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## Editor's comments

You can please all of the alumni some of the time, and some of the alumni all of the time, but you can't please all of the alumni all of the time.

Or so it seems. When the decision was made to survey a random sample of NMSU graduates concerning their impressions of recent NEMOSCOPE ideas, we hoped to identify some strengths and weaknesses in order to improve the quality of the publication. What we found was that you think we're doing a pretty good job overall, but no one seems to agree what specific changes are needed.

In all, 2,000 surveys were sent to a random selection of alumni all over the country, of which we had received about 150 back at the Alumni Office by July 8. A few favorite NEMOSCOPE stories emerged as we tallied results—you really enjoy the alumni notes, for example, especially those from your era. Only four percent of those returning questionnaires said they did not read the notes concerning graduates of their era. Mrs. Doug Bachman (B.S.E. 1976) wrote, "We especially like reading the last few pages to find out where our fellow graduates are living and what they are doing. Please continue to send us a copy of the NEMOSCOPE—we really enjoy it."

Many other respondents echoed her statement, often requesting more notes. We would be happy to oblige, but we have to hear from you in order to print updates about your new job or new address. By the way, we hope to begin work soon on an alumni directory which will give a set of alumni addresses.

Our readers also enjoyed the story about the closing of Ophelia Parrish

Junior High School, with a full 73 percent indicating they read the entire story. Interestingly enough, this story came very close to never seeing print.

Originally, the story was assigned for the winter issue, but Associate Editor Les Dunseith and I were unhappy with the story's first draft. Since the closing of the junior high was still several months away, the story was filed away for future revision, and nearly forgotten.

When work began on the spring NEMOSCOPE, the story was finally dug out after most of the other stories for that issue had been written. Then, during discussion about how to design the publication, University Photojournalist Ray Jagger suggested that the story could lend itself to some good photos.

In the meantime, P. O. Selby happened by the office with a biography of the first Ophelia Parrish principal, Felix Rothschild, and suddenly everything just clicked into place. With some more revision (the final story represents the writing of about six different staff members), we were finally satisfied. And aside from a letter from John Schwarz (who, in a letter on page 2, justifiably points out that his band was as good or better than most junior high school bands, and perhaps we concentrated too much on the negative aspects of the school), it seems most of you liked the final result.

Unfortunately, not all the stories were as popular—at least not with a consistent number of respondents. A full 50 percent of the questionnaires indicated that more articles on outstanding alumni would be welcomed. Robert Capithorne (B.S. 1969) wrote, "It is my feeling that in keeping our institution dynamic and healthy, we as alumni must emphasize recruit-

ment of new students. Success stories of fellow alumni would be advantageous in our promotional endeavors."

We would certainly agree with his statement, but the stories on individual alumni were generally not well-read except by those alums of the same era or by alumni with specific interests—most music majors read the story about the jazz festival band directors, for example.

Nostalgic stories were well read, however, and you suggested more. A 1943 business education graduate wrote, "The NEMOSCOPE does not relate sufficiently to periods we were on the campus. It is sometimes very difficult to relate. The writer of the articles is, of course, on campus. Please attempt to relate to all alumni—old, middle-aged and young."

In this issue you will find one story about two 100-year-old alumnae, a story concerning the way present fashion trends relate to the styles of the past and a story about the off-and-on 14-year history of the "eternal flame."

Other changes: We've moved the alumni profiles to the notes section in order to get them closer to their year of graduation. We also hope this will make the notes section visually more appealing, since it is your favorite section. We've added divisional updates to keep you abreast of happenings in your major area. We've continued the practice of double-page spreads, which were popular last issue. And we're continuing to work on some past problem areas such as page design, photography and sports coverage.

Sports coverage is especially perplexing, however. A 1969 botany graduate commented, "I get sick and tired of the large amount of sports and Greek organization coverage. They were, and

still are, a relatively small percentage of the total enrollment. They are noisy, so they get attention." But a few days later Kathy Minor (B.S.E. 1979) wrote that she would "like to see more coverage of the women's sports. . . ." Overall, the numbers who asked for more sports and those who suggested less athletic coverage were about equal.

For the most part, we found alumni were generally pleased with the NEMOSCOPE. Nearly all the respondents, 91 percent, said the overall quality was good or excellent, with not one person marking poor. Most of the comments made us feel good about our efforts. A 1977 biology major wrote, "I enjoy the NEMOSCOPE. It reminds me of an important and happy time in my life." Another graduate, Dr. Jack Marincel (B.S. 1976) wrote, "I enjoy the publication very much for a nostalgic interlude into the past and keeping up with the present. Overall—good job."

Many alumni even enjoyed the survey itself. 1931 graduates Eleanor and Kenneth Milstead commented, "Your well-organized questionnaire (with attention called to specific articles) was most helpful." Russell Bastian (B.S.E. 1939) wrote, "I enjoyed the survey. It reminds me of Dr. Bray's chemistry tests."

But then there was the husband and wife who did not read a single story and wrote, "I feel that this publication is a waste of time and postage."

Well, you can please ALMOST all of the alumni some of the time.

## . . . It's all in a day's play

Inside this big house, everything is scaled down to size. Little tables, little chairs, little plates and little cups are seen in the dining room. Then the little people file in for their mid-morning snack. It is the beginning of another day at the Child Development Center.

Located at the intersection of Normal and Elson streets, the center serves two purposes: it provides a comprehensive developmental program for pre-school children of students, staff and community residents and it gives an opportunity for University students to observe and interact with young children in a group setting.

The Home Economics/Child Development major began with one- and two-year programs in 1967. Dr. Lydia Inman, head of the Home Economics Division, said. The center was instituted by Dorothy Pearson, former head of the division, and Elizabeth Wilson, child development instructor, in 1967 to give Vocational Home Economics majors some lab experience. In 1968 the one-year program was eliminated, Inman said. The 1974 class was the first to graduate in the four-year program.

Practicum I (CD 232) students work from 7:30 a.m. until 2 p.m. two days per week in the summer. During the school year they work one day a week for four hours. Students in the Observation and Interaction With Young Children class (CD 133) observe for two hours one day per week.

"We make lesson plans and present them for different learning skills," Gayla Barrows, sophomore, said. Barrows is in the two-year certificate program. Students teach something different each time. Senior Shelli Hutton said, "We gradually work up to the point where we teach all day."

From 2 to 4 p.m. the practicum students attend class. In addition to library assignments,

five short projects, an oral report and a case study in which each student picks out one child and observes his or her development, Hutton explained.

Michelle Henkel, head teacher at the center, explains, "There is a different theme each week, and learning centers, activities and lessons are planned around the theme." Henkel teaches the nursery school and oversees students who are doing their practicum. The children participate in art time, group time, music time and special time.

The basic philosophy of the program is based on the idea that a child learns best when he or she makes choices, explores freely and solves his or her problems.

"Nancy learns to play with other kids and to share," something an only child like Nancy can't do at home, says her mother, Jane Picht. "Nancy had some problems in the beginning, but she learned to solve them; now everything is fine."

A Radio Shack TRS-80 computer was used this summer by the children and the students, Ed Zeiser, director of the center, said. The computer has visual discrimination programs that allow a child to differentiate between shapes and numbers and to tell whether they are the same or not. The computer is used primarily by the vocational home economics students for teacher training, he said.

Joseph Proctor, a Kirksville resident, said, "The program has been good for our son socially; it has helped him to develop. There is nothing he dislikes about being there."

"I'm very pleased with the program," Linda Crumpacker said. "My three-year-old has learned his basic colors, and my daughter, who is four and a half, can recognize letters and numbers." Crumpacker is a 1971 graduate of the University and is currently working on a degree in education. "The center is a definite asset, and it is open when I need them."

