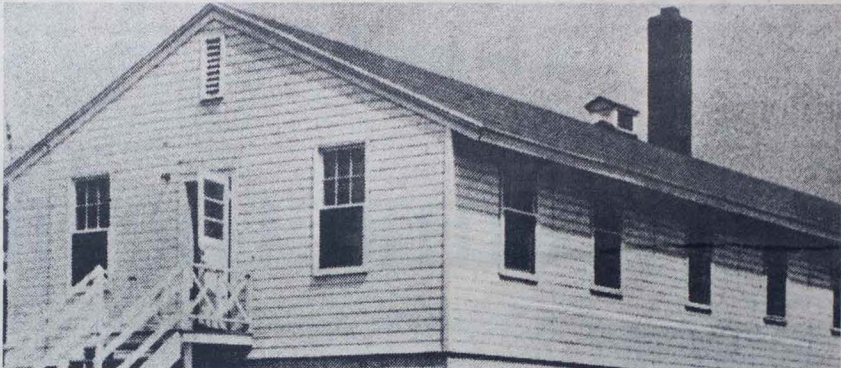
"You never knew what to expect down there," said Elam. "There was one pay telephone in Missou Hall and it was almost always occupied, so you had to walk in 'cold turkey.'"

Elam recalled the occasion when a student came to the University with his grandparents, requesting to see his future room in Missou Hall. Elam said that although he tried to divert them, it was to no avail. The scene

student later enrolled and went on to graduate from the University.

During the time the veterans housing units stood on campus, no Student Union Building existed. Student hang-outs became the several small establishments which surrounded the grounds—"The Bulldog Inn," "The Huddle" and others—or people gathered at Missou Hall.

Lewis Cody, superintendent of schools in Moberly, lived in the dorm

Missou Hall began as a veteran's housing unit, but through the years it also housed athletes and at times became a sort of catch-all for students who couldn't get into another dormitory.

"We felt that if the foreign students could make it though their first year in Missou Hall, then they would stay," said Charles Elam, currently director of extension services and formerly director of admissions. "They were subjected to a different kind of life style there than they were used to, I'm sure."

As director of admissions, one of Elam's duties was to show prospective students the housing units that they would be living in. Elam said he usually "cringed" upon discovering that a first-time freshman

which they encountered inside the dorm left the admissions director quite flustered.

"When we entered the dorm, we found a group of men sitting around half-dressed, leaning against their chair backs. They were playing poker and the table was covered with cards and money. Some one yelled to the dormitory director, 'you have a visitor to look at a room.' About that time we heard the toilet flush, and the director rounded the partition separating the toilet area from the main lounge, still hitching at his pants. I tried to act as professional as I could, but I know I turned green from embarrassment."

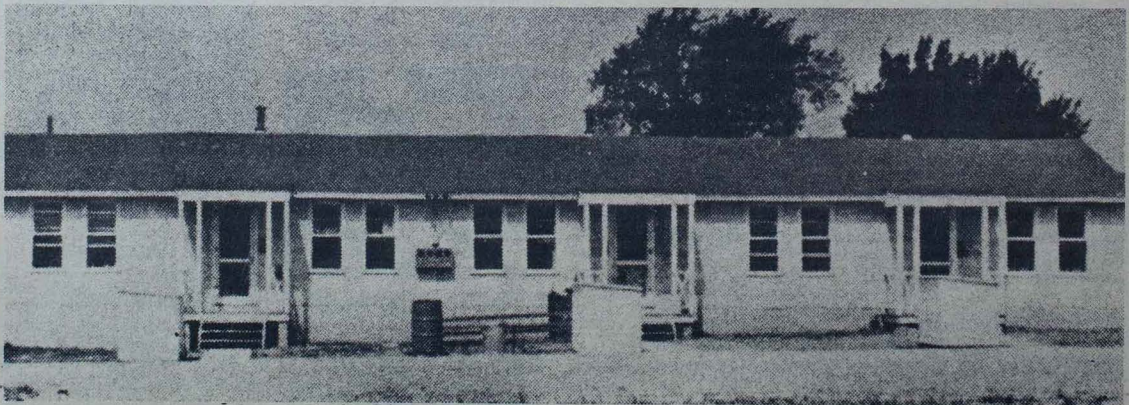
Elam said that he had been sure that NMSU had lost the student to another institution. However, the

"I wouldn't want to incriminate myself," Cody said jokingly, "but I guess there was a lot of action there. You have to understand that we were all single veterans of World War II. Life there was an extension of the way we lived during the war. Oh, it was a little better. The walls were painted."

Missou Hall was used for student housing until 1962, when the construction of Ryle Hall began. By this time, it had become a fire hazard and was damaged by termites. Between 1962-63, the dormitory was torn down.

"We hated to see it go," said Elam. "It was such a prominent landmark; not a very attractive one, but a prominent one."

Something new. . .

Ag. addition given green light

An agriculture major could probably learn what he needs to know about meat by reading a textbook and sitting through a series of lectures. But he might learn more quickly and thoroughly if he were placed in a laboratory and faced with a side of beef.

That is the rationale behind the plan to build a \$1.6 million agriculture addition, consisting largely of laboratory space, to the Industrial Education Building.

The proposal received the official recommendation of Gov. Joseph P. Teasdale in January and was approved by the legislature in April.

Rep. Harry Hill of Novinger, a member of the Appropriations Committee, was instrumental in getting the proposal approved by the House of Representatives. Sen. Norman Merrell, president pro-tem of the Missouri Senate, helped shepherd the plans through the Senate.

After legislative approval was given, the members of the agriculture faculty began finalizing their educational specifications. "We have

a fairly definite idea of what we'd like and how far the money goes in relation," said Dr. Dennis Rowan, associate professor of animal science.

Among the requested spaces in the new building are an animal science lab with an auxiliary room to house small animals, a meats lab, an agricultural mechanics lab, a greenhouse, a plant science lab and a soil science lab. In addition to laboratories and storage areas, there may be 12 to 15 faculty offices, four classrooms and a 200-seat auditorium.

But, Rowan said, "Laboratory space is the critical thing."

A meats lab, for example, would bring the student together with that side of beef. He would be able to measure the tenderness of the muscle. He would be able to divide the meat into wholesale and retail cuts. He would be able to prepare, cure and cook the meat. And he would be able to taste the results of his efforts.

A larger area would be necessary for an agricultural mechanics lab. There the student could study and practice tractor and machinery maintenance as well as small building

construction.

Animal nutrition, clinical pathology, and anatomy and physiology are three areas that would benefit from an animal science laboratory, where students would work with live animals.

A plant science lab and a soil science lab, which could be combined if necessary, would allow students to learn about everything from horticulture and field crops to landscape design.

