CLASSES WILL BE DISMISSED ON FRIDAY when NMSU hosts the spring meeting of the Northeast Missouri Teachers Association. This year's theme is "Stepping in Unison." Speaking at the joint morning session beginning at 9 a.m. in Baldwin Auditorium will be Dr. Paul Greene, a 1940 NMSU graduate who is director of teacher education and certification of the Missouri State Department of Education. In the afternoon, 21 departmental sessions will be held.

Brazelton is chief of planning and coordination for the Division of Urban Development in the Ohio Department of Education; a meeting for Home Economics teachers at 11:15 a.m. in 174 Violette Hall; a meeting for Kindergarten and Early Childhood teachers at 11:15 a.m. in 240 Violette Hall; workshop displays for school librarians from 12 noon to 2:30 p.m. in the Tangerine Room of the Student Union Building; a meeting of CTA Presidents at 1:30 p.m. in 252 Violette Hall; and an all-day meeting for various FTA chapters in 12 Science Hall.

"THE DESIGNER'S EYE," a graphic design symposium, will be the topic of KIRX-AM's Area Scene program at 9:07 a.m. today. Directors of the symposium will discuss the week of activities featuring three designers Carl Regehr, University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana; Wendie Collins, Hallmark Cards, Kansas City; and Ken Wehrman, The Hanley Partnership, St. Louis. The symposium will be March 6-10 with an exhibition running in the University Art Gallery, 218 Baldwin Hall, March 1-15.
