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## President's Corner

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DR. WALTER H. RYLE

THE CENTENNIAL of this College will be observed during the calendar year 1967. An interesting series of events honoring the past and pointing toward the future has been planned by the centennial committee. These events are outlined elsewhere in this publication. It is my hope that alumni, former students and friends of the College will join with us in the observance of one hundred years of service to teacher education.

From the very first day of its opening, on September 2, 1867, to the present hour, this College has been dedicated to the professional preparation of teachers for the public school systems of the state and nation. As we prepare to enter the second century of service to our high cause, the vision and foresight of our founder, Joseph Baldwin, comes more clearly into focus than even before. For President Baldwin was a man of vision, a dreamer of great dreams, a planner of great plans, and a practitioner of the art of leadership. All of his great dreams and great plans might have foundered had he not been able to transmit his plans and dreams to others and inspire them to carry high the torch that he had lit.

It is with pride that we look back on 100 years of history. For it has been a century of substantial achievement and progress.

From its beginning with an original faculty of five and an enrollment of one hundred forty-four in temporary quarters, the College has grown to a faculty of more than two hundred fifty and an enrollment of 5320 in the fall of 1966. The physical plant, too, has expanded—probably far beyond the dreams of its founder, but far more substantial than growth in size and numbers has been the quality of our product. Today our graduates are scattered throughout the world and found in nearly all professions. But the greatest number have found their niche in the field of education—the profession for which their alma mater prepared them. They are in the public and private schools of every state of the nation. They are in colleges and universities as teachers, as administrators, as researchers and every other aspect of the educational profession. Their loyalty to their school has been a constant source of inspiration and challenge to those of us who labor to preserve and perpetuate the high ideals we have ourselves inherited. From this high plateau of progress and achievement we look back over the years gone by with pride and we face the future with confidence that the challenges of tomorrow will be met.

Again I repeat my invitation to friends of the College to join in the events marking our centennial.

# "From These Roots" to Be Centennial Opening Drama

A drama depicting the first 100 years of the College will be the first event on the centennial calendar. The production is scheduled to open on January 20th with subsequent performances on 21, 26, 27, and 28 of January. Additional dates may be added if necessary.

The director, Mr. Al Srnka, assistant professor of speech, is an experienced producer of historical dramas having served a number of seasons with John B. Rogers, largest producers of outdoor spectacles in the world. In commenting on the production Mr. Srnka said: "We will have a presentation which will dramatize highlights in the 100-year history of the College. By combining the symphony orchestra, brass choir, NEMO singers, readers, actors, and special lighting effects, the audience will receive a vivid image of personalities and events of the past which shaped the future of the College."

Extensive research was required to select episodes which would lend themselves to dramatization and at the same time be meaningful in the developmental history of the College. Research through the archives, library, newspapers, yearbooks, catalogs, minutes of board meetings, and inter-

views with historians, yielded the facts for the drama.

Script for the production was written by the director. Musical arrangements are provided by the orchestra under the direction of Mr. William Fitzsimmons. Dr. Harold Copenhaver is director of the brass choir and Mr. Clay Dawson directs the NEMO singers. A large crew of technical assistants of college students will assist in staging, lighting and effects.

The premier of "From These Roots" will occur on January 20, 1967 with the Board of Regents and members of the centennial class being honored guests for the initial performance. The centennial class is composed of those students who will receive their bachelor's degree during the centennial year. Basically, the centennial class will be composed of those students who entered as freshman in the fall of 1963. There are, however, many others who have been working on their degrees at intervals and will graduate during 1967 in either the spring or summer division.

In addition to the centennial class being honored on the premier showing of "From These Roots" other groups will be honored at succeeding performances.



## Centennial Stamp Features Busts of Ryle and Baldwin

The Centennial Stamp, which depicts the likenesses of Joseph Baldwin, founder of the Teachers College, and Dr. Walter H. Ryle, now in his thirtieth year as president of the College, symbolizes the leadership for the Teachers College from its founding in 1867 to the present time.

Designed by William Unger of the Fine Arts Department at the College, the Stamp is printed in gold with the traditional Alma Mater "Purple" used as the overlay color.

## Dr. Ryle to Present Baldwin Lecture

"The Genesis of the Flame to the Second Century" is the title of the address selected by President Walter H. Ryle for the tenth in the series of annual lectures established in honor of the founder, Joseph Baldwin. The lecture this year will be on February 7th in the dining room of Ryle Hall. The lecture will be one of the featured events of the centennial program.