"I anticipate that there will be a number of classes added (to the curriculum) once we get laboratory space," Rowan said. "As we get more facilities and more faculty, we can have a broader program, which then might include short courses, seminars—things of this nature—which might have more interest to local adults."

But the agriculture program is not hurting for students as it is. Since 1974, there has been a 112 percent increase in agriculture students and a 176 percent increase in agriculture majors.

"The University seems to make a commitment on several fronts at one

time to broaden the agriculture program," Rowan said. "We had the students. That came first. And it was a rapidly growing program—a lot of students in proportion to the number of faculty. And so there's a commitment on increased faculty, and the facility, and also the farm."

The farm is an actual agricultural site the University is in the process of buying. "That can be our most important laboratory," Rowan said.

From the desks of the agriculture faculty, the list of specifications goes to the office of the dean of instruction, where its feasibility is reviewed. Sometime this summer an architect will be hired. Designing and planning will take place this winter, and construction bids will be taken in early 1981. Doug Winicker, campus planner, said he is looking for construction to begin in the spring.

When everything falls into place, the agriculture student will come face to face with a side of beef. Even with all the complaints about the price of meat today, most educators would agree that \$1.6 million is a fair price for that particular side of beef.

Vows exchanged in Garden

Forecast: Sunny, blue skies.

The perfect weather report for a garden wedding.

Two couples have begun their lives together in outdoor weddings in the Sunken Garden at Northeast Missouri State University.

In recent years two or three couples annually have staged their ceremonies on campus locations including the Sunken Garden.

One of the first formal weddings to be held in the garden belonged to Mark Rubin (B.S.E. 1970, M.A. 1971) and Barbara Ebert (B.S. 1969).

The Kirksville Daily Express in its June 1, 1971, edition reported that it was the second wedding known to have taken place there.

"I had always admired it and I thought it was perfectly set up for a wedding ceremony," Barbara says. She set the ceremony at the east end and the reception at the west end.

The garden provided a romantic setting for the Rubins. When they were dating, they often would walk through the garden.

"It was a place that was special to us and that we enjoy going to until this day," Mark says.

"We always come back to Missouri in the summer and we always visit the Sunken Garden," Barbara says. Her parents live in Trenton.

To arrange for the wedding, Mark made a special request to University President Charles J. McClain. He says he remembers that Dr. McClain was "cooperative and positive. He said he thought it was a beautiful idea."

After the arrangements were made, "then we just prayed for nice weather," Barbara says.

About 45-50 people attended the Rubin wedding on May 29, 1971, colored in hot pink. Despite a week of rain, the day of the wedding dawned with blue skies overhead.

The University provided chairs and other services at no charge. Today a small fee is made to cover wages of employees to set up chairs and electrical connections.

One of the most recent weddings to take place joined Ronald Keffer (B.S. 1980) of Keytesville and Janelle Miller of Fort Dodge, Iowa, on April 28. The weather also was perfect.

The Keffers say they pictured a wedding outside. They met on campus in December 1979 at a party

in Dobson Hall so they wanted to be married on campus, Ronald says.

"I've always wanted to get married outside," Janelle says. "I thought it was pretty on campus with all the flowers."

The couple decided to get married before Ronald was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Marines. He will be stationed for basic training for five months at Camp Barrett in Quantico, Va.

While he completes his officer's training, Janelle will finish her degree in psychology.

About 75 people attended the wedding decorated in blue and yellow. It also marked the occasion of Janelle's 21st birthday.

The garden itself was established on the site of the basement of old

Baldwin Hall that burned in 1924. Several attempts were made by the University to rebuild the hall on its original site but state funds were not available.

J.S. Stokes, long-time professor of physics, was appointed custodian of equipment and grounds on June 1, 1925. One of his duties was to "solve the large, ugly hole left when the rubble had been cleared away, exposing the basement of Baldwin Hall," according to the "Centennial History of the Northeast Missouri State Teachers College" by the late Walter H. Ryle III.

"Out of this hole, Stokes created a lovely sunken garden with beautiful flowers," the book reports. "The garden became a landmark for more recent generations of students. The sunken garden was beautiful with flowers during the spring and summer of 1927."

When Kirk Memorial was built in 1940, the Sunken Garden received a more formal status with plantings brilliant with color from early spring to late autumn. At each end of the garden, a vine-covered pergola, or an arbor with a lattice-work roof, was located.

The Rubins live in Rock Tavern, N.Y. He teaches physical science at Suffern (N.Y.) Junior High School and she is a homemaker. They have two daughters, Jennifer and Amy.

The Keffers are just beginning.

The garden "creates a beautiful memory that lasts even unto today," Mark says.

Another forecast for a sunny life seems to go with the garden. "We're very happy, and in this day and age, that's something," Barbara says.

Blue Moon food double good

"I'll have a double cheeseburger, fries and a double cola."

That's the phrase students have been telling Pearl "Mom" Russell for the last 11 years at the Blue Moon.

One of the landmark restaurants in Kirksville, the Blue Moon has remained basically the same since Pearl and her husband, Clifford, opened the business more than a decade ago.

The handwritten menus, featuring the famous double cheeseburgers,

hamburgers, french fries, tater tots and double colas, still look the same as they did in 1969.

The dusty leather saddles and American flags that sit in the front window appear to have been there since the opening, too.

"We haven't changed much since the beginning," Pearl says. "Oh, we did put in some carpet because it got too hard to clean the linoleum floor. But other than that I imagine anyone who came here when we opened would still recognize the place today."

There are no fancy decorations or gimmicks to entice customers. The building is tucked away between two businesses at 911 N. Franklin and is hardly noticeable. Its wood-paneled front lacks any signs of identification.

The uncomfortable booths are covered with brown vinyl, and plastic flowers adorn the formica tabletops. Lighted beer signs advertising their stock cover the paneled walls. The bar, at which 3-2 beer is served every day of the week, is wooden and in need of refinishing. The interior lighting is dim and the bits of Americana decorations are hardly visible through the yellow-stained windows.

Pearl says, "We have just about the worst location for a restaurant and the worst building in town."

But what makes the Blue Moon continue to be one of the most popular restaurants in Kirksville?

Pearl says the low prices, good cooking, and friendly atmosphere are probably the main reasons for its success.

As chief cook and bottle washer since her husband's death last June, Pearl says, "When it comes to cooking, I like something quick and easy, nothing fancy."

So she came up with the popular short-order menu that customers have found to be close to their mother's home cooking.

There has been one change, however, on the menu since 1969. With the rising cost of meat, Pearl was forced to raise her prices. But she has had to only once in the last 11 years. Double cheeseburgers are now \$1.15 compared to the original \$1.05. French fries are 60 cents and a double cola is 35 cents. A complete meal can be purchased for a reasonable \$2.15.