# Governor reduces higher education funding

NMSU has entered the 1982 fiscal year with an appropriation of \$1,585,018 less than the University was appropriated during the 1980-81 fiscal year. The spending cutback is the result of an appropriation veto by Missouri Gov. Christopher S. Bond in addition to a 10 percent withholding action taken by the governor. All public colleges and universities in Missouri were similarly affected.

Last year the General Assembly appropriated NMSU \$13,792,753. This year they had increased that figure to \$13,999,644, but Gov. Bond vetoed the appropriation back to his original recommendation of \$13,563,039 and withheld 10 percent of that amount, to be turned over to the University only if state revenues increase.

In light of this action, President McClain wrote the NMSU faculty on June 25

announcing his recommendation to the Board of Regents that planned faculty and staff pay increases be deferred.

"This deferral will apply to anniversary increases and promotions as well. In effect, this year's salary rate will be continued," the president said. President McClain added that the purchase of equipment and some operational items such as travel would be cut back.

As for fee increases, at its July meeting the Board of Regents agreed not to increase fees for the 1981 fall semester. However, fees for the 1982 fall semester were increased from \$390 to \$480 per year. Fees for non-Missouri residents were increased to \$960 per year. Residence hall room and board was also increased by about four percent.



## NMSU receives 35 Hereford heifers; Former senator helps agriculture program

An estimated \$30,000 worth of polled Hereford yearlings have been given to NMSU by former Kansas Senator Harry Darby for use in the University's agriculture program.

"Senator Darby is known for his support of University cow herds and beef improvement. He learned of our need for animals to start a herd through the American Hereford Association," said Robb Pilkington, assistant professor of animal science.

The 35 heifers are now on the University's new farm, located just east of Kirksville on Boundary Street. This fall the heifers will become an integral part of the agriculture program's reproduction, judging and meats classes.

Some research will be conducted, including an initial project comparing the advantages of different forages—in this case, tyfon—compared to native grasses. Tyfon is a member of the cabbage and turnip families and is a high-yield forage.

The heifers join 78 head of feeder steers purchased by the University, which will be sold in hopes that the payback can support the stocker program.

"We have a good program going," Pilkington says. "We don't have everything we need yet. In some cases it's kind of a scavenger hunt deal, coralling enough feed bunks, mineral feeders and handling facilities to get our program going."

The new 135-acre farm, formerly known as the 1000 Hills Farm, was purchased last year from Dr. J. S. Denslow.

Beginning during the presidency of John R. Kirk, the University had operated a fruit and horticulture farm in the vicinity of the present Red Barn. However, the need for campus expansion temporarily ended the farming operation.



## Freshmen from far and near Make NMSU their new home

To get to the NMSU campus this fall for her first college class, Donna Armstrong will cross the Sierra Nevada and Rocky Mountain Ranges, the Grand Canyon and the wheat fields of Kansas. But fellow freshman Eric Bader will just cross the street and walk a couple of blocks down the sidewalk.

Donna lives in Fountain Valley, Calif., about 30 miles from Los Angeles. Eric lives at 701 E. Normal in Kirksville, diagonally across the street from President McClain's home. Yet, even though the distance they travel to get to NMSU is vastly different, their reasons for attending Northeast are much the same.

"I like the atmosphere and I like the area," Donna says, even though she has only been on campus one time. Reasonable costs were a big factor also, since many of the colleges and universities near her home in California are among the most expensive in the country. "It's cheaper for me to go to Northeast than to go to almost any college here in California," she says.

Cost was also a big factor for Eric, who will live at home and maintain his current job at Laughlin Hospital while he attends NMSU. He is majoring in pre-osteopathy and hopes to attend Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine later and become a doctor. His father works for the Kirksville Osteopathic Health Center and is a graduate of KCOM.

Eric has already taken a couple of general education courses at NMSU while still in high school and has met some of his instructors for this fall. "I really like the instructors I've met so far," he says.

Donna's decision to come to Northeast was made even before she had seen the campus. Her grandparents live in Bloomfield, Iowa, and she always liked the Midwest when the family came to visit.

"I even like snow," she says about the prospect of moving from sunny California to the often frigid Kirksville winters. NMSU came highly recommended to her from her sister Sandra and cousins Nancy and Joyce Nelson, all current students at the University.

Yet, Donna did not actually visit the campus until this spring when she flew to Kirksville as a finalist for the Pershing Scholarship. Although she did not receive the Pershing, she was awarded a Presidential Honorary Scholarship and got an opportunity to confirm her choice of colleges.

For Eric, the decision to attend NMSU has been pretty well made for about three years. Although he was born in Kirksville, his family moved away. They returned when he was a freshman in high school. Since moving back to Kirksville, he has made many friends at both NMSU and KCOM, several with the same goal as Eric—attending both schools.

Living across the street from the president has given Eric the opportunity to meet Dr. McClain a few times, but he says he doesn't see him all that often. Perhaps that will change now, however, since they will both be walking the same direction down the sidewalk this fall.

Finding the kind of college that would give them a quality education at a reasonable cost was important to both Donna Armstrong and Eric Bader. For Donna to find that school, it meant going 2,000 miles away, but for Eric there wasn't any reason to go farther than he could see out his window.

### System assists in value clarification

## Computer helps students choose career

When the figures were put together from surveys of graduating NMSU students and alumni, one weakness became clear—many of you, our former students, felt the University just wasn't doing enough to help undergraduates make career decisions. With the installation of a new system called Discover, we think we've found a solution to this problem.

This fall, Discover will be ready to help our students work through a variety of exercises designed to help them make career choices. Linked to the University's computer system, Discover lets students work individual-

ly through eight areas that are designed to assist them in clarifying values, making decisions, exploring interests and careers and choosing the area of study to which they are best suited.

Although new freshmen will be especially encouraged to work with the system, it can give assistance to students at all levels. "It can help every single student," Darrell Krueger, dean of instruction, says.

The Discover program can even help students who already have definite goals selected. "It can help them select a graduate program or look at the job op-

portunities in their field of study," Krueger says.

University officials hope the system will greatly benefit the students, Krueger says. "It is a tremendous tool. We're one of only five major universities in the nation to have this option."

Coordinating the program will be the Freshman Counseling Office, which will train faculty members and students to use the Discover system. Hopefully, all faculty and staff will become familiar with Discover so that students will be able to receive immediate information and advice, Elsie Gaber, freshman counselor, says.

An added benefit of the Discover system will be the computer experience it will provide a student. Although the system is much more simplified than standard computer programming, it will help students become comfortable with communicating through a machine.

The Discover system is updated with current job opportunities and other information on a yearly basis. By working on the system, students will be able to gain a better awareness of their interests. "The students can take control of their own destinies," Gaber says.

## 60 years of fashion inspire 1981 styles

What do the slit skirts, round collars, knit ties and spiked heels that today's college students are wearing have to do with the classes of 1921, 1941 and 1961?

NMSU alumni of those years can tell you, because they wore those same fashions when they went to school. Fashion history has repeated itself—many of the most popular trends on campus this fall are simply updates of styles that were popular 20, 40 or 60 years ago.

**THE BEST-SELLERS OF 1921** were, according to the 1921 class year-book, sailor-shirts, bow ties, lacy collars and pull-over letterman sweaters. And hats were everywhere on campus. "Oh, we wore hats!" exclaimed 1921 alumna Ruby Webber Farmer, who now resides in St. Louis. She recalled a time on campus when there had been rumors of muggings in the area, and she had thought she could defend herself "with a hatpin out of my hat—we wore hatpins in those days."

Narrow ankle-length slit skirts were the style at that time, Mrs. Farmer said. This style saw a great resurgence in women's fashion about two years ago. "Women wore . . . bright-colored petticoats underneath," she said. "Dresses were long-waisted over the hips with belts tied around. I had a dress that was (belted) nine inches below the waist."