Each year a distinguished educator is invited to speak on some topic pertaining to the field of education. The centennial committee unanimously requested President Ryle to present the lecture in the centennial year. President Ryle, who is currently serving in his thirtieth year, has devoted all of his adult life to the cause of education.

## Centennial Convocation Will Feature Famous Educators

One of the highlights of the centennial is expected to come on the 100th anniversary of the opening of the doors of the College on September 2, 1967. In recognition of the role of the College in the higher education pattern of the country, an academic convocation will occur on this historic day.

Distinguished educators who are nationally known will discuss topics relating to the past, present and future of teacher education. Dr. Henry H. Hill, Acting President, George Peabody College for Teachers, Nashville, Tennessee; Dr. John Guy Fowlkes, Director of the Wisconsin Improvement Program, University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin; and Dr. T. M. Stinnett, Associate Executive

Secretary, National Education Association, Washington, D. C. have accepted invitations to participate in this convocation. Morning speeches will be followed by a luncheon for delegates and the afternoon will feature a panel discussion of current educational topics by these eminent educators.

Invitations to colleges and universities are expected to result in delegates from many institutions of higher learning to this significant event.

At an appropriate time during the day participants will be invited to participate in the ceremonial lighting of the Flame to the Second Century signifying the beginning of the second century of teacher education.

# Centennial Plans Work of Many; Alumni, Friends Contribute Vastly

Plans for the centennial observance of the College have been in the making for many months. It must be the work of historians to chronicle all the effort exerted. For the present it can be simply stated that for years the president of the College and others interested have been anticipating the event. Through the years other anniversaries such as the fiftieth, the seventy-fifth, and the ninetieth have pointed toward the one hundredth birthday.

Suggestions from former students and friends of the College have poured in through the years, for appropriate ways to mark the event. These sugges-

tions were recorded and passed through a screening group charged with the ultimate responsibility of implementing those ideas which were adopted.

In the spring of 1965, President Ryle announced the formation of a Centennial Advisory Committee composed of outstanding alumni and friends of the College. ## Governor Warren E. Hearnes to Address Centennial Graduates

No regular event in the annual campus ritual evokes more pomp, pageantry, dignity, and nostalgia than the annual commencement. Homecoming, it is true, rivals it for attention but homecoming has a different spirit and a different audience—it is a time of reunion, not a beginning.

Elaborate plans are being made for the commencement periods. These plans had not been finalized at the time this publication went to press but an outline of the program has already developed and some of the principals are known.

Governor Warren E. Hearnes has accepted the invitation to give the commencement address. It is entirely fitting and appropriate that the Governor of Missouri be present on this significant occasion. The Northeast Missouri State Teachers College has been a state institution for most of its 100 years and a succession of governors have given of their time and energy on behalf of the mother of the Teacher Education system of the State. The

interest Governor Hearnes has shown in the cause of education is well known throughout the state and need not be repeated here. Suffice it to say that his credentials admirably fit him for this significant event in the life of this historic college.

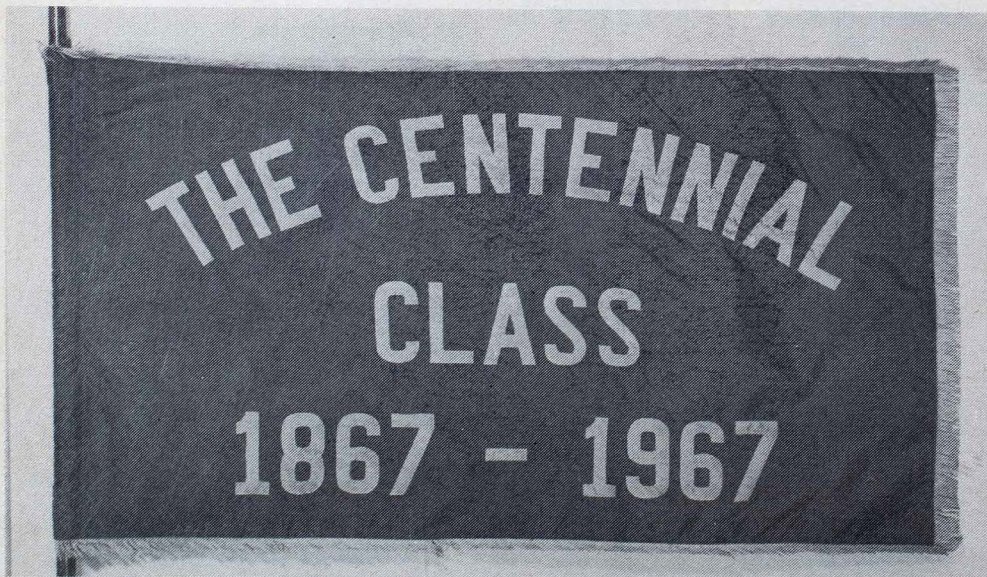
Governor Hearnes is no stranger to the college campus. He gave the dedicatory address at the cornerstone ceremony for Missouri Hall, newest and largest of the residence halls on the campus. More recently he received an honorary degree from the Kirksville College of Osteopathy and Surgery during their spring commencement in May of 1966 held in the College Auditorium.