Although Pearl receives a helping hand from her son, Rick, and sister, Faye, many times she takes the order, rushes back to the kitchen to prepare it and in 10 minutes has it served. Later she washes the dishes by hand.

Before his death, Clifford had been the main waiter and established a good rapport with many of the students. He was known for giving

customers complimentary Tootsie Rolls after each meal.

When Pearl and Clifford purchased the Blue Moon it was only a bar. But the Russells decided to expand it to a restaurant, although they had no experience in that business.

"We didn't have any money, so we didn't have anything to lose," she says.

The restaurant's reputation spread fast and became a popular eating place not only for college students, but also for townspeople.

"We've served President McClain, City Manager John Pelzer, State Rep. Harry Hill, lawyers, college faculty members and even a baseball team," Pearls says she remembers.

But one thing all customers have in common is that they leave the restaurant satisfied with their meal.

"I think that's why I love my work. Everybody appreciates it," Pearl says. "Customers always leave happy and I can hardly remember a complaint, even when in a hurry and the meat is accidentally left off the sandwich."

Pearl says she plans to keep the Blue Moon open every day of the year as long as she can walk. She also foresees no changes in the business.

"Oh, I might fix the water spot on the ceiling that rain has been leaking through. But every time Clifford had talked about fixing the building up, the students would tell him not to change anything because they liked it just the way it was."

She says they have had several offers to sell, but she would rather see her children take the business over someday.

Many of Pearl's customers who were former students in Kirksville still stop by when they return to town for a visit to say hi to Mom and have a famous meal.

One female graduate of Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine who was married in Galt last June returned to Kirksville to have her wedding reception at the Blue Moon.

And what did all 32 guests order? Thirty-two double cheeseburgers, fries, and double colas.

Adviser backs First Amendment

The First Amendment and its rights and responsibilities belong in the high school journalism program.

Carol Speck Schmidt (B.S.E. 1973) said she teaches her students at Hazelwood East High School to meet professional journalistic standards.

She spoke to 75 persons on April 14 at the opening session of the 1980 Communication Week at Northeast Missouri State University. Schmidt was selected as the Outstanding

Alumna in Communication, an annual award presented by the Mass Communication Club and the Alumni Association.

Student publications, the newspaper SPECTRUM and the yearbook PEGASUS, at Hazelwood East have won many awards under her guidance. The SPECTRUM recently won All-Missouri honors from the Missouri Interscholastic Press Association for the first time. The PEGASUS was named All-Missouri from MIPA in 1978 and 1979.

Aside from advising award-winning publications, she has received some individual awards. She was nominated for the Missouri Outstanding Journalism Teacher in 1979 and 1980.

"Your students nominate you, which I think is really neat," she said. She was named one of three Missouri Outstanding Journalism Teachers in 1980.

Schmidt said she teaches her students the ethics she learned as a student at the University, including the right of freedom of the press.

"I learned more about journalism at NMSU—even when the University didn't offer a journalism or mass communication degree—than I have ever learned in one block of time since then."

As editor of the student newspaper, the Index, Schmidt did not write "goody-two-shoes stands." At NMSU she said she remembers she always exercised the rights of the First Amendment.

"I don't ever remember anyone telling me not to run a piece of copy because (A) it was too controversial; (B) someone whom we were supposed to please wouldn't like it; (C) it might lose an advertising account; or (D) it was not appropriate."

On the Index, she also served as reporter, copy editor and editorial consultant.

As one of 10 reporters, her beat was Violette Hall. That included news on business, education, special education, social studies, language and literature, military science and alumni.

She worked all night every Monday before the Index deadline.

"I remember a steady diet of pizzas—since it was the only food item a starving newspaper staff could get delivered to the door of Adair House at late hours."

From Northeast she went to study at the University of Missouri-Columbia to receive an M.A. in Journalism in 1974.

She has advised the entire journalism program at Hazelwood East since 1977. Her previous teaching job was at Jennings Senior High School where she taught journalism and English.

Freedom of the press as a right is not accepted in all places, she said. "As a high school journalism teacher, I've encountered frequent problems with freedom of the press."

Freedom of the press also means responsibility. She suggested that future journalists never trust one source, always double check the facts and strive for accuracy in reporting.

"As long as you're a journalist, you'll have to teach people about freedom of the press and why it's essential," the high school journalism teacher said.

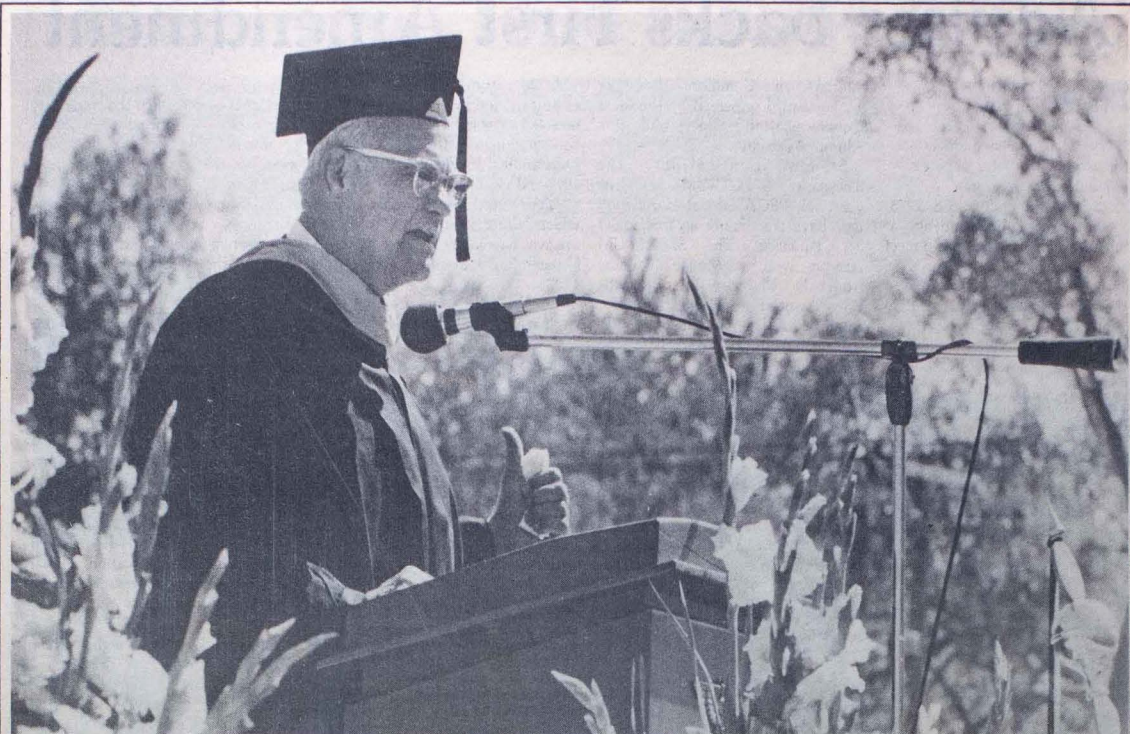

Elaine turns dispatcher to stay in touch

Elaine Curtis, former owner of Elaine's Dining Room, always has been known for her friendly service to the students of Northeast Missouri State University.