Another 1921 alumna, Esther Elizabeth-Redmond Loughead, Poplar Bluff, said, "People followed designer trends then. Fashions don't change so erratically now." At that time, she remembers the dress length jumping from ankle-length to almost knee-length and then dropping back down the next year. She remembers wearing broad-rimmed velvet and wool hats to match her outfits. Her knit sweaters were gathered in the back, and her dresses had stiff, upright collars.

Women also wore hobble-skirts, which gave them a peculiar way of walking. "They were narrow-legged and had a slit up the side just so you could walk," Mrs. Loughead said.

**BY 1941**, the dress length had risen again, and the economy had taken its toll on fashion. "It was a time of war," said 1941 alumna Luella-Hardy Attebery, who resides in Kirksville. Skirts were made shorter to conserve material for the soldiers, she said. "Nylon hose had come out just before the war, but there was no nylon after the war had started. When nylon was finally available in stores, lines formed for blocks. Anything was better than rayon hose. It had seams, and it was baggy at the knees," she said.

"The thing" girls wore on campus in 1941 resembled a "school uniform," said Mrs. Attebery. The combination of skirts, blouses, sweaters and bobby sox was extremely popular. "Today's preppie look is the nearest thing to what we had," she said. "People just wore what they could get together."

Other '40s trends that are in style again include calf-length skirts and detachable round collars for women.

"We wore lots of bright colors," said Mrs. Attebery. "Girls wore hats and berets to match their school things." Fur collars were still as popular as they were in 1921. Mrs. Attebery remembers wearing a dark green wool suit with the fur collar and shoes to match.

"We dressed up a lot for dances," she said. Dresses were bias-cut and "clingy to the body" in organza, organdy and crepe. "We had lots of dresses, and we wore our long dresses a great deal."

Open-neck shirts were popular in the 1941 campus men's wear. By the early '40s, dress shirts were worn under sweaters without ties. "The greatest thing was the athletic sweater," Mrs. Attebery said. "Some fraternities had their own sweaters." Tailored-looking sweaters for men, by Bradley knits, were worn with the strong loyalty of today's Izod wearers. And absolutely no jeans were worn on campus, she said.

"We watched trends very closely," Mrs. Attebery said. "But clothes weren't the most important thing. It was considered poor taste to dress better than friends poorer than you."

Professor of History Ruth Towne said that in 1941 the typical college girl on campus wore "a scarf, pearls or a locket around her neck with the scarf always tied in front. I'd say nine out of 10 girls in Cardinal Key looked just like that."

Dr. Towne remembers wearing a gray tweed skirt teamed with a taffeta blouse with a ruffled collar and a full-length coat with a stand-up collar edged in gray fur. All three—the tweed skirt, the ruffled blouse and the stand-up collared coat—are variations of the traditional look expected to be strong in the fall 1981 fashion line-up.

**AROUND 1961**, skirts again started to rise, with the dress length finally hitting the knee. "Everybody was a little nervous," said Dr. Towne. "Some people weren't sure about it. The knee just isn't the most aesthetic thing to look at." But the look became popular, and in came skirts with kick pleats in the back. Hose and high, spiked heels with pointed toes were what women wore to school, Dr. Towne said.

The typical sorority girl's "uniform" 20 years ago included a straight-cut green Pendleton skirt, a high round-necked sweater and a white blazer with the sorority's crest printed on it, Dr. Towne said. Accessories that went with the outfit were pearls, black or brown pumps and a fluffy pompadour hairdo.

1961 alumna Norma Jean Bell, from De Soto, remembers wearing a white eyelet dress to her class commencement. The dress was scoop-necked, with billowy sleeves and was worn

"Clothes were dressier then," Mrs. Bell said. "Blue jeans were not worn to work or class. Women wore slacks only for sports occasions and for casual wear only." But when slacks were worn, the cuffs were rolled, as they were popularly worn a year or so ago, with saddle oxfords or tennis shoes.

For fraternity and sorority dances, she said women wore taffeta, lace and net formals that were almost always strapless.

Men wore starched cotton shirts over dress pants. "Pleated and baggy pants were worn more than more fitted styles," she said. Accessories for men included white buck shoes, cuffed pants and dark-colored pointed-toe shoes.

**IN 1981**, the newest trend predicted by Kirksville fashion merchants is a variation of the traditional styles worn in the past. Charles Foster (B.S.E. 1981), a Bamburgs employee from Kirksville, said popular men's styles will be navy blazers, herringbone tweeds, button-down oxford shirts and tweed wool slacks. Marcus Henley, a Troesters employee and NMSU senior from

Fulton, emphasized the "dress for success" concept in tweed blazers with elbow patches, layered sweaters, ribbed wool vests, rugby shirts, crewnecks and corduroy slacks. Both men say the traditional square-knit ties will again be seen with tie-clips and tie-bars. Jim Miller, manager of Mister Jim's, said the traditional look, in natural fiber materials, will be predominant in men's suits, sweaters and all-wool tartan and plaid trousers.

Miller and Dan Raft, manager of R & R Western Wear, agree that the recent western look will be bigger than ever this fall, just in time to complement the NMSU Homecoming theme, "Urban Cowboy."

In women's wear, Mamselle's manager Marge Webber stressed a "more feminine look" and the resurgence of ruffles and lace.

Maurice's employee Karen Grams predicts an abundance of "earth colors, or vegetable colors—deep purple, deep red, deep green" in the fall lines. She said traditional crew-neck sweaters and stand-up collars will top straight-legged and chino pants. Daffodil employee Janet Slaughter, a freshman from Laplata, added that "tailored shirts and pleated pants" will also be popular, but in the conservative tan, beige, burgundy and navy colors.

So, even though the world and the Northeast Missouri State campus have changed since 1921, 1941 and 1961, one thing has stayed pretty much the same. The fashions of the past have returned to inspire yet another generation of NMSU students.

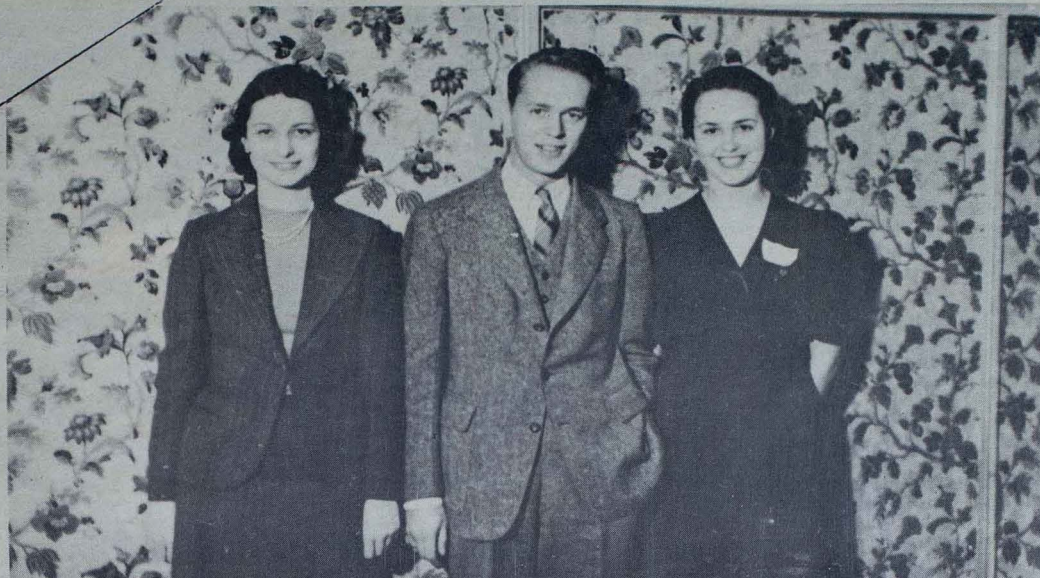

The styles of the early 1940s even more closely resemble the current fashion trends. Blazers for men and women, often in tweed and wool, are expected to be very popular this fall, so much so that the trio at **TOP RIGHT** would probably be very much in fashion today. And even though blue jeans were not worn to class at the time, the students in the library at **CENTER LEFT** exhibit another '40s style that is once again popular—rolled up cuffs.

