Governor Joseph Teasdale announced last month that a federally funded grant for \$30,625 has been awarded to Kirksville residents so that a community-wide study can be done of industry, government, and the general public in the use of energy. Once Kirksville's model for energy awareness and conservation has been established, other communities will be able to follow the same guidelines.