She no longer provides that service in the form of a waitress and proprietor, however, but as night dispatcher of the Safety and Security Office of NMSU.

Elaine opened her dining room in the Northtown Shopping Center in 1957, the first business to be established there, and it soon became a favorite night spot for students.

"Students always came out at night with their books and drank coffee for hours," Elaine says. "We closed at midnight and usually had to run them out."

Tuesday nights were big for sorority and fraternity gatherings. After their meetings, members of the Greek organizations went to Elaine's to drink coffee, sample her famous pecan rolls and sign pledge books.

"On some Tuesday nights, there were as many as 400 people there," Elaine says. "I was even made an honorary member of the Alphas."

Until the opening of the Student Union Building in 1967, Elaine's Dining Room remained a popular hang-out for students. In 1978, a fire which started in the bowling alley destroyed four businesses, including

the restaurant. With building costs rising and interest rates high, construction of a new restaurant was out of the question.

"If prices hadn't been doing what they were, I'd be right back in there," Elaine says. "In 1957, I built the restaurant for \$40,000. Now, the same thing would be \$250,000. But after 27 years in the restaurant business, I didn't know if I could do anything else."

After a year spent salvaging equipment from the fire, Elaine was offered her present job by the University, and she "grabbed it fast."

"My husband, Paul, realized that I had to have something to do," she says. "I'm not the type to sit here, bored, doing nothing. I felt like I had no purpose in life."

Elaine works the 11 p.m. to 7 a.m. shift and she says that it suits her very well. "You can do anything you want during the day," she says. "Then you can go out to dinner or a party of any kind, and be at work by 11. And you don't work weekends."

Although she is happy in her new job, Elaine said that the dining business is still her love and that she "misses the kids the most." In her mind, the secret to a successful business was very simple.

"Students came there because we made them feel wanted."

Civil rights leader shares views

For Lloyd Brown (B.S. 1976) there's no place like home. Brown says he believes a college graduate should return home to help build something that will last.

Brown's a believer in homecomings, too. So it was only fitting the Association of Black Collegians (ABC) at Northeast Missouri State University honored him as guest speaker for its alumni banquet.

In 1972, Brown gave the local chapter direction when it was struggling to exist. Before coming to NMSU, he served two four-year terms as national president of ABC. From Brown's election in 1968, the organization grew from nine to 57 chapters.

In his address to local chapter members, Brown spoke about the survival of blacks in America. "I told them what they should be doing as students and what those who have graduated should be doing."

Brown has a long understanding about the problems blacks face. Since 1965, he has been active in the struggle over civil and human rights. This struggle has taken him to many places throughout the country.

In recent years, however, the pace has cooled for Brown. "There was a time in my life when I was home only two days a month," says he. "I don't want to go back to that. I want to enjoy my family."

Presently, he is employed as deputy executive general manager of the Wellston School District, St. Louis. The Wellston district, which is 90 percent black, is located in the neighborhood where Brown grew up.

"I moved out at one time, but when I saw some things deteriorating, I returned. It's important to be back home and build, especially with black kids. Now we're helping to build a



good education for the students," he explains.

Brown insists he does not paint a "rose-colored" world for those attending school in the Wellston district.

"I don't hide the fact that they're going to have problems because they're black," he emphasizes. "Their problems are going to increase now because of the economy. I tell them to be strong, to align themselves with people who are strong and to get as much education as possible."

By working with black youth and by having direct contact with the educational process, Brown says he tries to inspire students to better themselves and situations around

them. "You get tired sometimes, that's why I hope some of the things I say will inspire black kids to become leaders."

Brown knows well the role of leadership, having assumed such a position for numerous years with ABC. He contends he was elevated to this position unintentionally.

"I never intended to be a leader," he says. "You're faced with situations, you react to them, and all of a sudden you become a leader."

Brown is still involved with ABC and the struggle for expanded civil rights, although not in a leadership capacity. "I want to sit back with my family and let someone else carry the load," he says.

Brown says he will never stop working towards the development of a more independent black society. "I'd like to go on as long as possible, but my biggest goal is to see blacks build for themselves, to build their own schools, shopping centers, etc. I want them to become totally independent, that's the only way we will survive. If I saw that movement met—I'd be happy."

Both Brown and his wife, the former Mae J. Irvin (B.S. 1976) are currently enrolled as graduate students at Webster College, St. Louis. Brown is pursuing a degree in public administration. "The more education I can obtain, the better I can help the school system," he says.

During his assignment with the CIA, Andrews dealt with east Asian affairs. He has written a book called "The Village War" published in 1973.

He describes the work of the agency:

"There are more things, I think, that make the agency like the University than different from the University. You have at CIA some of the greatest collection of scholars that I think you will find anywhere."

Many of the reports produced by the CIA are open to the public. For the United States to be successful in its relationships with other countries, the nation must have a strong intelligence agency, he said.

Placement for pros

The Career Planning and Placement Center at Northeast Missouri State University provides continuing employment service to alumni.

In the past 10 years, the center reported job placements for more than 90 percent of those former students who re-enrolled for placement service.

Katie Bohon, center director, said of 1,341 registrants in 1970, 91.5 percent or 1,227 found jobs through the center.

Those figures reflect jobs for both teaching and non-teaching candidates.

"More and more each year we are providing more and more non-teaching jobs," she said.

The on-campus recruitment schedule for non-teaching majors showed 16 percent more interviews in 1979-80 because of the efforts of a full-time recruitment counselor.

The counselor, who is Jan Fishback (B.S. 1979), travels to visit potential employers and obtains job information. Companies then send interviewers to campus.

"Any alum is eligible to use our service," Mrs. Bohon said.

A \$10 fee is presently charged for re-enrollment. The fee includes candidates names on the active available list, receipt of a weekly

vacancy bulletin published from February through September and release of five sets of credentials.

In 1979 the center listed 22,930 jobs that were circulated to students and alumni.

No charge is made to update placement papers by adding current recommendations, redoing information sheets or changing addresses.

As an added service, a Career Library has been established in Blanton Hall by the Special Services Office. Special Services working in cooperation with the center provides career counseling in addition to other student help activities.

"One excellent career opportunity continues to be teaching.

"Those alums with teaching degrees can certainly find a lot of opportunity for re-entering the market," she said.

The center has identified a definite teacher shortage throughout Missouri and the Midwest especially in out-state Missouri. Severe teacher shortages exist in science, mathematics, industrial arts, music and special education.