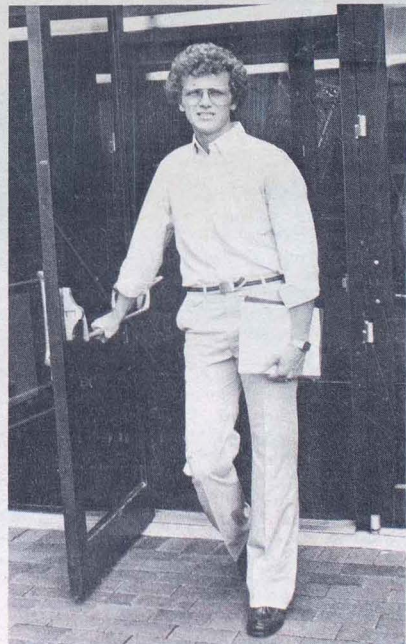
The styles of the late '50s and early '60s are very popular again. Bobby socks, shorter hair and baggy pants are again fashionable. The students at **CENTER RIGHT** exhibit a number of current fashion trends, including narrow ties with clasps; plaids; plain, dark-colored shoes with low heels and an abundance of dark and pastel colored clothing.

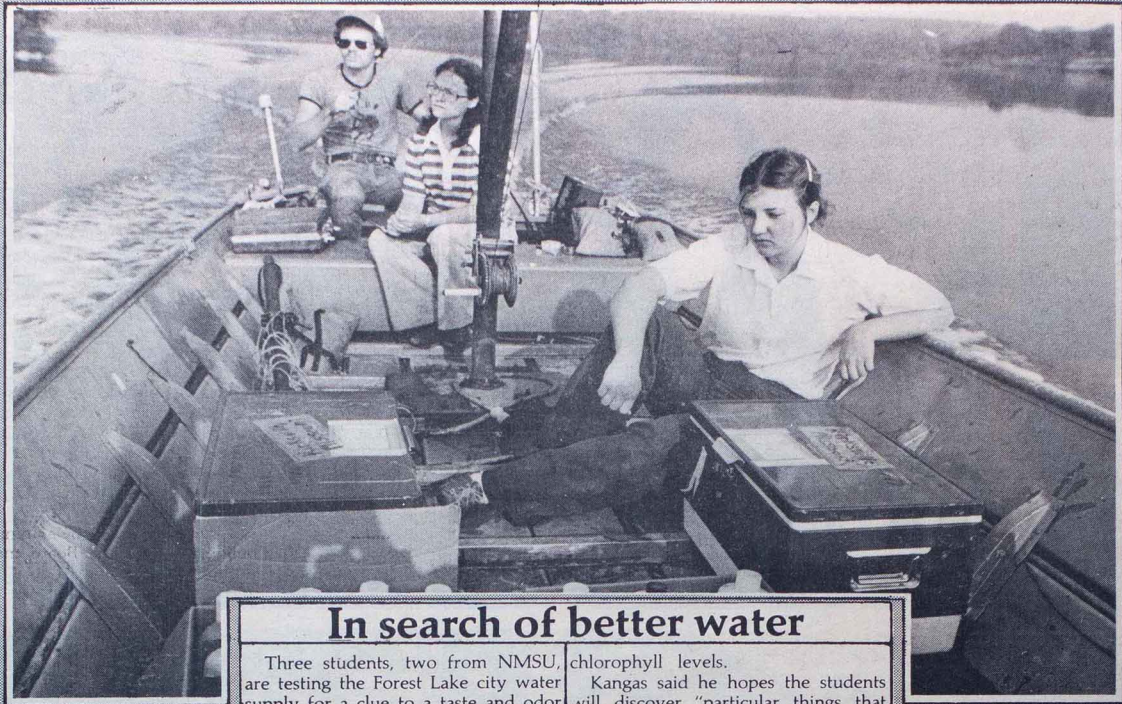

## In search of better water

Three students, two from NMSU, are testing the Forest Lake city water supply for a clue to a taste and odor problem in Kirksville's water. "We are doing mostly field work," junior Kris Palmer said.

Donald Kangas, associate professor of zoology, said the student project is being funded by a Kirksville city grant under the Missouri Clean Lakes Assessment Program.

Palmer, assisted by NMSU junior Amy Fulton Miles and Culver-Stockton College junior Dorothy Humke, have taken several samples. Most of the water samples were obtained from the surface of the lake and were analyzed for algae and

chlorophyll levels.

Kangas said he hopes the students will discover "particular things that would help to reverse the aging, or at least, to retard it. We hope to find things to remedy such problems as the water quality of the lake."

Regarding the bad taste of the water, Professor of Ecology Max Bell said copper sulfate is presently being used to treat the presettlement basin of the lake. The chemical kills all blue-green algae in that area, and then it is removed chemically from the water. This remedy was chosen because a blue-green algae called *Oscillatoria Rubescens* is believed to be a cause of the taste and odor problem.

**TAKING SAMPLES**—Two NMSU students and a Culver-Stockton junior conducted research at Todd Hill State Park this summer to determine the cause of an odor and taste problem in the city's water supply. Since NMSU professor and students began work on the water, Kirksville residents have noticed a lessening of the problem. The students collect water samples, chart the location from which the samples are taken and later conduct a variety of tests on the water.



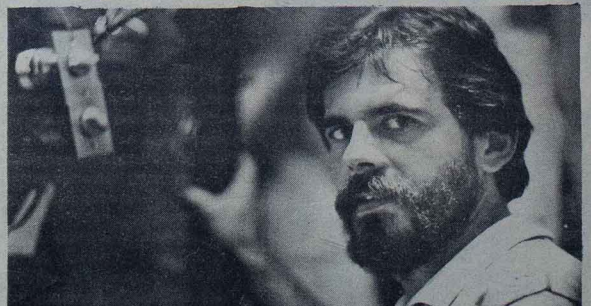
## Employee's \$5,000 idea earns award

An innovative program to reduce operating cost has brought Northeast Missouri State University special recognition from the National Association of College and University Business Offices and the U.S. Steel Foundation.

University employee Ron Scott came up with the idea, which saved the University \$5,000 last year. "We put in a manual override for the automatic temperature control, which monitors outside temperature to determine how hot to heat the water which we circulate to heat the building," Scott explained.

"When the buildings aren't being opened and closed a lot, such as during breaks, they hold their heat real well, so the water doesn't need to be as hot." Previously, the automatic control overcompensated during the spring and fall because, even though nighttime temperatures were low, the buildings didn't require as much heating. They cooled slowly from the warm periods during the day.

The NACUBO/USSF program was conceived to spotlight, on the national level, successful cost reduction programs within colleges and universities.

The committee who planned it, with special thanks to Dr. Williamson who worked so hard, to Mrs. Scoggin and the home ec girls, to Mr. McCrory and his FFA boys and to my former student, Bobby Wells, who was such a great success as master of ceremonies.

First, Dr. Richard Kimble—he wouldn't have made it through the University if I hadn't helped him.

I also owe a lot to the

following people: the late Dr. Ryle, Dr. Ivan E. Miller, Dr. C. W. Martin and Dr. Lucy Simmons; all are gone but not forgotten.

To those who are living, I want to say you will never know how much encouragement I received or how much you inspired me during my years in school and after—Dr. Pauline D. Knobbs, Dr. Earl Cunningham and many others, and now in later years, the president of Northeast Missouri State University, Dr. Charles J. McClain.

