THE BOARD OF REGENTS will hold its regular monthly meeting Tuesday at 1 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Student Union. Everyone is welcome.

AN OPEN MEETING of the Governor's Conference on Education is scheduled to begin Wed. at 7 p.m. in the Activities Room of the Student Union with remarks by Gov. Bond. Immediately following, Dr. J. Alan Thomas, professor of educational administration, University of Chicago, and Dr. Willard Abraham, chairperson, Department of Special Education, Arizona State University, will respond to the five issues the conference is studying.

The public is urged to attend the meeting which is being held to obtain the opinions of Missourians in five areas of educational concern: accountability, early childhood and parent education, educational finance, governance, and vocational education. Lt. Gov. Phelps will chair the campus meeting which is the fourth of five being held in the state. The Kirksville Adair County League of Women voters is acting as co-sponsor of the local meeting which is being supported by the Missouri Committee for the Humanities, Inc., the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the Governor's Conference on Education, Inc.

WE'LL PARTICIPATE IN THE NATIONAL BELL RINGING CEREMONY at 1 p.m. July 4. The University's Bicentennial Committee, assisted by Blue Key and Circle K campus service organizations, has planned for the University to join in the national ceremony by ringing a historic bell which has been housed in the E.M. Violette Museum since its use as a civil defense warning bell on the University campus during World Wars I and II.

The bell will be rung in front of Kirk Memorial near the Bicentennial Tree. Following the ringing ceremony, the public (especially children) are invited to take turns ringing it.

HANNIBAL'S ICE HOUSE THEATRE opens next Monday with George Bernard Shaw's "The Devil's Disciple." It's the story of Dick Dudgeon, a revolutionary American Puritan who has grown up in the most narrow-minded of Puritan communities. When the British mistake him for the local Puritan minister and he is arrested, Dick discovers himself incapable of causing another human to suffer; he continues the masquerade as Reverend Anderson and is about to be hanged in the minister's place. Structurally the play resembles the traditional historical melodrama, but Shaw has turned the melodramatic cliches to fresh and realistic uses.

Evening performances begin at 8 p.m. The box office number is 314-221-6070.

AND FINALLY ...

The National Council of Teachers of English aroused the ire of William F. Buckley recently with its latest efforts to fight sexism in language. The NCTE proposes such changes as "average person or ordinary people" to replace "common man." "Try it out," replies Buckley. "The century of the average person."

The NCTE also proposes to rewrite "Anyone who wants to go to the game should bring his money tomorrow," as, "Anyone who wants to go to the game should bring their money tomorrow." Buckley says anyone who does that kind of thing should not be hired as a professional writer.
