Carnahan appoints Braun to Board



Gov. Mel Carnahan has announced the appointment of Matthew Braun of Clinton, Mo., as student representative to the Northeast Missouri State University Board of Governors. A sophomore business administration major, he is the son of Fred and Susan Braun. "Matthew is an upstanding young man. His leadership and dedication have proven that he is well qualified to represent the interests of the students of Northeast," Carnahan said.

The student representative position provides the Board of Governors with a student perspective. Braun's two-year appointment must be approved by the Missouri State Senate. Braun succeeds Kyle Cope.

Braun is a member of numerous committees at Northeast including the Violette Hall Renovations Committee, and he was a member of the President's Task Force on Computing and the Bookstore Renovations Committee as a freshman. As a member of Student Senate, he has served as the student affairs chair.

Historian to begin spring Lyceum



Robert Ferrell, an expert on American diplomatic history, will present the first Lyceum Series program for 1996 at 7:30 p.m., Jan. 22 in Baldwin Auditorium. A distinguished professor emeritus of history at Indiana University, Ferrell

is the editor of the papers and diaries of presidents Harry Truman and Dwight Eisenhower. He is also the author or co-author of numerous books about U.S. diplomatic history published between 1952 and 1975.

His book *Harry S. Truman: A Life* traces Truman's entire life, 1884-1972. Ferrell recently completed a book about the selection of Truman as Franklin Roosevelt's vice president during Roosevelt's fourth term of office. *Choosing Truman* is about "how the nomination went to a marvelously qualified man, who was not actively seeking it, which is one of the great political stories of our century," Ferrell said.

His *Ill-Advised: Presidential Health and Public Trust* details the seven major medical

coverups in the White House during the years between George Washington and George Bush. In 1980, Harper and Row published his book *Off the Record: The Private Papers of Harry S. Truman*.

Born in Cleveland, Ferrell earned Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts degrees from Bowling Green State University and Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from Yale University.

Ferrell was an intelligence analyst for the U.S. Air Force in Washington, D.C., during 1951-52 and an instructor of history at Michigan State University in 1952-53. He accepted an appointment as assistant professor of history at IU in 1953 and was promoted to full professor in 1961. He also held visiting professorships at Yale, Columbia, Texas Christian and Eastern Illinois universities; the universities of South Carolina, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Notre Dame and Ripon; Catholic University of Louvain, France; American University in Cairo, Egypt; Doshisha University in Kyoto, Japan; and the Naval War College and the U.S. Military Academy at West Point.

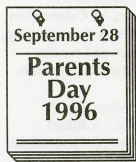
The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) is offering Government Accounting Scholarships to full-time accounting seniors. Candidates should have a superior academic record and have plans