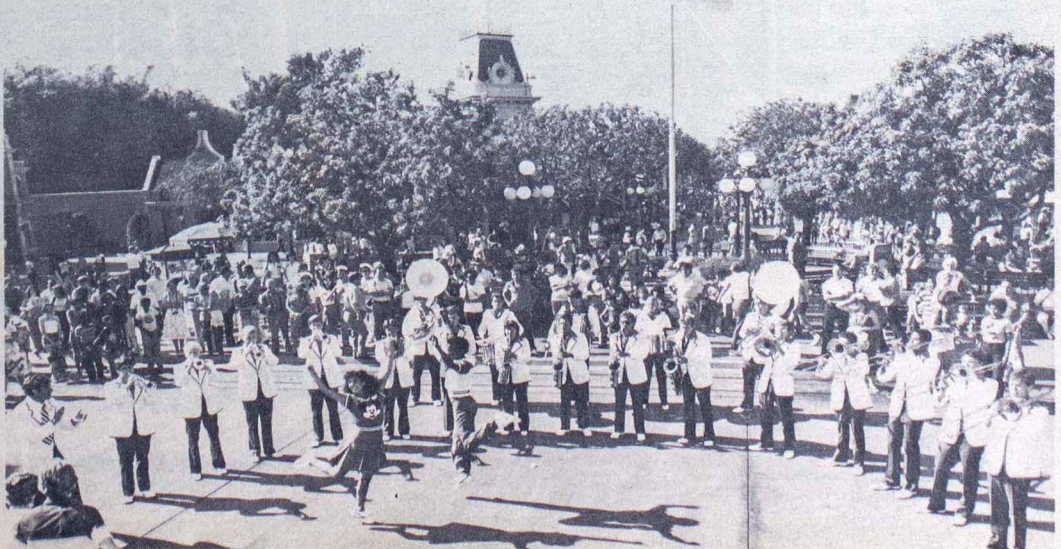
When not performing, Bob attends workshops and lectures three hours each day. This classroom portion of the program, taught by professional enter-

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## Softball team wins fourth In Division II World Series

"Our girls didn't win the championship, but I was proud of them. They had nothing to be ashamed of and played tough against the national champions."

Coach Mary Jo Murray said those were the first words she told the Northeast Missouri State softball women after they finished fourth in the AIAW Division II National Championship at Omaha, Neb.

The Bulldogs concluded the 1981 season with a 34-18 overall record after elimination from the World Series by the eventual champion, California State-Sacramento. The Bulldogs lost, 2-0, in a tense 11-inning contest.

Murray's team, making its first trip to the national encounter, had won its first two tournament games from Nebraska-Omaha, 5-4, and Francis Marion (S.C.), 6-1, before bowing to Grand View (Iowa), 2-0, in the third round of the double elimination meet.

Then, the Bulldogs advanced to the losers' bracket semi-finals by nipping California State-Northridge, 1-0, an hour before their confrontation with the Sacramento club.

Coming into the World Series, the Bulldogs had been seeded first after rolling up 15 consecutive wins and snaring the championships of the MAIAW and AIAW Region 6 Tournaments. "Before we started playing at Omaha, I had said I would be pleased if we finished in the top four," Murray commented. "At the national level, every club is very tough."

During the first month of the season, the Bulldogs might not have looked like national qualifiers. They took a so-so 16-15 ledger into the state cham-

ampionship. But Murray said that record was misleading.

"Ten of our first 15 losses were at the hands of Division I schools, including Creighton University and Missouri (Columbia), both qualifiers for the NCAA Division I nationals."

Northeast defeated UMC, 3-1, the last time they played the Lady Tigers during the 1981 season.

Senior Deb Thrasher, the No. 1 hurler and Bulldog captain, demonstrated remarkable durability and stamina, especially in the state, regional and national competition. She pitched 208 innings this spring while charting a 20-10 mark and a 1.35 earned-run average.

Thrasher earned all-state and all-regional honors this past season and was nominated for All-America accolades.

"She was the rock that held our team together," says Murray. The 22-year-old Thrasher, a 1977 graduate of Macon High School, is leaving behind some softball accomplishments that will be hard to duplicate in future seasons at Northeast.

Twelve of her 20 victories were recorded in post-season tournament action. The win total and number of innings are new school records.

Thrasher devoted most of her time in high school to basketball and track, receiving four letters in each sport. It wasn't until her senior year that she competed in high school softball. When Thrasher started pitching, her first windmill throw went straight up into the air.

"I wanted to quit right then, but I didn't," she says.

Another nominee, junior center fielder Tracy Rowan (Fairview Heights, Ill.-Belleville-Althoff), was an All-America recipient. Rowan finished the

campaign with a team-leading .333 average at the plate and 24 runs-batted-in. She was also an all-state and all-regional choice.

## Craddock optimistic about '81 Bulldogs

Two years of rebuilding should pay off in 1981 for the football Bulldogs, who will return 40 lettermen, 23 of whom started at one time or another in 1980.

"I think we have to be optimistic going into pre-season camp," says NMSU head coach Bruce Craddock. "During spring drills, I could sense a growing maturity that wasn't evident a year ago. This group is very coachable and wants to do well. They won't be as error-prone this coming season."

The Bulldogs were frequently their worst enemy last fall, committing 48

turnovers (33 pass interceptions and 15 lost fumbles in 11 games).

Only one starter (but an extremely good one, All-America flanker Eric Holm) in NMSU's 1980 finale has graduated.

The Bulldogs will still be a young team, however. Forty of the 47 returning players who have been invited to August workouts are sophomores and juniors.

Northeast was 5-6 overall last autumn and third in the Missouri Intercollegiate Athletic Association with a 3-3 record. "But four of our six losses were by close enough margins that better execution might've made our record 9-2," Craddock points out.

While there is more offensive depth this year, the unit has a heavy concentration of sophomores and juniors still learning their responsibilities. This is particularly true at the interior forward wall positions. Altogether, 18 offensive lettermen will return next autumn.

Senior Bob Zumbahlen emerged as the number one quarterback late in the 1980 campaign and looked exceptionally good in the spring, according to Craddock. Zumbahlen connected on 36 of 74 passes for 407 yards and five touchdowns, most of which came in the final weeks last fall.

The task of replacing Holm as a pass receiver will be difficult. However, junior Rich Otte, who hauled in 19

aerials for 287 yards a year ago, possesses some of Holm's assets, especially in making the clutch catch.

Craddock says the Bulldog defense is probably the team's strongest asset. Defensive Coordinator John Smith could start the same lineup that finished the 1980 campaign; there were no graduation losses.

Starting at the interior line positions will probably be three juniors, nose guard Elijah Lockhart and tackles Ligo Letuli and Tim Gildehaus. Letuli was an all-conference second team selection, while Lockhart and Gildehaus earned honorable mention accolades.

Juniors Roy Pettibone, an honorable mention all-MIAA pick, and Brian Hattendorf are expected to be the starters at defensive end again.

Depth at linebacking is as good or better than it has been for a number of seasons. Sophomores Dan Shelby and Mitch Mulch manned the two positions at the end of last fall.

The depth situation in the defensive secondary is promising, too, according to Craddock and Smith. All top hands at the two cornerback and two safety posts at the conclusion of last season will be available when the new campaign gets underway.

## Coach-of-Year Sims names recruits

After guiding the NMSU basketball team to a second-place finish in the NCAA Division II South Central Regional, head coach Willard Sims announced the names of one junior college transfer and three freshman recruits who will be called upon to help repeat this year's strong showing.

James Hutcherson, a junior college recruit, is expected to provide immediate help for the front line.

Hutcherson, a 6-6, 215-pound forward-center, played last year at

Conners Junior College in Warner, Okla., averaging 10 points and 10 rebounds per game.

"James could step in right away and play regularly," said Sims. "He's strong as a bull, quick, a good defensive player and a solid rebounder. James reminds me of Angelo Hermann, a good, all-around performer for us four years ago."

