Missouri Teachers Attend Workshop on Campus

Twenty-five Missouri elementary school teachers are participating in a Science, Technology, and Society workshop on campus. The workshop, which runs through June 30, is being held for the first time and is designed to increase the science knowledge of elementary teachers.

The program encourages the participant to use common household items and hands-on inquiry approaches to teach key skills and core competencies and to understand how they relate to societal issues.

The teachers will attend lectures, perform laboratory activities and plan their individual science curricula. The program also tentatively includes field trips to an American Cyanamid chemi-

cal plant, Calloway Nuclear power plant and Kirksville Osteopathic Medical Center.

Brian McGuire, assistant professor of chemistry, is conducting the three-week workshop. McGuire said the program is aimed at meeting the science objectives published by the state of Missouri. A Title II, Program A grant for \$26,000 from the Missouri Coordinating Board of Higher Education pays the tuition, room and board, and supply costs for the selected teachers.

The objectives of the program also include follow-up activities scheduled for the participants at their local schools to incorporate the ideas of science and technology into society from the elementary school level.