The employment statistics at the center show that its activities are the most extensive of any placements office in the state, Mrs. Bohon said.

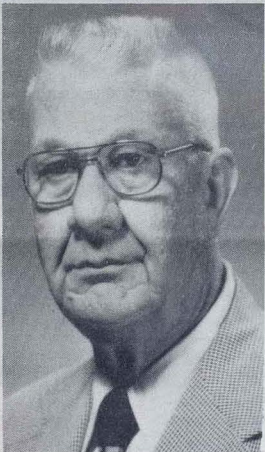

Mrs. McKinney speaks their language

"Mrs. McKinney, my check has not come in yet."

"Mrs. McKinney, my class schedule is still not written out."

"Mrs. McKinney...."

Fran McKinney, international student adviser, assisting more than 260 foreign students, says, "I would hate it if I didn't hear my name."

A tall, fairly soft-spoken woman, Mrs. McKinney tries to listen and have time for each student. They walk in and out of her office each day with doubts about their classes, late checks, a missing parcel, visa or passport problem or some other personal problem.

Mrs. McKinney says, however, "Foreign students don't complain much, but they worry a lot about their classes, grades or things they don't understand and I try to assure them. The only complaint that I hear often is about the food."

Soosan Nimrouzi, sophomore from Iran, says, "When I was hospitalized for three months last year, I just did not know what to do with everything. I had lots of problems. The only person who could help me was Mrs. McKinney. She helped me straighten out my classes and gave me a lot of confidence."

Nimrouzi says Iranian students were especially apprehensive when the crisis broke out. "We felt very insecure and upset because we had to have the interview with the U.S. immigration. Mrs. McKinney told us not to worry. She is really great. She was behind us all the time and gave us so much support."

Mrs. McKinney says she knew the Iranian students were feeling left out, and many were upset. She keeps close contact with them, giving them assurance and working with them. Mrs. McKinney says she believes, regardless of nationality, her students

are students, and she will handle their problems to the best of her ability. "In times of crisis, we should look at both sides of the problem, not just one side," she explains.

Though Mrs. McKinney was not aware of her earned title, she has been looked upon as a mother figure by many of the students.

Graduate student Sumbat Jitmond, from Thailand, says, "Since I transferred up here from Florida, I have often heard Mrs. McKinney being referred to as mother of foreign students by my friends and countrymen. I, myself, highly respect her. If she did not help me with my visa soon after my arrival, I would have been in trouble. Big trouble."

By updating the students' visas, passports, and other immigration requirements, Jitmond says the International Student Office takes away more than half of the students' responsibilities.

"I had to handle everything by myself in my former University. At NMSU, under the care of Mrs. McKinney, I feel at home and comfortable," Jitmond says.

Mrs. McKinney says she takes care of the students from the time they write to her until the time they leave for home or transfer. Since the students are far away from home, McKinney tries to make them feel comfortable and happy during their stay.

"Sometimes a student's parents would write to me, saying that they have not heard from their son or daughter. We call the student to the office and make him or her write a long letter or send cards to their parents," Mrs. McKinney says.

She is happy that her students trust her and come to her when in need. The students need someone whom they can talk with, Mrs. McKinney explains. "Sometimes the trouble that students land themselves into makes me so mad. They know that I will be angry if they tell me about it, but still they come. But, they know, too, that

I am angry because I don't want the mistake repeated."

Because of McKinney's likable nature, Eyad Aljundi, freshman from Syria, says, "I visit her time and again because I like her. I know she is busy most of the time, but she likes us to visit her sometimes so she can see how we are doing."

Problems, doubts and worries Mrs. McKinney has tried to solve every day since her appointment in 1959 by the late Dr. Walter Ryle. She says, "I have the best job on campus. There is nothing difficult about working with different students at a time because

people are basically alike around the world.

"My biggest challenge is to have no probation for the foreign students in the near future. We produce some very outstanding students and one of them is an ambassador to the United Nations. Oh, I can recall so many incidents that have happened in the past. Some funny, some sad, some rewarding, some..."

Before she can finish the sentence, she is interrupted by another visitor: "Mrs. McKinney, I cannot find my ID card. How will I eat tonight?"

Physics major becomes nuclear officer

Jack Schaffner III of St. Charles has been selected to serve as a nuclear propulsion officer in the U.S. Navy upon graduation from Northeast Missouri State University.

Schaffner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Albert Schaffner Jr. of 3126 Elm St., majored in physics while at Northeast.

The nuclear propulsion program accepts only about one of every six applicants. The screening process for Schaffner included a personal interview with Adm. Hyman Rickover.

At the University, he received the Gen. John J. Pershing Scholarship for all four academic years. Pershing Scholars must maintain a 3.5 grade point average on a 4.0 scale in addition to leadership qualities and campus involvement.

Mrs. Lackey currently teaches Earth Science and Life Science at Shelbina Junior High School.