Sims, Division II coach-of-the-year for the South Central Region and a finalist for Division II national coach-of-

the-year, signed three other promising freshman prospects this spring, including 6-7, 205-pound Warren Halverson from Van Buren High School in Keosauqua, Iowa; 6-7, 190-pound Lonnie Fisher from Rock Falls (Ill.) High School and 6-5, 210-pound Greg Scherder from Bowling Green High School.

Halverson was a first-team all-state selection. Scherder was a second-team all-state recipient, and Fisher was an honorable mention all-state choice.

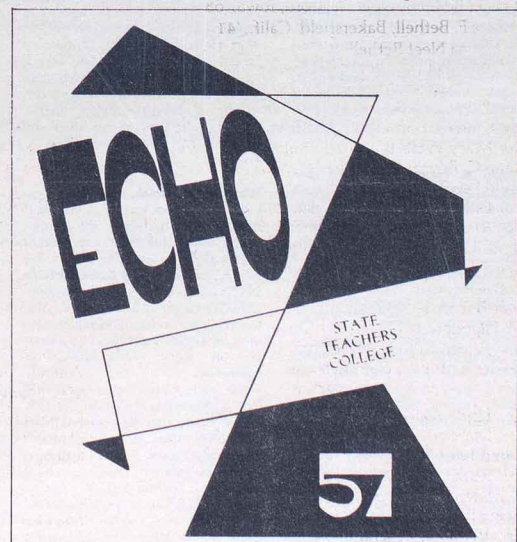

## 1902 alumnae Celebrate their 100th birthdays

They can remember back when William Dodson was president of the University; when no one had ever heard of a workbook; when teachers didn't assign long essays; and when college was more like today's high schools.

NMSU was the Northeast Missouri State Normal School then, and the whole student body totaled about 500. Two of those 500, both of whom recently celebrated their 100th birthdays, were **Ottie Greiner** and **Martha Sparling Hansen**.

The year was 1902.

"I don't feel that old," Miss Greiner says. Like Mrs. Hansen, she graduated from Northeast with a teaching degree in 1902. Miss Greiner still resides in Kirksville—just three blocks from the campus. Mrs. Hansen lives in Tiburon, Calif., with her granddaughter.

Life has certainly changed since Miss Greiner and Mrs. Hansen attended college 79 years ago. "So many things have changed, the world's not the same," Miss Greiner says. "Kirksville has certainly changed. It used to be such a small town. Now it's quite a city!"

Both women can relate certain events of the twentieth century through their own personal experiences. Mrs. Hansen's father was a Kirksville doctor who called on his patients in a horse-drawn buggy. He bought Kirksville's first automobile, and, around 1900, installed the town's first telephone.

Following Mrs. Hansen at Northeast were her younger brother, Dr. Eugene McKinney Sparling, who received a B.S.E. in 1921; her younger sister, Virginia Sparling Reeves, who received her B.S.E. in 1924; and her nephew, Dr. Gerald A. Reeves, who received his degree in medicine in 1942.

Following graduation, both women taught in Kirksville and Iowa elementary schools. Miss Greiner went on to teach 49 years and then became principal of Kirksville's Benton School for another 22 years. She discontinued her career just long enough to receive another degree—a B.S.E.—in 1929.

Larger classes made teaching more difficult at times around the turn of the century. Mrs. Hansen taught with 60 children in a classroom for only \$35 a month. Miss Greiner's second grade class of 1914 included 40 students.

On her 100th birthday, May 26, Miss Greiner received word from several of her former students

who are scattered throughout the country. "I got over 400 cards and letters from all over," she says.

Miss Greiner received two other very special cards—from President Reagan and Missouri Gov. Christopher Bond. To celebrate her birthday, Miss Greiner's Sunday School class held a party for her in the parlor of the first Christian Church. "Over 100 people signed the guestbook," she says.

## Division Update: Business

### First class starts new program

Business Division Head **Robert Dager** says students with undergraduate accounting degrees, as well as graduates with baccalaureate degrees in areas other than accounting, will be able to receive higher certification through two new master's degree programs beginning this fall in accounting.

The Master's of Accountancy and the Master's of Science

in Accounting are designed to prepare students to enter the fields of public accounting, industrial accounting, governmental accounting and accounting education. Entry-level positions in these fields should command a higher salary than the B.S. undergraduate degree.

So far, Dager says 11 people have been accepted into the Master's in Accountancy pro-

gram. The Master's of Science in Accounting program has been filled with 17 people. "Our goal (in the programs) is to limit the number of graduates to 15 a year," he says. "But right now, we're playing it by ear.

"We've already offered a few of the classes last spring and this summer," he says. "But the graduates won't be admitted until this fall."

Dager says the master's programs were initiated because "the accounting profession is moving toward 150 hours of study required to sit for the CPA exam.

"Only two states require that the exam be taken as a graduate," he explains. "Missouri doesn't require this. You can sit for the exam with an undergraduate degree."

Dager says that initially more in-state than out-of-state students were attracted to the new programs, but the divi-

sion is trying to attract a number of high-quality, out-of-state graduates also. He says most of the presently admitted students received their undergraduate degrees from NMSU, but "a couple are from other schools.

"The program is small, but we're trying to attract high-quality students. The benefit is that the students will get to know each other, and that will help them grow as individuals as they are exposed to others with different backgrounds."

Dr. Taylor Lindsey retires after 23 years at NMSU

"Each day I walked into a classroom to teach or into an elementary school or high school to observe teachers and administrators on the job was exciting for me."

Those were highlights from Dr. Taylor Lindsey, professor emeritus of education, upon his retirement in August after 51 years in education.

Dr. Lindsey served as director of Student Teaching from

1959 until 1969. He was also the head of the Division of Education from 1969 until 1972. Since then, he has been back in the classroom.

Dr. Lindsey received his B.A. in 1937 from Arkansas State University at Jonesboro. In 1949 he received his M.A. from George Peabody College for Teachers. In 1956 he achieved his Ed.D. from the University of Northern Colorado at Greeley.

He taught in the elementary and high school systems and was both a principal and a superintendent. "Helping young people learn, helping teachers to be successful at all levels and working with prospective teachers—I look back on all those tasks with satisfaction."

Looking back at his years at NMSU, Dr. Lindsey remembers his association with young and intelligent

students. "I can't think of any other job I'd rather have had than teaching. I haven't given my life to teaching, as some might say—teaching has given life to me."

His future plans are to continue "staying alive" and to read. His preference is fiction.

The reunion will feature participation in the annual Homecoming parade, a reunion luncheon prior to the Homecoming football game

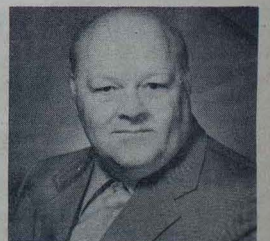
and a dance sponsored by Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Saturday night.

# Fewer freshmen want to be home economics teachers

The hottest option in home economics this fall at Northeast is the clothing and textiles retailing program.

Incoming freshman Carla Ruddell from Kirksville said the reason she chose to enroll in the clothing option was because it was the field she'd had "the most experience in." She, like incoming freshman Susan Baker of LaPlata, spent nearly 10 years in her local 4-H chapter working with clothing and making her own

outfits.

"I love clothes and I like modeling them," Ruddell explained. She won awards by sewing and modeling her own creations. "I was in a national contest and won a trip to San Diego, Calif.," she said.

Baker won a trophy in the State Regional Dress Review and entered the State Dress Review on Aug. 17. She said entrants in the dress reviews are judged on how the outfit fits its designer, how well it

fits the occasion it was made for and the poise and grooming of the model. She also won the district "Make It With Wool" contest and placed fifth in the state contest.

Ruddell, who's been making her own clothes since she was eight years old, said she plans to be a buyer or seller of a clothing retail store or company. Baker said she also prefers to go to work choosing different types of clothing merchandise for stores.