Mrs. Warren Hearnes gave the dedicatory address at the cornerstone ceremonies for the Pickler Memorial Library addition in May 1966, and it should be remarked that she charmed the attendant crowd with her personality and her address.

## The Centennial Class Diploma

The diplomas for the May and August sections of the Class of 1967 will be inserted into special centennial covers of gold with over-printing in white and with the notation, "Centennial Year, 1867 - 1967." On the inside of the cover is imprinted the lamp of knowledge in color. The diploma with its cover will be especially cherished by those who receive it.



### THE CENTENNIAL CLASS

In the fall of 1963 another class of freshmen moved into Baldwin Hall for their Teachers College orientation. Unique among freshmen classes, this group of students was designated by Dr. Walter H. Ryle as the "Centennial Class of 1967." These students would be honored as the class to graduate during the celebration of the Teachers College's 100th birthday.

By the spring of 1964 the Centennial Class purchased a flag which bears the colors and name of the honored class. It has been displayed for the past four years in the College Auditorium and carried in each of the homecoming parades. At an appropriate time during the Centennial celebration, the Centennial Class flag will be retired to a place of honor in the Student Union.

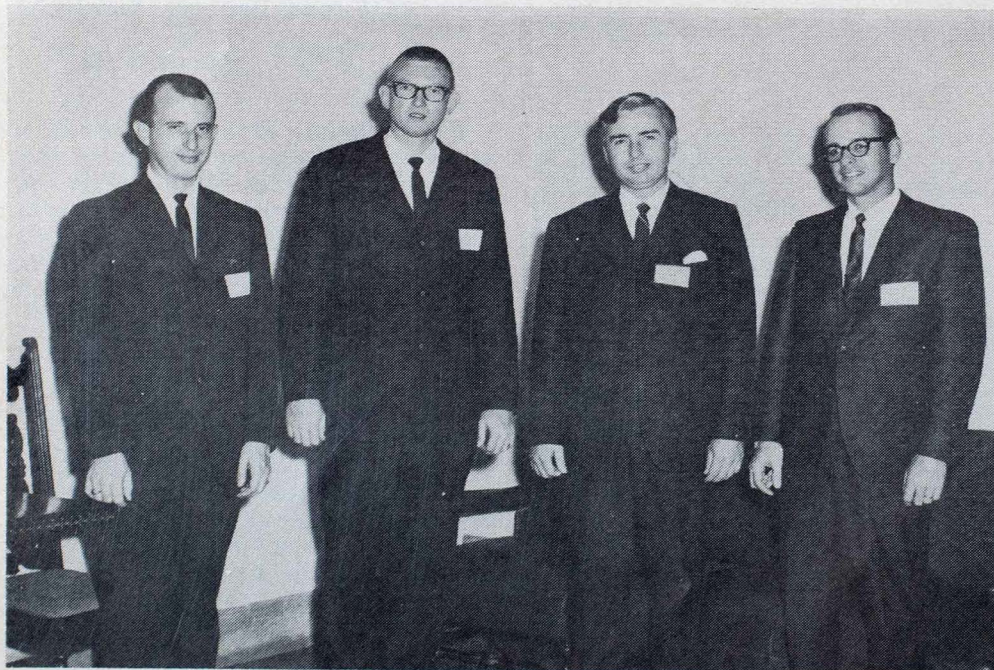

# One Hundred Years of Business Courses

Most people think of the business courses as comparative late comers, and well they might.

But in the predecessor of the Northeast Missouri State Teachers College, business courses were there from the start; in fact, the designation of the school, as Joseph Baldwin named it, was the North Missouri Normal School and Commercial College. In its very first year Bookkeeping was taught, as well as Penmanship. The latter no doubt was taught to prospective teachers also.