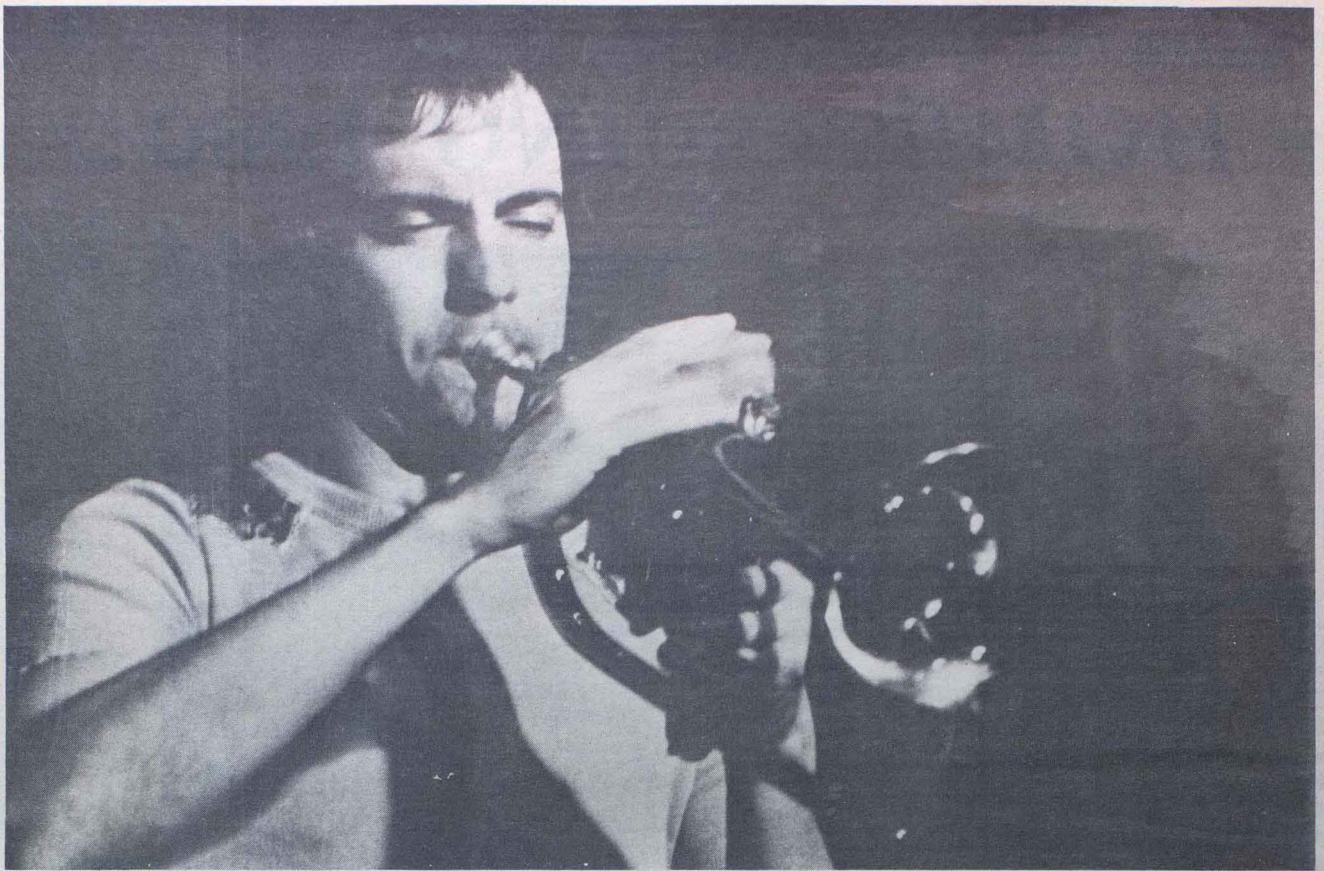

Trumpeter jazzes up annual festival

"I only play trumpet—and I'm still trying to get it right."

Mike Metheny (M.A. 1976) plays the trumpet well enough to return to Northeast Missouri State University as guest soloist at the 12th annual Phi Mu Alpha Jazz Festival on Feb. 23.

He also plays the trumpet well enough to teach jazz at Berklee College of Music in Boston. The college offers jazz study to 2,000 musicians.

Before he came to Kirksville, he practiced the classical approach to trumpet. He studied at the University of Missouri-Columbia to earn a B.S. in Music Education in 1971.

Once at Northeast, Metheny became involved with the band-jazz program and joined Phi Mu Alpha men's professional music fraternity.

"Here (at Northeast), I was interested in jazz and it was a perfect

training ground."

Metheny cited Dr. Roger Cody, professor of music, as a great influence in his music career.

"I have a lot of respect for him," he said.

Cody returns the compliment. Dedication, hard work and a humble nature always have been the trademarks of Metheny, Cody said.

"I don't think I've ever had a grad assistant who worked harder and spent more hours than Mike. Not only in self-improvement, but in just taking care of the job."

Metheny's lab band rated excellent. "It wasn't so much because the players he had to deal with were good, but it was the evidence of good teaching," Metheny's teacher said.

While at the University, Metheny played in a jazz group which performed at an establishment known as

the Firehouse and, occasionally, at the Tap Room.

Metheny's schedule of performances has taken him over the United States and even to Europe.

After leaving Columbia, he enlisted in the service to become a member of the U.S. Army Field Band from 1971-74. As a trumpet player in this group, Metheny traveled to 35 different states.

The musician's transition to the East Coast opened new horizons in performing in addition to education.

Metheny performs with his quartet and sometimes with brother Pat, a jazz guitarist, in Boston where live bands play jazz in about 20 clubs.

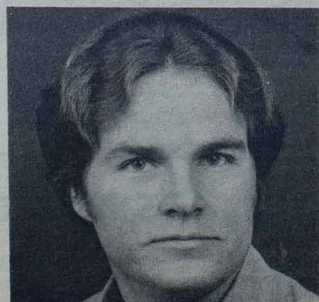
In 1978, the trumpeter, who was brought up in Lee's Summit, joined some old friends from Kansas City to form a combo that played in the Wichita Jazz Festival.

There they grabbed the attention of the American agent for the Berlin festival. By his recommendation, they were soon on their way to Germany.

Although the Berlin Jazz Festival is the most prestigious European festival and the audiences are very sophisticated, Metheny and his colleagues played "A Salute to Kansas City Jazz" which impressed even the critics. Cody said that the musical reviews of the group's performance were "excellent."

But what does Metheny think about the future for today's student who wants to continue playing "all that jazz?"

"It's going to be 'slim pickens' for the professional musician. You'll need to be very versatile to get work."



DEGREE A BIG PLUS—"It's like I've already gone through my first year of teaching," said Robert Skrukud, a new faculty member in the Mathematics Division of Black Hawk Junior College, Kewanee, Ill. Skrukud referred to the master's degree program which he recently completed at Northeast Missouri State University, Kirksville.

The new instructor worked as a graduate assistant in the Mathematics Division at NMSU, where course study and teaching experience are combined into the master's degree requirements to prepare graduate students to teach college mathematics.

"The help was definitely there when I needed it, due to an exceptionally good staff," said Skrukud. He added that coming to NMSU for his degree was "one of the best decisions I've ever made."

In addition to mathematics, NMSU offers graduate study in areas such as biology, business, science, education, English, fine arts, health, history, industrial education, counseling and guidance, social science and speech pathology.

Bravo, Bulldogs!

Two student athletes, who distinguished themselves in NMSU winter sports, have received two different types of All-America honors.

Senior wrestler Mike Duffy from Fort Madison, Iowa, earned his second successive All-America certificate after placing sixth at 150 pounds in the 1980 NCAA Division II Championships at Omaha, Neb.

Junior forward Sharon Witthoft from Washington, Iowa, was named to the 1980 College Division Academic All-America women's basketball third team, sponsored by U.S. Tobacco Company and selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Duffy is only the second Bulldog wrestler to have ever captured All-America accolades twice. He finished eighth a year ago in the 150-pound class.

During his four-year collegiate career, Duffy erased a number of school records. He compiled the

most victories in a career (93), most wins in a single campaign (30), most takedowns in one season (150), most takedowns in a single match (12) and most individual points in one bout (31).

Duffy amassed a 30-3-1 ledger this past winter, and suffered only 20 setbacks in 114 career matches.

This was the first year a women's academic team was chosen by CoSIDA. Witthoft, an animal science major with a 3.63 grade-point average on a 4.0 scale, underwent knee surgery in February. She was leading Northeast in scoring with a 17.1 average and in rebounding with an 8.9 figure when she sustained the injury.