Dr. Lydia Inman, head of the Division of Home Economics, said the clothing and textiles retailing program is a new one. "The first graduates from the program came in 1975," she said.

Inman said the clothing and textiles field has a good future outlook. "It's the fastest growing program in schools of home economics at the present time. It's very popular.

"The jobs are varied. It depends on one's particular in-

terests and the direction you want to go," Inman said people with all backgrounds of experience are involved in clothing and textile retailing. "As a rule, those with four-year college backgrounds do advance faster."

Inman said the field takes in both men and women. However, at NMSU, the home ec program has not had any male graduates as yet. "But we would welcome them," she said.

Wiley works for Emerson Electric, manufacturer of the Craftsman line of power tools for Sears, Roebuck, and Co. On Jan. 20, 1981, Wiley and his boss flew to Plains, Ga., to help demonstrate the Sears tools to former President Jimmy Carter.

"Jimmy Carter is an avid woodworker," Wiley explained in a letter to the University. "After President Reagan's inauguration, Carter returned to Plains, where (former White House Press Secretary Jodi Powell and) his staff presented him with a complete woodworking shop."

Three weeks later, Carter asked Wiley and an assistant Sears buyer to return to Plains to show him how to operate his tools and answer questions he might have. "He has been working with wood for a number of years but has never had a complete shop," Wiley said.

When Wiley finished demonstrating the new machines, Carter led the women through his home and pointed out the projects he had built over the years.

The former president then sent a personal letter to Wiley, thanking him for his helpful instructions. Carter pointed out that he had built three tables already, using the different techniques Wiley had

shown him. "This is more advanced work than I had ever done before, but it's much easier now that I have my own good tools," Carter wrote.

Wiley, whose title at Emerson is product manager, is in charge of all tools manufactured for Sears. He was chosen for the presentation in Plains because of his position at Emerson and his past experience as an Industrial Arts

teacher in the Ferguson-Florissant (Mo.) school district.

An Industrial Education graduate from Wentzville, Mo., Wiley said, "When I was in school there (NMSU), in Mr. Harrington's woodworking classes and during my years of teaching, I never thought I would be instructing a former president in the art of woodworking. It was quite an experience."

# Eternal Flame given new home

It was lit in 1967 and flickered off and on until 1974 when the energy crisis snuffed it out completely. But today, after 14 years of controversy and renovations, the Lamp of Knowledge has found a permanent resting place on the NMSU campus.

The monument was lit again for the first time in years at the May commencement after being moved from its original spot beside the intersection of Normal and High streets near the north end of the Quadrangle. Moving the structure to a more centralized site gave the lamp a better chance to be seen. Today, it is surrounded by five small fruit trees, a brick patio and a large cement archway. The Lamp of Knowledge is now flanked by the steps of Kirk Memorial on the south and the statue of Joseph Baldwin on the north.

Once known as the Flame to the Second Century, the lamp was donated by the Class of '67 in commemoration of the University's biggest celebration—the centennial anniversary. The monument symbolized, and resembled, the classic lamp of knowledge that educational institutions associate with learning. Today, however, it is questionable whether the structure can be referred to as either "the lamp" or "eternal" because the flame is only lit at certain times of the year and renovation has done away with the Alladin's Lamp structure.

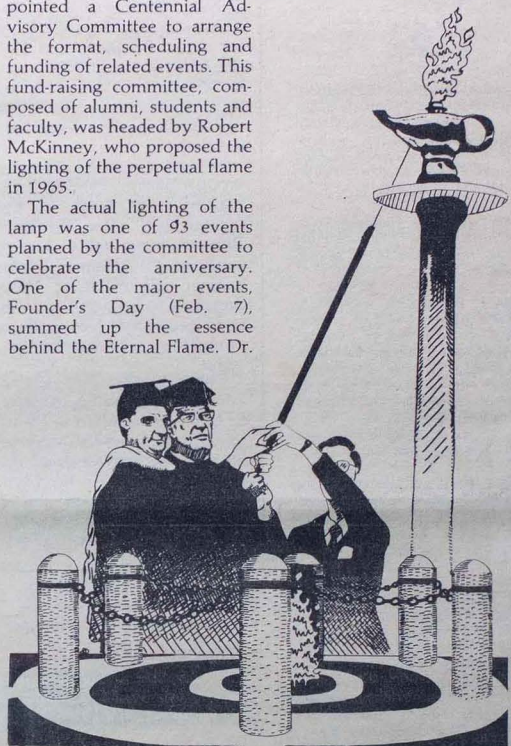
Campus Planner Doug Winicker said the lamp will be used in the future only for special occasions, such as commencement and possibly Founder's Day. He said the structure hadn't worked as

well as planned in earlier years and had started to cause problems. "The flame never burned right," he explained, "and it got to be a problem. The lamp went out primarily because of (the need for) fuel conservation and because it was a hazard."

President Walter Ryle was the first to call attention to the significance of the centennial celebration in 1962. He appointed a Centennial Advisory Committee to arrange the format, scheduling and funding of related events. This fund-raising committee, composed of alumni, students and faculty, was headed by Robert McKinney, who proposed the lighting of the perpetual flame in 1965.

The actual lighting of the lamp was one of 93 events planned by the committee to celebrate the anniversary. One of the major events, Founder's Day (Feb. 7), summed up the essence behind the Eternal Flame. Dr.

Ryle, in the Tenth Annual Baldwin Lecture entitled "Genesis of the Flame to the Second Century," closed his speech by stating that as the flame is lit, "let each of us rededicate it to the pioneering spirit exemplified by the leadership and vision of Joseph Baldwin, John Kirk and other dedicated teachers who have served so well teacher education on this campus."

# Library receives Normal School bond

In January the University received an addition to the archives from Mildred Gelbach Orweiler, D.O., who donated a historical bond which was used to finance the First District Normal School of Missouri. The unissued bond was on display in April in the lobby of Pickler Memorial

Library and is now housed in the Special Collections section of the library.

On Thursday, Sept. 8, 1870, a special election was held to vote on a proposal to issue bonds of not more than \$100,000 for the purpose of securing a location of a state Normal School in Kirksville. Many aggressive civic leaders of the time assisted Joseph Baldwin in an effort to get his private Normal School accepted as the First District

Normal School of Missouri. The first step was to induce the citizens of the county to vote bonds so the county might be able to make a bid.

The North Missouri Tribune published articles to the citizens of Kirksville emphasizing the possible returns of an investment of not more than \$100,000. Other articles appeared stating that a state normal school would "attract families of wealth and culture" who would move to the city

and bring their wealth with them.

The bond was approved by a vote of 629 to 189. The bond, which was similar to a savings bond, was worth \$500 plus seven percent interest over a period of 20 years. On Dec. 1, 1870, the newly-appointed Board of Regents met in Jefferson City and accepted Adair County's bid, making Kirksville the home of the First District Normal School.

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## Division Update: Mathematics

# More students seek careers in computer science

If  $A + B = C$ , then  $C - B = A$ , right? But plug in these numbers—15 mathematics education majors plus zero mathematics-computer science majors in 1971 equals 15. However, 43 mathematics majors in 1981 minus six mathematics education majors equals 37 mathematics-computer science majors. At least in algebra, they don't change the rules every 10 years!

If you graduated from the

Division of Mathematics 10 years ago, chances are your degree was in mathematics education. This year, only five students graduated with degrees in mathematics education and four graduated with degrees in mathematics-computer science. This does not reflect, however, the number of students currently enrolled in the mathematics programs.

Admission reports for the freshman class show that six

incoming freshmen have chosen mathematics education as their major field, while 37 other math majors will be seeking degrees in mathematics-computer science. Currently, there are approximately 20 upperclassmen in mathematics education compared to 60 in mathematics-computer science.