In the second annual catalog, for the year 1868-69 there is a statement of a commercial college curriculum, which consisted of:

Book-Keeping, 4 terms  
Commercial Arithmetic, 2 terms  
Penmanship, 2 terms  
Commercial Law, 2 terms  
Phonography and Penmanship,  
2 terms  
English Grammer, 2 terms  
Political Economy, 1 term  
Practical Teaching, 1 term  
Elocution, 4 terms  
Orthography, 4 terms

It is interesting to note the changes in names of subject matter that have occurred during the past century. *Book-Keeping* became *Bookkeeping* and later *Accounting*; *Commercial Arithmetic* is now *Business Mathematics*; *Commercial Law* is *Business Law*; *Phonography* is *Shorthand*; *Political Economy* is *Economics*; *Elocution* is *Public Speaking*; and *Orthography* has become just plain *Spelling*.

Political Economy and Elocution were taught by no less a person than Joseph Baldwin, the president of the School; Book-Keeping and Penmanship were taught by S. M. Pickler, who was to become one of Kirksville's most distinguished businessmen and for whom Pickler Memorial Library was named; Commercial Arithmetic was taught by James M. Greenwood, who was to become Kansas City's Superintendent of Schools for forty years; English Grammer was taught by W. P. Nason, who would become the school's second president; and Commercial Law was taught by F. M. Harrington, distinguished in later years as an attorney, legislator, and Kirksville's postmaster.

The work was all done in one school year of ten months. The terms referred to were of ten weeks' duration. But there were 24 such terms of work,

which meant that the student had six periods of recitation each day (30 hours per week compared to the 16 to 18 today).

Typewriting was not taught for the principal reason that in 1868-69 the typewriter was just being invented. It was patented in 1868 and placed on the market in 1874.

Even though the school came into the world as a Normal School and Commercial College, the business courses remained as the stepchild—the Cinderella, if you please—of the school.

The school became the North Missouri State Normal School in 1871 and the courses in political economy, bookkeeping, and phonography were abolished by 1880. All the other courses were absorbed into other departments of the school. However, a strong character joined the faculty in 1880 in the person of Charles E. Ross who reinstated bookkeeping, as well as teaching penmanship, painting, and art criticism.

When Mr. Ross left the faculty in 1900 to study osteopathy, the work in bookkeeping and penmanship was dropped.

When the president of the College, John R. Kirk, proposed the reinstating of business courses in 1908, recognition was given to their need as courses for teachers.

The business world had made many changes since 1870. It had seen the production of a number of good typewriters, some of them not greatly different from the typewriters of 1967 except that very few of them were electric.

Gregg shorthand, with its lack of both shading and the placement of characters above, through, or below the line of writing, was superseding Pitmanic Systems.

Double-entry bookkeeping was pushing single-entry bookkeeping into the background.

Palmer Method was succeeding Spencerian as well as vertical hand-writing.

A few high schools were introducing business subjects, and Dr. Kirk foresaw the need for business teachers. That was the need for the business department as he saw it, although he had no objection to a few men and women entering the classes whose aim was to enter the business world rather than to acquire a teaching background.

To head the department, in fact, at the start to be the entire faculty for a year or so, Dr. Kirk selected Mark Burrows, a man of great teaching ability, a man of outstanding personality, but, honestly, with only slight business subject background. He was an intellectual giant but had never studied shorthand or typewriting.

Mark Burrows had taught in rural schools and was Superintendent of Schools at Ridgeway, Missouri, before coming to Kirksville. He had attended Stanberry Normal School (forerunner of Chillicothe Business College) and graduated there in 1892. In 1915 he transferred from the commercial department to the field of rural education. He left Kirksville in 1920 for the Colorado State Teachers College where he remained two years. He then went to Oglethorpe University in Atlanta, Georgia, where he was professor of history and education and dean of the school of commerce. He edited the "Rural School Messenger" at Kirksville and the "School and Community" at Greeley, Colorado, 1920-1923. In 1934 he wrote *The History and Appreciation of Music*. He was a strong advocate of visual aids in education and once taught a course in lantern-slide making.

It was my privilege to study under Mr. Burrows. I entered his classes in December, 1908, and have been either a participant or an observer of the work of the division ever since. I was named head of the department in 1916 and remained in that position until I was calamitously selected to be Dean of Instruction in 1954.

I considered it my good fortune that I was allowed to return to teach in business education during the summer of 1966. The contacts there were made with a young, vigorous, enterprising group of faculty members and the hard-working, challenging and ambitious students, everyone of whom seemed to be looking forward to a life of devoted service in teaching or in

business. It was indeed invigorating and brought back a return to youth.