Witthoft tossed in 37 points against Missouri Western this past season to set a new Bulldog single-game scoring record. She was picked as the Most Valuable Player in the 1980 Northern Illinois University Classic after leading her team to the tournament title.

Northeast Missouri State basketball players, who led their respective teams in scoring, received all-regional laurels at the end of this past season.

Junior forward David Winslow from East St. Louis, Ill., was chosen to the 1980 National Association of Basketball Coaches Division II South Central all-region second team for men. Sophomore center Carol Jarrard from Washington, Iowa, was selected to the 1980 AIAW all-Region 6 first team for women.

Winslow averaged 19.7 points and a team-leading 12.5 rebounds last winter, finishing 13th among NCAA Division II rebounders in final national statistics. He moved into the

top spot on NMSU's all-time single season scoring list with 512 points. Winslow also became the Bulldogs' fourth leading all-time single-campaign rebounder with 325 retrievals and the sixth leading all-time scorer with 969 points.

Jarrard averaged 18.0 points and 8.7 rebounds for the women's quintet. She shot .512 from the field, including a perfect 10 for 10 against Culver-Stockton College. Jarrard was named to the first all-tournament teams at the Northern Illinois University and William Woods Tournaments.

She was one of the top three vote getters for the AIAW all-regional team.

Senior Bob Fletcher from Burnaby, British Columbia, expects to be playing professional football this year in his Canadian homeland.

The Bulldog kicking specialist for the past two seasons signed a three-year contract in March with the Saskatchewan Roughriders. He was the second selection in the Canadian League's February draft.

Fletcher led 1979 NCAA Division II punters with a 43.2-yard average, and logged the ninth best average among all NCAA punters in IA, IAA, II and III. The Canadian shattered a Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association single game record with a 53-yard punting average against Northwest Missouri State last season.

A 52-yard field goal by Fletcher against NWMS last fall tied a school mark. He erased a couple of other NMSU standards—two field goals in a single game and eight field goals in a single campaign.

A former NMSU football player,

Lloyd Henry, signed this spring with the Washington Redskins of the National Football League.

Henry, a wide receiver from Waterloo, Iowa, was originally drafted by Miami in 1978 after playing for the Bulldogs between 1975-77. The Dolphins released Henry just before the start of the 1979 season.

While at NMSU, he was chosen to the Associated Press Little All-America honorable mention team as a junior and senior, and was named to the all-Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association list twice. At one time, Henry held two school records and shared two Northeast and three MIAA marks.

Other former Bulldogs with Canadian or National Football League teams are running back Lenvil Elliott with the San Francisco Forty Niners, running back Steve Powell with the Buffalo Bills and offensive guard Roland Mangold with the Montreal Alouettes in Canada.

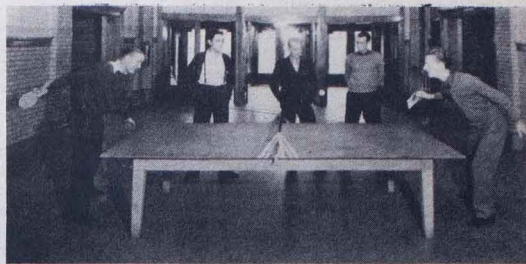

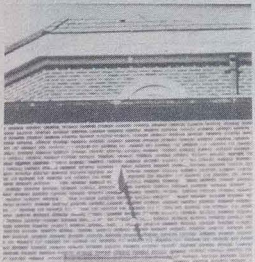

1980-81 funds approved

Northeast Missouri State University will receive \$13,792,753 in general revenue for fiscal year 1980-81. The amount, recently signed into law by Gov. Joseph P. Teasdale, is slightly more than the amount he had recommended to the legislature in January.

The increase is one of the largest percentage increases among the state's colleges and universities because NMSU developed its budget request based on quality indicators of student performance.

"The program has been in the formative stages for the last few years," President Charles J. McClain said. "Our willingness to show that money spent at Northeast will result in greater student achievement struck a responsive chord with the Governor and General Assembly."

Through this program, tests which measure educational growth are administered to graduating seniors in their major fields. Additional tests

measure educational progress during the freshman and sophomore years. The program also involves follow-up surveys of alumni and graduating seniors to measure their satisfaction with the University's programs and services.

Basically, the Governor and General Assembly accepted the University's pledge that students will perform better on these tests if more state revenue is funneled into NMSU's instructional program.

For capital improvements, the University received \$100,000 to correct structural damage to the Industrial Education Building, \$100,000 to complete the lower level of the Administration / Humanities Building, \$182,000 for Phase III renovation of Baldwin Hall, \$40,000 to make a feasibility study for additional library space, and \$421,000 for general repairs and maintenance to the campus in addition to the \$1.6 million for an agriculture addition.

Stouts' music lives on

A memorial fund in the memory of Barrett and Mae Stout has been established at Northeast Missouri State University.

Initial gifts totaling \$5,000 made by friends and family of the Stouts will be placed in the University's Development Fund, the interest from which being used for music scholarships, President Charles J. McClain announced.

The annual award will be known as the Barrett and Mae Stout Voice-Choral Scholarship. Barrett Stout was a 1915 graduate of Northeast Missouri State University. From 1927-43 Dr. Stout was a member of the faculty at Northeast, teaching voice and conducting the A Capella Choir. From 1943 until his retirement in 1955, he served as dean of the school of music at Louisiana State

University. Dr. Stout died in 1968.

Mae Stout, Dr. Stout's wife, was a northeast Missouri native having been reared in Lucerne. She is a 1929 graduate of Northeast Missouri State University. Mrs. Stout died in May of this year at her home in Kansas City.

President McClain said, "The University is grateful for the generous donation which enables us to start this scholarship. I know many of Dr. and Mrs. Stout's friends and former students will want to contribute to this fund to perpetuate the Stouts' commitment to the assistance of vocal music students."

President McClain said donations to the scholarship fund may be sent to the Alumni/Development Office, Northeast Missouri State University, Kirksville, Mo.

Membership highest ever

Membership in the Alumni Association of Northeast Missouri State University has climbed to 2,427 as of June 1, marking an all-time high.

A goal to reach 3,000 members by June 30, 1981, has been set by the association, Thomas R. Shroust Jr., director of external affairs, said.

Membership dues help to defray printing costs of the NEMOSCOPE, to support the Alumni Scholarship program and to maintain other Association activities.

Association members receive special University publications and mailings in addition to the NEMOSCOPE, eligibility to par-

ticipate in the Alumni Tour Program, and reduced rates for Six Flags Entertainment Centers in Missouri, California, Texas, New Jersey and Georgia.

Future benefits might include reduced prices for an NMSU alumni directory, Shroust said.

The dues for Association memberships have not increased since the organization was founded in 1967. An increase in membership dues is likely in July 1981.