Dale Woods, Mathematics Division head, says money and job opportunities have

caused the influx of mathematics-computer science majors. In the job market today, there are at least 10 jobs waiting for graduates in the computer science area, Wayne Bailey, computer science instructor, says.

The computer science option was instituted into the NMSU mathematics program in 1972. "Curriculum revisions were made this year, and more are planned as staffing permits," Bailey says. Five

courses were added or moved from the suggested electives area and are now a part of the major requirements.

Other fall 1981 changes made in the mathematics curriculum include revision in the suggested electives area of the program. Classes such as Systems Design, Computer Science Language Lab, Undergraduate Readings and Computer Math have been added to the Computer Science option.

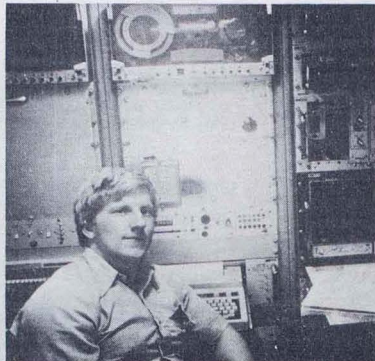

Some sharp-eyed NEMOSCOPE readers might remember we ran a story about Jack Schaffner last year telling about his acceptance into the Navy's nuclear propulsion program. Unfortunately, shortly after we ran that story, Jack decided to take another job instead—for \$45,000 a year.

Jack works for Schlumberger (pronounced shlum-burr-jay), a company which operates in the oil fields of southern Louisiana. After a

drilling company has dug the hole for a new oil well, Jack and his crew come onto the site to test for oil deposits. They bring along computer equipment and other measuring instruments, dropping a cable into the hole sometimes as far as 30,000 feet deep. When they have completed their job, the oil company knows just what the prospects are for a new well. It's highly technical work, often requiring long hours, but Jack says, "I really enjoy it."

Southern Louisiana, with its French culture and background, is far from Jack's hometown of St. Charles, yet the skills he brought from his high school and NMSU studies are serving him well. Although the company provided extensive training on the equipment with which he now works, Jack says his physics major helped prepare him for the job. "I had an excellent background at NMSU; it was definitely a plus for me," he says.

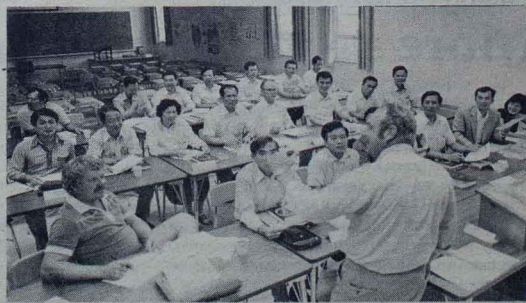

## Ed Harvey receives law school honor

"It's just like 'Paper Chase,' only subtler," 1979 political science alumnus Ed Harvey says of his job as senior editor on the Washington University Law Quarterly.

The Quarterly is a law review put out by Washington University law students, and Ed says just gaining acceptance on the Quarterly staff is very difficult. "The review is composed by law students in the upper 10 percent of their class," he says, "so it is considered very prestigious."

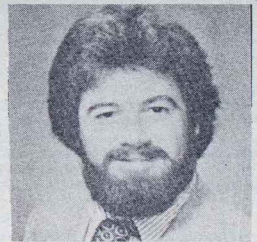
In order to become a member of the Quarterly, Ed had to write "a publishable article that conformed to set

rules. We had to do in-depth legal research in addition to taking classes." Ed estimates he spent at least 20 hours a week doing his research in addition to the time he spent at school. He remembers spending three weeks writing his paper. "I stayed up about 40 hours straight, and my wife stayed up with me and typed." Out of the 100 or more students that tried out, Ed was one of only 35 accepted.

Ed says work on the Quarterly gives him a great deal of experience in legal research and writing. "It provides exposure to current advances in law," he says. "And it gives you practice in legal

reasoning. It teaches you how to compose in writing—that type of writing is an art." Ed says being on the review also gives one "great academic credentials for your resume," and could play a big role in his future employment in law.

Ed has two more semesters at Washington University and a bar exam before he completes his schooling. He says he is already certified to practice law in certain situations, but will not receive his Juris Doctorate degree (J.D.) and become a lawyer until he finishes his last two semesters on May 22, 1982. Passage of the bar exam will give him the title of licensed attorney.

Ed would like to set up a private practice in litigation. "I like criminal and civil law," he said. Someday he wants to set up practice in a medium-sized city like St. Louis, Kansas City or Seattle.

## Nursing alumna is speaker at pinning

"Be competent and professional in what you do," Karna Kruckenberg, University of Missouri-Columbia clinical specialist, told NMSU nursing graduates during pinning ceremonies on May 7.

Kruckenberg, a 1970 alumna who received her master's degree from UMC in 1973, said, "I was very pleased to have had the opportunity to speak to the new graduates. It was really an honor to return to Kirksville as an alumna and to see the progress that the

Division of Nursing has made."

Kruckenberg advised the graduates of the value of being patient and working hard to earn respect. "Seventy-five to 80 percent of the health facilities in the country have significant vacancies for nurses; there is definitely a shortage. But these facilities need nurses who can show themselves approved to be respected individuals with whom others choose to collaborate and with whom

others choose to establish collegiality," she said.

Pinning is a traditional ceremony that serves, in nursing history, to convey an informal acceptance into the profession. The pin represents the successful completion of the nursing requirements at NMSU and the student's eligibility to take the state qualifying examination. Of the 39 nursing graduates this spring, two were men.

## Dr. Eichor studies Scotland's law enforcement system

When he traveled to the southern portion of Scotland this spring on a trip sponsored by the Rotary Clubs of District 605 in Missouri, Dr. Matt Eichor, associate professor of criminal justice, got an opportunity to study more than just the law enforcement efforts of another country.

"I was able to go to a country and be hosted by the people who live there. It was very different from being a tourist; we were not treated like

strangers," Eichor said. One Rotarian and five non-Rotarians participated in the six-week social, cultural and educational exchange in Scotland.

Eichor was hosted by men and women with occupations ranging from a banker to a plumber. "In the evenings we would have get-togethers where we talked about our occupations and our lives in the U.S."

A week for vocational

study was set up to compare each individual's occupational setting in Scotland. Eichor visited two police headquarters, a university and sat in on a case before the Sheriff's Court.

While visiting these institutions, Eichor found many things that paralleled our own law enforcement system, but there were some differences. "Their police departments are not the same as ours in the respect that they have a police

department for an entire area; there is one police system for the entire country."

Eichor was able to visit the University of Strathclyde in Glasgow, Scotland. This university has the only forensic science program in the country. Eichor said the instructors held many of the same concerns of NMSU instructors—those of programs, appropriations and facilities.

Sitting in on a Sheriff's Court, Eichor found "judges are much more involved in the questioning process; the lawyers and judge ask leading questions early in the proceedings, whereas in the U.S. they are usually used in the cross-examination." A big difference in Scottish law is that only a majority is needed for conviction, whereas the U.S. requires a unanimous verdict.

# Thank God he's a country boy

When John Denver sang in his hit single that "there ain't nothin' an old country boy like me can't hack," he could well have been describing senior David Clithero, the 1981-82 Student Senate president.

Dave has been known to call himself "just a hick from the boonies," but his easygoing style hides a 3.88 GPA and a knack for getting things done in student politics. Dave was defeated last year by Barb McMasters in a bid for Student Senate president, so he launched his second campaign by telling the Index, "I'm a persistent devil." His persistence paid off on April 9 when he defeated junior Carl Mueller, a pre-optometry major from Moberly, by about 100 votes.

The election drew a record turnout of student voters, about 34 percent of the student body. Election issues included representation of foreign students on the Senate, communication between the Student Senate and the students and, of course, the traditional rivalries between independents and Greeks, as well as between the various Greek organizations.