The headship in business education was relinquished to Charles E. Kauzlarich in 1954. Since that date there has been a considerable expansion in the work of the division and a considerable increase in the attention given to preparation for entrance into business administration. There had always been some men and women studying in the division who were bound for secretarial or administrative work, but the number was greatly increased with majors offered in accounting and business administration. The number of courses has increased, and the number of students who say that business is their major (whether or not they graduate with a bachelor's degree) is greatly expanded. The number of majors in 1966 was 867.

When Mark Burrows started the work in 1908, the department was in one room in old Baldwin Hall. Typewriting practice was in the back of the room while bookkeeping and shorthand classes met up front. In 1910 the department moved to the basement of Baldwin Hall and occupied three rooms. It was shifted some around 1920 but the department lost all of its equipment except its typewriters which were carried to safety when Baldwin Hall burned in 1924.

A new start was made right after the fire with classes meeting in office and storage rooms in Kirk Auditorium. When Pickler Library was completed the division received quarters first on the second floor and later on the first floor. There were just two teachers in the division at that time.

When the new Baldwin Hall was completed in 1938 the division moved to the third floor of that building where it had command of our classrooms and two offices. Around 1960 more office space was obtained by temporary partitions in the hall, and classrooms were borrowed from other divisions.

In 1965 the division moved to specially planned rooms in Violette Hall where it now occupies eleven classrooms, two practice rooms, a seminar room, and two suites of offices. The addition of data processing to the curriculum has called for the use of other rooms.

One phase of the division's work worthy of mention is the honor society in business education, Pi Omega Pi. This fraternity was founded here in 1923 and now has 130 chapters from

Massachusetts to Hawaii. The organization had a great celebration of its twenty-fifth anniversary in Kirksville in 1948 and is not now many years away from its half-century mark.

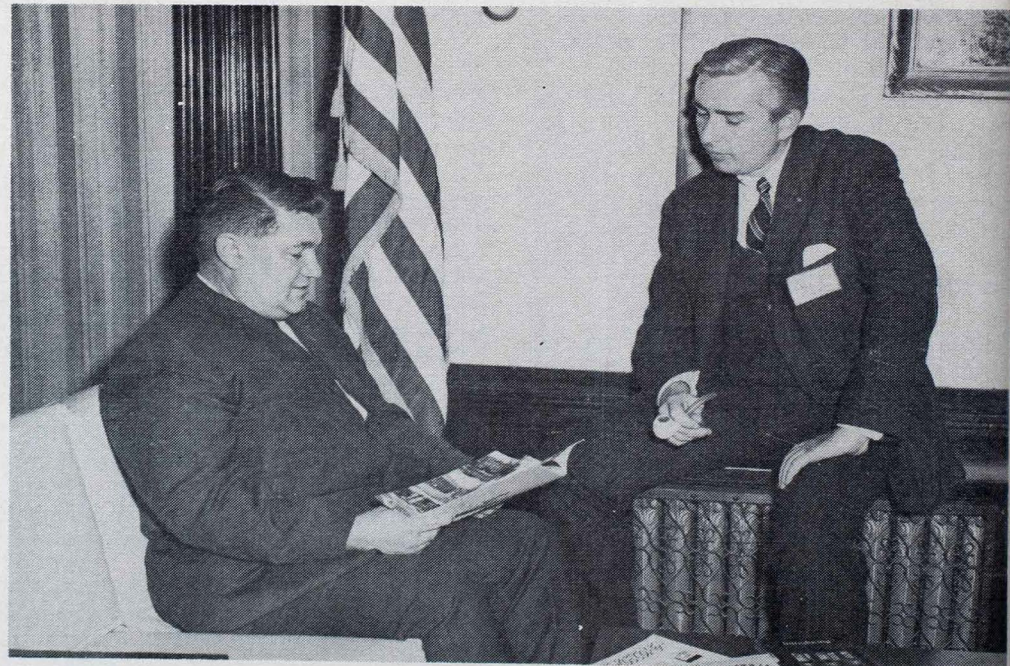

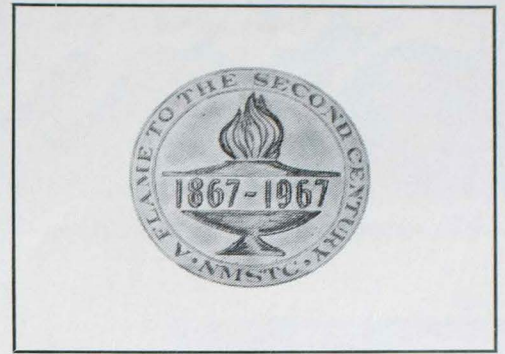