While the current rates are in effect, Shroust said he urges alumni to consider joining the Association as life members for a one-time fee of \$50.

Grad wills NMSU \$36,000

Northeast Missouri State University has received a total of \$36,331 from the estate of Annie Lauri Wilson Tilson, a 1908 graduate. The gift is believed to be the largest in the history of the University.

Mrs. Tilson had devoted her life to education including teaching assignments in Missouri, Iowa, Arizona and Idaho.

She taught a total of 44 years with her last 30 years spent in the Los Angeles school system.

Her education also includes a master's degree from the University of California.

Prior to World War I, she taught in a Presbyterian Mission school in Cairo, Egypt.

Mrs. Tilson was born May 13, 1882, on a farm south of LaBelle. She died Feb. 25, 1976, in Quincy, Ill.

Her home had been in Los Angeles until the last four years of her life when she returned to her native Knox County.

Mrs. Tilson's bequest will be used for the critical needs of the University

including scholarships, research and instruction equipment, and faculty development.

Mr. Barnett died Sept. 5, 1979. He served as head of the Practical Arts Division from 1942-68.

Top ranking seniors win Pershing

Freshman recipients of the Gen. John J. Pershing Scholarship have been selected for the 1980-81 academic year at Northeast Missouri State University.

Eighteen high school seniors were chosen to receive the award by ranking in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating classes. Participation and leadership in school and community programs, high national examination scores and successful on-campus interviews with the scholarship committee were the factors which determined the scholarship winners.

The Pershing Scholarship provides enrollment fees and residence hall room and board, making it one of the most prestigious awards of the state's higher education institutions. Also, it is renewable for three remaining undergraduate years to recipients maintaining high academic standards and leadership in campus activities.

In 1880, Gen. John J. "Black Jack" Pershing graduated from NMSU, then known as the First District Normal School of Missouri, with a 30

bachelor of elementary didactics—a teaching degree. While attending college, he served as president of his class, earned high academic marks and established his characteristics of leadership, self-discipline and diligence.

Pershing then went on to West Point, eventually becoming leader of the American Expeditionary Force of World War I. He was the only American general to hold the title of General of the Armies.

Scholarships given to 13 students

Several awards and scholarships named after faculty and alumni were presented at the 1980 Honor Awards Assembly held March 19 at NMSU.

The **Dorothy S. Pearson Scholarship** went to Patricia Wilsdorf of Holliday. The scholarship was established in 1974 by the faculty, alumni and friends of Mrs. Pearson at her retirement after 17 years of service as head of the Home Economics Division. It is awarded each year to a second semester junior who exemplifies the ethical and professional standards expected of a home economist. Patricia's perfect 4.0 grade point average also was considered in her selection as the recipient.

The **Dr. Llorra L. MaGee Achievement Award** went to Sarah Meneely of Chillicothe. The award was established in 1960 in honor of Dr. MaGee, who was head of the Home Economics Division from 1923-55. It is awarded annually to the outstanding senior in home economics who has a minimum 3.0/4.0 grade point average.

The **Joe Mitch Memorial Scholarship** was awarded to Jan Cahalan of Edina. The scholarship was founded in 1976 in honor of Joe Mitch, former member of the NMSU accounting faculty. The award is presented annually to an accounting major and is based on grade point average and overall excellence in accounting.

Judy Nutgrass of Ft. Madison,

Iowa, received the **Sheryl Fullerton Grim Memorial Scholarship**. This award was established in 1959 upon the death of Mrs. Grim, who graduated from NMSU that year. Qualifications for this scholarship include a minimum 3.0/4.0 grade point average, at least 60 completed hours of college credit and an expressed desire to teach in public schools.

The **Harry W. Williams Memorial Scholarship** was presented to Don Smith of Springfield, Mo. The award was established in 1960 and honors Mr. Williams, a respected teacher of mathematics at NMSU. The recipient is chosen annually by the mathematics faculty of the University. Don has a perfect 4.0 grade point average and is also a Pershing Scholar.

The **Dr. Lucy Simmons Scholarship** went to Jill Morrison of Florissant. The award honors the late Dr. Simmons, head of the Social Science Division and founder and sponsor of the NMSU chapter of Delta Zeta. It is presented annually to a sophomore or junior woman majoring in history and exemplifying leadership qualities.

Ronna McClanahan of Kirksville received the **Honored Junior Student in Speech Pathology/Audiology Award**. The \$150 scholarship was established in 1979 in honor of the late James W. Sparks, former assistant professor in the Special Programs Division. It is presented annually to a student who will

complete a B.S.E. degree within one year and is based on academic excellence.

The **R.E. Valentine Memorial Scholarship** went to Larry Lunsford of Macon. The award was established in 1960 in honor of Mr. Valentine, former varsity football player, faculty member and Varsity Club sponsor at NMSU. The scholarship is presented annually to the varsity letterman having the highest grade point average during the academic year. Larry earned a perfect 4.0 grade point average based on 32 semester hours.

The **Joseph P. Dolan Living Memorial Scholarship** was presented to Glenda Rauffer of Bowling Green. This award was founded in 1976 in honor of Mr. Dolan, former head of the Health, Physical Education and Recreation Division. The recipient must have completed 60 hours of college credit with a grade point average of not less than 3.0/4.0 scale and expressed a desire to teach in public schools.

Joseph E. Gray of Clarksville received the **Rieger-Black Scholarship**, which honors Dr. John Black, professor emeritus of zoology, and the late Dr. Wray Rieger, dean emeritus of instruction and head emeritus of the Science Division. The award, founded in 1978, is presented

to the outstanding junior student in science who has at least a 3.5 +4.0 grade point average and demonstrates leadership qualities.

The **Henry M. Boucher Award** went to Steven M. Elefson of Mt. Pleasant, Iowa. The award, established in 1972, honors Henry M. Boucher, former dean of students. The recipient must show outstanding leadership and service to the fraternity system and exemplify the ideals of fraternalism in collegiate life. Steven has served as president and corresponding secretary to Sigma Tau Gamma social fraternity and been a member of the Interfraternity Council Advisory Board.

Scott Ewing of Shelbina received the **Max E. Bell Scholarship**. This award, founded in 1978, honors Max E. Bell, University professor of botany and sponsor of Alpha Phi Sigma scholastic honorary since 1956. Qualifications include active participation in Alpha Phi Sigma and other campus organizations, and a minimum 3.0/4.0 grade point average.

The **Nan E. Wade Cardinal Key Scholarship** went to Elaine Chapman of Marshall. Established in 1956, the award honors Dr. Nan E. Wade, a retired faculty member and former Cardinal Key sponsor. The scholarship is presented annually to a junior or senior woman having a minimum 3.0/4.0 grade point average and demonstrating the qualities of leadership, character, scholarship and service.
