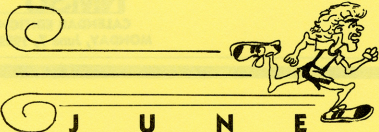
A special election for Amendment 1 will be held Tuesday June 8. Passage of this \$600 million dollar bond issue will create jobs and fund improvements in the state's universities and colleges as well as other state facilities without an increase in taxes.

NMSU currently has about \$23 million worth of capital requests on the state's priority list for renovations of Violette Hall and Science Hall and an addition to and renovation of Pickler Memorial Library. These projects might be funded if the bond issue is passed.

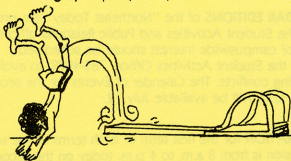
